Newspaper Laws.

We call the special attention of post masters and subscribers to the following synopsis of the newspaper laws :


1. A postmaster is required to give notice by letter (returning a paper does not answer the law) when a subscriber does not take his paper out of the office, and state the reasons for its not being taken. Any neglect to do so makes the postmaster responsible to the publishers for payment.

2. If any person orders his paper dis-continued, he must pay all arrearages, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made, and collect the whole amount, whether it be taken from theoffice or not. There can be no dege discontinuance until the payment made.

3. Any person who takes a paper from the past allies, whether directed to have or another, or whether he has subcrib. I or not, is responsible for the pa

4. If a subseriber orders his paper be storged at a contain time, and the publisher continues to send, the sul criber is bound to say for it if he tak. it out of the rost the post our to manual puy for what he wes.

5. The courts have desided the ref ng to take a newspaper and period from the post-office, or removing a lawing them uncalled for, is primatf-evidence of intentional frand.



Death of Dr. Ryerson Dr. Ryerson died on Sunday morning, BANK OF MONTREAL. after a protracted illness. Adolphus Egerton Ryerson, D. D., LL. D., was original Charlottelown, Norfolk county, March 24th, 1813. Hewas the constant U. E. Loyalist, who served in British army in America during the e obtionary war, and after its close congrated first to New Brunswick and af grwards to Upper Canada. He re-gerval a good education, and after teaching for some years entered the ministry in the Weslevan Methodist Church in 1825, and remained in the itinerancy the 1829, when he aided in founding, and for ten or twelve years edited, the Guardian, the organ of the Wesleyan Methodists of Canada. In 1833 and 1836 he was sent as a delegate to the President. British Wesleyan Conference, and in 1841 was appointed Principal of Victoria College, Cobourg. In 1844 he was appointed Superintendent of Public Schools for Upper Canada, and the next year made an extensive tour of observa ion in the United States and Europe on the subject of Public School education. In 1847 he published a full report of his tour and a plan for the organization of a Public School system, which was adopted, and which he has since that time zealously striven to perfect. He wrote largely, mostly on educational topics, and conducted many important contro-versies with those who assailed his system. He was placed on the superannu-ated lists on full pay when Hon. Adam Crooks became Minister of Education, and he had consequently his whole time at his disposal, which he employed pro-nitably in getting out his book, "The History of the U. E. Loyalists." In the early years of his ministry he was em-ployed like most Methodist ministers of his day, as a missionary, and did good service among the Indians of the north-
