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



But coming from such an exalted personage as the President of the United States, it attained oracular significance. Now a considerable number of persons, to whom Providence gave speech, but denied reason, are proclaiming that the "self-determination of nations" was one of the war aims of the Allies. The invalid President has had his words rammed down his throat until he is almost suffocated, and must on counteless occasions have regretted the evil inspiration that prompted him to bang them out on his typewriter. Certainly few men are more temperamentally opposed to selfdetermination in others than he.



I invested a big lot of money in a schooner and this year I took a crew and sailed from Cape Spear to Cape Mugford in quest of a voyage. After great deal has been said about the all our efforts we only secured 230 quintals, which we brought on here for sale and started to land at Mudges. Of this 155 quintals turned out No. 1 and the balance No. 2. I asked the Inspector what he meant by culling, so much of my fish down to No. 2 and I will not tell you the answer got. It made my blood boil and made after him. If I had caught him I need not tell you what would have happened. If you could see the condition of my body after tramping this town carrying around a 19 pound artificial leg you would not wonder why I lost my temper with that Inspector. The insistent demand among all excompelled to wear artificial limbs, is for the lightest possible leg. At the beginning of the war, nine pounds was the average weight of an artificial leg, but the weight of a leg made of wood has now been reduced to just under five pounds. The Ministry of Pensions is now experimenting with metal limbs lighter than this. On a recent morning I was shown a new leg, made of the aluminium alloy, duralumin, which only weights 31/2 pounds. The leg can be made at very little greater cost than the heavier wooden leg. 

Slaughter Haitians.

The United States Covernment has lately had something to divert its attention from the condition of Ireland. in revelations with regard to the conduct of its troops in Haiti. Privates of the U.S. marine corps have been recklessly killing Haitian prisoners held on the charge of being bandits. Two marines were tried and acquitted on the ground that they were merely obeying the orders of their immediate command, Lieut. H T Brokaw The latter was in turn investigated, adjudged insane and dismissed from the service. It is admitted by the higher command of the Marine Corps that there was "indiscriminate killing" of Haitians, who are, in a measure, wards of the United States. It is now revealed that this slaughter has totalled 3,250 in the past four years. The New York Herald says that these massacres were due chiefly to the strong anti-American feeling engendered by the methods of American occupation. which has destroyed any vestige of independence.






