POLL TAX.

The attention of the public is called to the following sections of the St. John's Municipal Act, 1921: Section 249—Every male person of the age of twenty-one years or upwards who has resided in the City for the period of twelve months immediately preceding the first day of October in any year, and who is not liable as owner or indirectly as tenant to the payment of the City Tax on any property rated in the appraisal book of the Council at an annual rental value of forty dollars or upwards shall pay to the city a Poll Tax of five dollars per annum.

Section 250—The said Poll Tax shall be due and payable without demand or notice by or from the Council between the fifth day of October and the fifth day of November in every year at the office of the City Clerk.

Section 251—Any person who fails to comply with the provisions of the foregoing section shall, in addition to payment of the tax, be liable to a penalty not exceeding five dollars, or in default of payment to imprisonment not exceeding ten days.

All persons liable are hereby notified to govern themselves accordingly.

How Francis Joseph Ruled Realm in 1888 Told in Old Letters

VIENNA, Sept. 24 (A.P.)—Intimate details as to the methods of Francis Joseph, Emperor of Austria and King of Hungary, in running the dual monarchy 35 years ago have been given by the publication in a local newspaper of a collection of letters and orders from the imperial hand. The autographic ruler was not slow to see what he wanted done, and to give orders to that effect.

In 1888 Francis Joseph learned that Vienna planned to honor the German emperor with a torchlight procession. This did not please him, so from Budapest he telegraphed his prime minister as follows:

"I learn from the papers that an agitation is afoot for a torchlight procession for the German emperor. As such a thing is entirely out of the question, it will be well to set one's face against it decisively at once; moreover to keep one's eyes open—F. J."

The emperor evidently depended largely upon the newspapers of his realm for information, for in 1889 he read in Budapest of certain projected Slav activities in Vienna in which Slav parliamentarians were to participate. Beginning his telegram "I see in the papers," he said to his minister, "I leave it to you to reflect whether, in view of the diverse provocative occurrences of the last few days, this celebration could not be prohibited, provided it is legally practicable—F. J."

Polish students in Lemberg in 1889 adopted some resolutions, possibly reflecting hopes for ultimate independence, which the emperor did not like. He must have been reading the newspapers again for his message shows he was waiting confirmation from the governor of the province. In the meantime he telegraphed his premier: "Definite steps appear necessary against the students who in disregard of their rector's prohibition, met and adopted impertinent resolutions. Unless we are prepared to witness like excesses at all our universities, the government must exhibit determination—F. J."

Francis Joseph made known his royal intentions to Hungary as well as to Austria, for he sent this message to Herr von Bitto, the prime minister at Budapest: "Having learnt that the civil marriage bill has been placed on the order of the day, I once more draw your attention to the fact that I shall not approve a bill which is untimely and so destined to lead to perfectly unnecessary complications—F. J."

Turkey Plays a Game of Bluff Over Irak Situation

Labour Repudiates Communism But Supports Communist Candidates -- U. S. Share of the German Loan to be Offered To-day--Germany Complies With the Terms of the Dawes' Plan.

NATIONAL ASSEMBLY CONVOKED TO DEAL WITH IRAK QUESTION.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 13. Following receipt of a communication from the British commander in Irak, Mesopotamia, on Saturday, the Turkish Council of Ministers at Ankara held a prolonged session and decided to convolve the National Assembly immediately. Alleged incursions of Turkish forces into the Mosul Vilayet of Irak have been the occasion of protests from the British Government. The Turkish Government, however, has denied the violation of status quo zone agreed upon, while the Irak boundary matter is pending before the League of Nations.

TRKS CONSIDER MOBILIZATION OF TROOPS.

LONDON, Oct. 5. An Agency despatch from Constantinople says the situation concerning the dispute over the Irak frontier is regarded as grave and that the question of the need for general mobilization has been reviewed by the Turkish Government.

UNSATISFACTORY BUT CONCILIATORY.

