Toil for Liberty in Vain

Convicts' Tunnel Discovered.
 Dannemora, N.Y., Oct. 7.—Officials
 of the State prison here have just dis-
 covered a tunnel, excavated by con-
 victs, under the prison yard, reach-
 ing half way to a big trunk sewer. It
 would have afforded a convenient ex-
 it for a wholesale jail delivery.
 The tunnel has been three years
 under construction, but was not more
 than half done. It was started by
 two life-term men. They could not
 make rapid progress because of the
 difficulty of disposing of the dirt,
 which they had to mix in small quan-
 tities with furnace ashes from the
 laundry. One of the two was an en-
 gineer, and he had worked out by in-
 tricate calculations, the exact angle
 at which the tunnel should be drop-
 ped to reach the sewer.
 After the tunnel was found, a
 search was made of every convict in
 the prison. From the cells were tak-
 en two wagon loads of nondescript
 stuff, including stilettes, hammer,
 monkey wrenches, sandbags, black-
 jacks, fish poles and 350 knives.

Submarine Control by Hertzian Waves.

Portsmouth, Eng., Oct. 6.—Success-
 al experiments with the wireless
 control of submarine boats have been
 made here, but the details are kept
 well guarded. It is known, however,
 that a submarine was taken to shal-
 low water, off Selsey, while the
 Hertzian waves were worked from
 the cruiser Furiosus.

The submarine, which was on the
 surface, was manned and was found
 to be entirely under the control of
 the cruiser.

Then the crew was taken out, and
 the experiment was equally success-
 ful when the boat was submerged.
 Similar experiments are being made
 with torpedoes.

FARM NOTES

Not Written for Farmers
 By H. L. RANN.

We don't know of anything that will
 break the rest of an estimable fam-
 ily quicker than the sleep-walking
 hog. The pig which rises from an
 uneasy couch and meanders over the
 premises, clad in sleep and a snore
 like an accordion with a hot box, is
 a greater menace to scientific agricul-
 ture than the practice of rotating
 cow-pea hay with quick grass. There
 is something wrong with the homi-
 nizing of the pig which gets up in
 the middle of the night and butts
 into the hired girl's room in a sleep-
 walking jag. It will usually be found
 that the hog which has contracted
 his habit is accustomed to sleeping
 on his back on a mattress of cor-
 nobs, with his mouth wide open
 which makes him the easy prey of
 very nomadic nightmares. You can't
 expect a pig to sleep with all four
 feet in the air and a back resembling
 a section of corrugated roofing, and
 not look with longing on a spring cot.
 If more twin beds were introduced
 into the hog house, the head of the
 family could retire to rest at night
 without having the coverlets pried off
 by some heavy-lidded porker in pur-
 suit of a quiet snooze.

If your fireless cooker smokes, it is
 evidence of spontaneous combustion
 in the hay tank. Remove the hay and
 replace with Wisconsin leaf tobacco,
 which nothing short of a full-bosomed
 suction pump can get any smoke
 out of. Every fireless cooker ought
 to be equipped with a time lock, to
 prevent food from scorching.

A friend of ours who says that he
