

Discussing the famous case of the paper duties, in which the question was crystallised, the same author says: ". . . . it properly belongs to the Lords to judge, not merely of the general expediency of the proposed scheme, when regarded as a whole, and of its probable results upon the country at large, but also to consider the various questions of commercial legislation and public policy that may be involved in its details. The House of Lords has an onerous duty to perform in respect of every Bill, financial or otherwise, that may be sent to it from the other chamber, in submitting the same to careful revision, for the purpose of restraining hasty or improvident legislation, and sanctioning by its wisdom, influence and authority whatever may be necessary to promote the public good." Finally, further on, "Toulmin Smith, in his Parliamentary Rememberancer 1861, although he had sided against the Lords in the beginning of the controversy, condemned the present proceeding of the Commons, as betokening a lack of 'ordinary courtesy and self-respect,' 'really amounting to a declaration that the House of Lords shall be overridden, without scruple, whenever the Commons want to pass Bill that cannot be safely trusted on the stage of fair discussion." Could any words be chosen expressing better than these last the whole position that has arisen here? We could quote at much greater length if we wished, out the statements we have cited should settle conclusively the question whether the Council has the right or not to reject financial measures sent up from the House of Assembly.



Health Officer

ON INFANTILE PARALYSIS.

At last evening's meeting of the City Council the subjoined communication, received from the Medical Health Officer and dealing with the outbreak of infantile paralysis that now exists in the city, was read:-August 9th, 1917.

Sir,-I beg to submit, for the infor-

mation of the Council, the following brief statement in reference to the cases of acute poliomyelitis or infantile paralysis which have been reported in the city during the past week. The first two cases—at 14 Gower Street and 160 LeMarchant Roadwere reported on Friday, August 3rd. I visited both houses and made full enquiry into the circumstances surrounding these cases. The illness in each case began on July 29th., but there is apparently no connection between the two, nor has it been possible to discover any source of infection from outside. This is only what might be expected, as in this disease is seldom possible to trace definitely the source of infection in each case. Full instructions were given as to the precautions necessary to prevent the further spread of the disease. Both families are well situated for this purpose, and I am confident that my instructions will be properly carried out, and that there will be no further danger from these cases. The third case-at 34 Gilbert Street-was reported on August 7th. This house is a very small one, and the circumstances being such that proper isolation or management were impossible, the patient was removed to hospital. I may say that the cases reported are of a comparatively mild nature, and there is reason to hope that the pa-

The measures which have been taken to prevent the spread of the disease are those which have been recommended by the American Public Healt Association, and by Dr. Flexner of the Rockefeller Institute, New York, who is probably the foremost living authority on the subject. They are as follows:

1.-Medical practitioners have been required under the provisions of the Public Health Act to report promptly to the Health Officer all cases or suspected cases of infantile paralysis. 2.—Isolation of patients in separate rooms for six weeks from the beginning of illness, with careful disinfection of all body discharges, disinfec tion of clothing and other articles used by the patients, etc., and general management as in other infectious dis-

3.—Prevention of all unnecessary contact of other inmates of the houses with the general public. 4.—Observation of all known "con-

tacts" outside the infected nouse for two weeks after the last exposure. While this disease is known to be infectious, it is also well established that the degree of infectivity is comparatively low, and that the general susceptibility to infection, even among infants and young children, is far less than in the case of such diseases as measles, diphtheria or scarlet fever. Few individuals, even among those in close contact with the sick, are attacked. There is therefore no probability of the disease becoming as widespread or prevalent in any of the ordinary infectious diseases. In the most severe outbreaks recorded the tootal number of reported cases has seldom, if ever, exceeded one per thousand of the population.

The effective control of infantile paralysis outbreaks is rendered difficult by the lack of knowledge which still exists as to its exact mode of causation and conveyance-also by the known facts that the infection may be carried in the nasal passages or throats of apparently healthy persons who are not known to have been in contact with the disease, and that in every considerable outbreak there are many slight unrecognized cases of an "abortive" type, which do not proceed to the stage of paralysis, but recover after a short period of illness which appears to be merely a "feverish cold" or digestive disturbance. It has now been pretty well established that the disease is spread mainly by personal contact, and that other agencies, such as milk and other foods, insects, domestic animals, clothing, etc., do not play an important part.

In these circumstances all that can be done is to endeavour to secure the early detection and isolation of all cases, with the necessary control of the households in which they occur, and to carry out the general hygienic and preventive measures which are applicable to all infectious diseases. While those measures are undoubtedly of value in limiting an outbreak, they cannot be entirely effective until the nature of the disease is more fully understood

Since the above has been written a fourth case has been reported, but has not yet been fully investigated. I have the honour to be.