LONDON, Oct. 10. The British foreign office considers the reply of the Turks to its representation regarding alleged violations of the status quo in Irak (Mesopotamia) as unsatisfactory but conciliatory in tone. The feeling is that the note does not make the situation unusually grave. Premier MacDonald has ordered an investigation of the present state of affairs, after which it is expected another note will be sent to Ankara.

DAWES PLAN FULLY ESTABLISHED.

PARIS, Oct. 10. The Reparation Committee formally announced to-day that the Dawes Plan organization had been fully established and that the German Government had complied with all the requirements to date under the agreement made at the recent International Conference in London. The Committee approved plans for the American and German participation in the \$200,000,000 loan to Germany and suggested that the agent general for reparation payments ought to be ex-officio one of the trustees representing the bond-holders.

WOMEN FAVOUR COMPLETE PROHIBITION.

TORONTO, Oct. 13. Without a dissenting voice the National Council of Women of Canada went on record at to-day's meeting as being in favor of complete prohibition of alcoholic liquors as beverages in Canada. Opening to-day's session a report from the committees on taxation was received, together with a resolution calling upon the Federal Government to alter the present income tax laws. This resolution caused the most strenuously fought out division of opinion seen to date.

LABOUR PARTY AND THE COMMUNISTS.

LONDON, Oct. 13. Despite the resolution passed at the recent Labour Party Conference here against the admission of Communists as Labour Party candidates in the coming election an ample of this is seen in the case of the Rushmore division of Manchester, where the local Labour party has decided to support the candidature of W. Paul, a Communist, who was in the three-cornered contest there on December 12, 1923, when Charles Masterson, Liberal, was elected; and also in North Battersea, where the Communist S. Sakietva has been nominated for the Labour Party. He was a member of the House of Commons when the Baldwin Government was dissolved but failed in re-election last Dec-

ember. At Labor headquarters in London it is explained that neither Paul or Sakietva will receive official labor support, and that it is impossible for the Labor headquarters to interfere with the choice of local labor organizations. It is understood, however, in the case of Paul, that the National Labor Party for the Manchester division has intimated that it will not object to his acceptance as a labor candidate, if it is made clear that he is not standing for Parliament with National Labor Party credentials.

BASBALL STARS HUNTING BIG GAME.

FREDERICKTON, N.B., Oct. 12. Headed by Eddie Collins, Captain of the Chicago White Sox, and called by most experts the greatest second baseman who ever lived, a party of diamond stars of the major leagues will arrive here this week on their way to hunt big game in New Brunswick.

RENCH PRESS INSISTS ON DEMOLITION OF ZEPPELIN WORKS.

PARIS, Oct. 15. The next definite word as to the progress of ZR-3 is expected to be in the form of a wireless communication either from some vessel sighting her at sea or from the Azores Islands, over which she is expected to pass in following the southern trans-Atlantic route. This route was chosen because of adverse conditions reported over the shorter northern route. The ZR-3 left Fredrickshafen where she was built on war reparations account of United States. Now that the ZR-3 has really left, French opinion is interesting in the fate of the great Zeppelin Works at Fredrickshafen which, in conformity with the Treaty of Versailles, must be demolished, since according to the Ambassador's Council's note of April 1922 Germany is only entitled to build dirigibles under 30,000 cubic metres capacity. The French press are urging the Government to keep a strict watch to see that this provision is complied with, now that the departure of ZR-3 no longer gives an excuse for maintaining the Zeppelin works.

OTHER LOANS WILL FOLLOW.

NEW YORK, Oct. 13. Completion of the \$200,000,000 loan to Germany will pave the way for other international loans aggregating several hundred million dollars within the near future, in the opinion of United States bankers. While a great part of this business would be for account of German industries, it was said to-day that France already

was negotiating for \$150,000,000 and that Belgium was insistent that her demands be given immediate attention. The United States of the German loan, \$110,000,000 will be produced on schedule time to-morrow, International bankers connected with the J. P. Morgan & Co. group said. The financial district information, accepted as true through lacking information of the Morgan House, says that the banking commission for handling the German business will be in the neighbourhood of five points a usual margin in transactions of this kind.

