

# Migration of Negroes.

now in progress from the Southern States to the North and West has attracted much attention in the cities work begins. All rough ends are of Louisiana, Mississippi, and other Southern States. It is estimated that not less than 11,000 negroes have left Mississippi since last fall while it is stated that 9,000 at least have left ouisiana at the same time.



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

The paper, which is of the best grade, is made by hand from picked rags and is then washed and re-washed by special spring water, over 40,000 tons of which is used in a day.

Another secret which is kept by the Bank is that of the composition of the ink used in printing. It is made from the charred husks of Rhenish vines, but the actual formula is known to only a few officials.

Each note costs the Bank of Engand about three farthings to produce, and the finished article is in circulation for an average period of eventy days. Some people, of course, have a mania for keeping Bank of England notes, and in such cases many years may elapse before a note is presented for payment.
