General Protestant Cemetery.

Editor Evening Telegran Dear Sir,-One of the characteristics of civilized humane and cultured Christian people with a belief in immortality, is respect for the dead. A neglected cemetery, with fences falling down, and walks and graves uncared for, is an index of a community that is blinded with the materialistic spirit of the world, taking a distorted view of life, and certainly a wrong view of death and the Christian teaching, about the resurrection of the body, which in this life was a living temple of the Holy Ghost, that will after the last great day be honored and glorified for ever in Heaven. I am led into these reflections after visiting the General Protestant Cemetery in the West End, and viewing the fence both on the Topsail Road and Waterford Bridge Road. Those as dear to me as my own life are buried there, and the sight of the condition of their last resting place and

its surroundings is to me a silent and unspoken accusation which gives grief and pain too deep for words. I have done my very best to honor their remains by keeping their graves neat nd tidy, and decorating them with lowers in season, but I realize that the work is only sinful mockery, in view of the general condition of the Cemetery, especially the dilapidated condition of the fences by which it is enclosed. The four Methodist churches of the city, the Congregationalists, and the Presbyterians all have relations buried there, and it is a question that should concern them all. Lack of means cannot stand as an excuse. Why then is it that the condition of this cemetery is so bad to-day that a double pain is inflicted on those who go there to attend the interment of a relative or a friend each of the above named churches and see to its upkeep. They evidently are making a great success in being impotent witnesses of its downfall without as far as I can see making an effort to improve the fence or the grounds. Maybe some of them will be good enough when this appears to publish a few lines in the paper explaining the cause of their gross dereliction of duty in this matter. I feel certain that it is not the fault of the people, and that if the commtitee had been active and appealed to those who have relatives buried there they would at least get sufficient funds to erect a decent enclosure around the cemetery in place of the old fence placed there 40 or 50 years ago. This is the age of drives, and it seems to be no trouble to raise a quarter of a million to half a million dollars amongst the very people, the foundation of whose prosperity was in many cases laid by those who now sleep neglected, in graves to which the cattle will soon have free ingress. "Drives" can also be made successfully for all kinds of sensational schemes, fads, and fancies, but not a dollar seems to be collectable by the Cemetery Committee to put this cemetery in decent condition. The new ground near Tor Cottage purchased a few years ago is fenced with longers and reminds one of a grazing ground for cattle. I know that one of the committee men gave as an excuse that they were waiting for the street line before they could erect a fence. This is nothing short of ridiculous. If a man wants to build a house will he wait years upon years for the street line, -not at all. He will apply for it, get it and go to work at once. The whole situation suggests a deplorable lack of sentiment in respect for the dead. If the congregations are satisfied to lie under the charge of neglect implied in this belief, let them continue to allow conditions to remain as they are, and they cannot divorce themselves from the obloquy with which all right thinking people will regard their conduct. I would suggest, if I they are open to appeal, that they take a leaf out of the book of those committees that manage the cemeteries to the north of the city which are a solace and a consolation to visit. Their work is a live wire connection

eternal and evidences a practical belief in the latter. Let the committee ask the co-operation of the clergymen of the churches mentioned, and arrange for a cemetery collection one Sunday in the year, and I have no doubt that the people will respond so well that we shall be able to erect an iron rail fence around the cemetery, that will last for a century, and in addition, will, by following the same course the next year, raise money enough to clean up all the walks and beautify the graves. If the committee despair of doing this let them resign, and not be an obstacle any longer. They will then give us a chance to get live men in their places. As one who has recently laid in this ground a child who is dearer to him than his own life, I would, in conclusion, implore a reply from some one in authority, giving an explanation as to their intentions. In the absence of such reply, will it then devolve upon me perforce—a private member of the community-to take up this work