SPEAKER WILL NOT BE OPPOSED.

LONDON, Oct. 13. J. H. Whitley, Speaker of the House of Commons and Liberal member of the late Parliament for Halifax, Yorkshire, will not be opposed by Labour in the present election. Although the Labour Party in Halifax about two weeks ago, before any one thought there would be a general election so soon, decided to put a candidate in the field, the party has now decided not to do so.

THE END WAS PEACEFUL.

PARIS, Oct. 13. The death at Tours of Anatole France, created a profound impression throughout the country and the newspapers to-day print columns about his life and works. The aged writer's long struggle against death had been watched with intense interest and his vitality amazed the doctors. Weeks ago they announced that his death was only a question of hours, yet he held his own and even made surprising rallies. Almost to the end he maintained consciousness and lucidity. Only yesterday he japed into semi-consciousness, murmuring in a faint voice from time to time "I am dying," and calling for his mother. The end came peacefully without a struggle shortly before midnight in the presence of his wife and faithful physician.

ALL WELL ON DIRIGIBLE.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13. A message from the air cruiser ZR-3, received at the Navy Department to-night, reported her position at 3 o'clock, Eastern Standard Time, this afternoon, as 130 miles west of Fayal Course (Azores) and added that all was well.

JAPS WILL NOT WITHDRAW TROOPS.

TOKIO, Oct. 13. Because of the recent military upheaval in China, the Japanese Government's plan of withdrawing its garrison of four battalions from South Manchuria, has been shelved indefinitely, it was made known to-day.

PRINCE IN CHICAGO.

CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 13. The Prince of Wales was greeted by a huge throng when he reached the environs of Chicago to-day and descended from the train at a Lake Forest, to be the guest of Louis F.

China Has a Move for Unification

VICTORIA, B.C., Sept. 29 (Canadian Press)—Will China's new war prove merely another opera affair such as Chinese military alone seem able to produce or will it become a real struggle between the dominant powers of the Far East—a menace to the peace of the entire world?

The real powers in China today are the Manchus or military leaders each commanding armies sufficiently strong to accomplish a great deal independent of the recognized government of the country, and these Manchus are so given to issuing proclamations vilifying their opponents and exaggerating their own strength and high principle that the news from the war front may for a time give rather a bewildering picture of the situation.

There is every reason to believe that the war is not solely for control of Shanghai according to words brought here by prominent business men from the Orient. Under the surface, it is said, there are far more important considerations and whether these are allowed to come into the open and become the acknowledged objectives of the rival leaders will depend upon the development of the combat, either as a purely local affair or a military manoeuvre of consequences sufficiently disturbing to engage the attention of the great world.

To Canada, which has so much to gain from the peace and industrial and commercial development in the Orient, this new struggle has particular concern, and it may be interesting to know that the Chinese residents of Canada's Pacific coast who have had opportunity of following the trend of events and examining them in their proper perspective believe that a real war, involving millions of dollars and enormous quantities of ammunition, is rapidly approaching.

China has grown since the announcement that Sun Yat Sen, the Chinese leader, has decided to enter Manchuria, and that Chang Tso-Lin, Manchurian dictator who is backed by Japan if his enemies are to be credited, is sending his troops south from Mukden to engage his old adversary, Wu Pei Fu, at present leading the Chi-Li forces.

There are three main spheres of influence in China today. At Peking there is a constitutional government, with President, Premier and Legislature. This is officially recognized by the Foreign Powers. At its head, nominally, is President Tsao Kun. But the real power in Peking lies in the hands of General Wu Pei-Fu, President, Premier and Legislature are said to be mere puppets, for General Wu controls the constitutional army.

