STRATFORD CORRESPONDENCE.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE HURON SIGNAL. Down, October 26th, 1848. Sir, A copy of the Huron Signal of the 20th, has been handed to me today, that I might have the pleasure of perusing the leading article, which is devoted to our Agricultural Society's Show, held here on the 13th inst.

The worthy editor regrets his having been unable to attend; but it seems he had a spy-stick who was able to inform him that the Stock was of a very superior character, and very creditable to this District. (Item 1). And also that the "party who set down to dinner was respectable, (Item 2) and the dinner excellent."

But the fact is, the Huron Gazette makes quite the reverse of what actually took place. It is altogether false that Mr. MacQueen expressed opinions "at variance with the sentiments of loyalty and British conviction entertained by those present," or any sentiments having a political bearing at all; nor am I aware of any interruption to Mr. MacQueen during his speech.

And as to Mr. MacQueen's having "sloped" the meeting, I cannot tell what the Huron Gazette may mean by the word "sloped"; but I can assure the public that Mr. MacQueen remained in the meeting till the very last. That among the last toasts proposed, was the health and success of Mr. MacQueen, and he actually did "perpetrate" another speech in reply, much to the satisfaction of the company.

In addition to these false representations of the meeting, there is one sentence of the daily leader for which the author merits our contempt for his arrogant presumption, he says— "Two or three young men, whose names have been handed us, avowed their participation in the sentiments of Mr. MacQueen." [It is not necessary for me here to repeat that no political opinions had been expressed by Mr. MacQueen.]