At Canton, too, there is a constitutional form of government, but the power there is likewise centered in one man—General Sun Yat Sen, President of the Republic of South China. At Mukden, the capital of Manchuria, Gen. Chang Tso-Lin reigns as dictator of Northern China.

Each of these three generals holds a varying number of provinces in allegiance; and the story of China's troubles in recent years is mainly the history of each general's ambition to win control over the whole country, an ambition each has proclaimed to be the idealistic aim of "unifying China."

The war, then, is rooted not so much in clashing political opinions as in the intrigues of three powerful generals for personal supremacy. Two of these, however, Sun Yat Sen in the south, and Chang Tso-Lin in the north, are at present allies, united against Wu Pei-Fu, the constitutionalist leader.

Two years ago Chang Tso-Lin attacked Peking with his Manchurian troops, but suffered a heavy defeat. Retiring to Mukden, he set about the building of a huge arsenal for the manufacture of arms and ammunition. He employed both French and Japanese military and ordnance engineers, and financed largely, it is said by a friendly foreign power, has steadily turning out the most modern war equipment in China, including tanks, aeroplanes, and gas shells of latest type. His army has grown to 200,000 men, and is considered to be extremely well equipped and disciplined.

Sometime ago Chang Tso-Lin entered into a pact with Sun Yat Sen at Canton to make common cause against Wu Pei-Fu. After "unifying" China Sun Yat Sen was to be given administrative power and Chang Tso-Lin the military leadership, according to the terms of their alliance.

Meanwhile, General Wu Pei-Fu has watched this union of the North and South with growing apprehension. His own 200,000 troops were outnumbered by Chang's 300,000 and in addition was not so well equipped.

Seeing Chang Tso-Lin apparently so bottled up in his Mukden stronghold by the recent devastating floods in Chi Li province, Wu Pei-Fu thought he must seize a last desperate chance of defeating singly his weaker opponents elsewhere in China, particularly Sun Yat Sen at Canton, so that he could draw sufficient strength from his defeated enemies to face the inevitable attack of Chang Tso-Lin.

Thus not the war lord of Kiangsu province, but Wu Pei-Fu himself, is at the bottom of the attempt to wrest

Shanghai from Chekiang Province. Wars cost money and, controlling Shanghai, Wu Pei-Fu could draw upon the wealth of the richest of Chinese cities. Moreover, Wu Pei-Fu might just as well start his campaign against his enemies in Chekiang province.

Shanghai is not actually in Chekiang province, but lies within the boundaries of Kiangsu. It was given to the war lord of Chekiang by Sun Yat Sen, premier of the Constitutional Government at Peking in 1919. The prior right of Kiangsu to the control of Shanghai supplied Wu Pei-Fu with pretext.

If China can be kept in a state of turmoil it will disturb British and American trade very much, and may cause the shutting down of factories, thereby throwing many people out of employment.

Fortune May Favor Davis

A month ago a good many Americans took it for granted that Mr. Coolidge would be the winner of the presidential race. To-day there is an unmistakable drift of popular favor towards Senator La Follette. People are beginning to say that in many of the northern states Mr. Davis will finish third, and that no one will have a majority of the electoral votes.

This may be true, but at most it means that the next President may be chosen by the House of Representatives. The House may fail to elect, in which case it is taken for granted that the Senate would elect Governor Bryan Vice-President and that he would automatically become President of the United States.

There is another possibility that the political soothsayers are overlooking. Neither Republicans nor Democrats command a majority in the House. But will the House on that account practically delegate to the Senate its power of choosing the next President? Will there not be Republican members of the House ready to help their Democratic colleagues elect Mr. Davis, when they see that a failure by the House to elect anybody would result in the Senate electing Mr. Bryan. Bryan is a Democrat and more objectionable to many Republicans than is Mr. Davis.

However, the popular vote has not yet been taken. The landslide towards Coolidge was followed by a landslide to La Follette. A landslide towards Davis may yet be possible.—Manitoba Free Press.

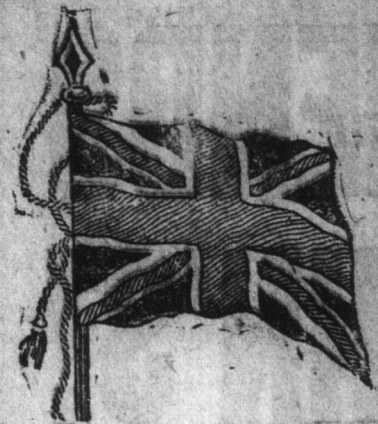

The Grand Jury's Decision

The action of the Grand Jury in "throwing out the Bill" in Sir Richard Squires' case, following the comprehensive finding of the Commissioner Walker and the considered decision of the Judge of the Magistrate's Court to send the case for trial, has formed the one topic of conversation during the past few days. Although the trial has been delayed, the events which led up to it are still fresh in the mind of everyone and do not require to be repeated. It is sufficient to say that they focussed the eyes of the world on Newfoundland, and the world awaits the outcome with as lively an interest as do our own citizens.

The protest raised by the Crown Counsel in connection with the drawing and summing-up of the jury received the consideration of the Judges of the Supreme Court, and yesterday we published the decision of the Court to uphold the status of the present Grand Jury and their reasons for arriving at that decision.

The situation which results from the finding of the Grand Jury is that Sir Richard Squires occupies a very unenviable position. He was charged with the larceny of public funds, and the decision of the Grand Jury has merely vetoed his right, for the time being at any rate, to a trial on those charges, and has in no sense acquitted him, as their only duty is to decide whether there is a prima facie case or not, and they are not called upon to deal with the question of the prisoner's guilt or innocence.

Naturally the general public have been at a loss to understand how it has come about that a case which caused such a sensation here and abroad, and which required such an outlay in time and money, could be disposed of in this summary manner. The only explanation is that so succinctly expressed by our morning contemporary in the following observation:

"What has puzzled the public is how any Grand Jury could arrive at a decision in about an hour when 66 counts, or even 33, were involved. It took Recorder Walker, K.C., some weeks to sift the evidence, and it occupied the attention of His Honour Judge Morris for a month, before committal was made. There are evidently greater minds in our midst than citizens have hitherto had knowledge of."

A Lecture on Printing Ink

The story of Printing Ink as told by W. E. Sharpe, Sales Manager of the Canada Printing Ink Company, in the Grand Hall last night, gave the audience a very graphic insight into the multitudinous fields of labour engaged in the production of the material, and clearly showed them the important part it plays in every sphere of activity in the civilized world of to-day.

Briefly sketching the methods adopted in the manufacture of ink by the early printers, he traced the growth of the printing business, and explained and illustrated by lantern slides the phenomenal development which has taken place in the industry of recent years.

The successful results of scientific experiments in the search of a suitable fluid were responsible for the wide circulation in modern times of the great journals of the world and the placing within the reach of everyone the works of the most celebrated authors.

The lithographic processes were fully described and the lecturer went into detail to show how the colors were obtained and produced, and the different ways in which they were used in the printing business. The reproduction of works of art, the importance of the colored inks on manufactured products and in the various lines of advertising, and the uses made of colors in the printing of stamps and bank notes were fully described. The lecturer showed how the manufacturer depended upon the oil wells, the fields of flax, the forests of the south, the natural gas, the coal tar products and the minerals which play such an important part in supplying the pigments and the other essential properties. For over an hour the audience gave their closest attention to the lecturer and their appreciation was shown in a very practical manner at the conclusion of the address. A vote of thanks to the lecturer, proposed by Mr. F. M. F. Quigley and seconded by Mr. F. Merner, was carried in a most enthusiastic manner. Mr. Quigley suggested that the colored printing process should be brought to the attention of the business firms of St. John's, in order that they might be led to adopt this method to give greater effect to their advertising campaigns, and in order that such work should be done here instead of abroad.

Supreme Court

TRUE BILLS IN REX VS. J. T. MEANEY AND REX VS. JAS. W. McNEILY.

The Grand Jury was present and reported True Bill in the matter of the King vs. J. T. Meaney and in the matter of the King vs. Jas. Whiteford McNeily. Mr. Emerson moved for the arraignment of Mr. Meaney on tomorrow and Mr. McNeily on Friday. Argument on the motion of W. R. Howley for the discharge of Sir Richard Squires and the release of his bondsmen occupied the attention of the Court for the greater part of the forenoon. The Court gave no decision in the matter, but it is expected that judgment will be delivered tomorrow. Mr. Howley pointed out that the bond which was signed for the 'emancipation of the Supreme Court of when Walter upon could be construed to mean a bond in perpetuity. The words "when called upon" he claimed were an addition to the usual form. Mr. Winter replying asked if Mr. Howley took exception to the form of the bond or if he was requesting the release of the bondsmen or the prisoner. If it were the latter he pointed out that his instructions are that the Crown cannot consent to the motion, but it might consent if the motion was for the release of the bondsmen.

Mr. Howley reiterated his motion for the release of the bondsmen and the dismissal of Sir R. Squires, on the grounds that the Bill of Indictment had been ignored by the Grand Jury. He further argued that a bill on the same charges and supported by the same evidence ought not to be referred to another Grand Jury unless there was additional evidence or alteration in the charges. He claimed statutory authority for the right of a person against whom no bill is found to a right of discharge immediately and quoted 55 Geo. 3 Chap. 4 and 5. He also quoted Archibald in reference to possible future action by the Crown citing the cases of Regina vs. Semblé, 1843 and Regina vs. Austin, 1850. Mr. Winter dealt with each of the Sections in Mr. Howley's motion viz: (1) The proposition for discharge of the prisoner; (2) The proposition that the same bill cannot be sent up the second time; (3) That the same bill cannot be sent up to another Grand Jury, and submitted that it was proper for the Crown to keep the prisoner in custody until the jury was discharged as another bill may be sent against him.

He had no hesitation in stating that if necessary it is the intention of the Crown to bring the matter before a new Grand Jury and there is a possibility that the same bill may be sent back to the present Grand Jury.

The charges against Dr. Alex Campbell and W. F. O'Reilly are being considered by the Grand Jury this afternoon.

Candidates Given a Vociferous Send Off

HUNDREDS OF BONAVISTA FISHERMEN PRESENT.

The Prime Minister, Hon. W. S. Monroe, and Minister of Marine and Fisheries, Hon. W. C. Winsor, left by the express at 1 p.m. to-day to open the campaign in the Bye-election in the District of Bonavista Bay. Amongst those present at the station to see their departure were, the Executive and members of the Government, several prominent merchants, and upwards of 600 fishermen from Bonavista Bay. Before the train pulled out the gathering crowded the station platform and gave the Ministers a rousing send-off. Cheers upon cheer rent the air, and probably never before has such a demonstration been accorded members of a Government seeking re-election at the Polls. After the outburst of applause had subsided both the Prime Minister, Hon. W. S. Monroe and Hon. W. C. Winsor, addressed a few words to the large gathering from the platform of the car. They thanked the gathering for their attendance expressed their confidence in the result and their appreciation in the support which was so clearly behind the Party. Further cheering followed and only ceased when the train had passed out of the station.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

MACDONALD DELIVERS AN ORATION IN GLASGOW.

LONDON, Oct. 13. (Canadian Press)—Ramsay MacDonald's first public appearance in the present election campaign was the signal for a demonstration in Glasgow to-night of loyalty from his supporters. The Prime Minister entered the building through lines of people numbering several thousand who had been unable to get admittance and who interrupted and clamored for admission to cheer MacDonald on whom the audience had finished its ovation. Dealing with the question of foreign policy when Labour assumed office, he said they found the name of British lower in international reputation even than the Russian rouble. Much has been done to restore Britain's place in the world of politics, and to reassure other nations as to the dependability of Britain's policy. "Sheer humbug," was the way the Premier described the charges brought against the Government in connection with the suspension of the Campbell sedition case. "The common fear had got into the hearts of Liberal and Tory alike." He said that at least new heirs had been born to the hollow throne occupied so long by the old time parties. "It is our success that made the trouble," Mr. MacDonald asserted amid applause. "If I had made a mess of Europe and my friend Wheatley had made a mess of his job, we would not have been voted out in the House of Commons. They would have given us a much longer time together." Into the proposed loan to Russia the Premier emphasized that two thirds of it would be spent in British industrial centres. "This proposal for a Russian loan," he said, "is a proposal to increase available credits for British industry, and open the door for industry stimulated by that credit, because it will open up Russian markets to our goods." When he came into office, the Premier went on, he had found the League of Nations practically doing nothing because no great beneficial lead had been given to it. "We went to Geneva and gave that lead," he added, "and the League of Nations today is more vigorous than ever." The Premier complained that the Government had not had fair play in Parliament, where it had met with pettifogging partisan trickery aimed to prevent an honest government doing its work. In his peroration the Prime Minister appealed to the nation to put an end to contemptible party tactics by giving the Government a clear majority. Another salvo of cheers broke out as he resumed his seat.

CHICAGO ENTHUSIASM AMAZES THE PRINCE.

CHICAGO, Oct. 13. Edward David Windsor, the heir to the British Throne, was Chicago's guest on a private visit for seventeen crowded hours to-day. At the visitor's stopping place the enthusiastic welcome of cheering throngs turned the affair into a cordial public reception. Lusty cheers and big throated automobile horns saluted him at every turn. "My worst" said the Prince to his host during one of the day's brief stops, "these Americans are enthusiastic and vigorous." He doffed his hat and smiled graciously in response to every greeting. Chicago picked up the Prince enthusiastically at Lake Forest, a suburb, soon after eight o'clock in the morning. He was the guest of Louis F. Swift, the packer. He was whisked along the Lake shore and through evergrowing throngs to the stockyards for an hour's inspection tour, and to the University of Chicago for a somewhat formal reception by college officers, city officials, and some 200 invited representatives of the community.

THE EXTREMISTS' PROGRAMME.

LONDON, Oct. 14. The announced program of the Communist Party in Britain includes the nationalization of big industries and banks, state control of foreign trade, capital levy, suspension of interest on the national debt, holdings of over £500,000 minimum weekly wage of £4 with a forty-four hour working week, a loan to Russia of £100,000,000 and cancellations of reparations war debt. Dr. R. Dunstan is standing as a Communist in Birmingham West, the seat held by the Right Hon. Austen Chamberlain, in the remaining eleven Birmingham divisions straight labor candidates are being entered. At the last elections Birmingham "incividing Edgemoor" returned a solid doz Conservatives including two Chamberlains Austen and Neville. Dr. Dunstan was defeated last year by Neville Chamberlain. Probably the least exciting campaign in whole kingdom will be that in Scotland division of Liverpool, where T. P. O'Connor is returned unopposed with unflinching regularity at every election. O'Connor this year is not even issuing an election address, his principles he remarked to friends are the same as they were when he first appealed to the electors thirty-five years ago and he had nothing new to say.

TURKS DENY MOBILIZATION REPORT.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 13. The Ankara Government makes a denial of the current report that there is to be general mobilization of Turkish troops on the Iraq front, but it is reported here that certain military dispositions have been made. Kemal Pasha, President of Turkey, is returning immediately from Erzerum to Ankara.

TURKEY'S CHARGES AGAINST BRITAIN.

GENEVA, Oct. 13. Accusing Great Britain of ignoring the League of Nations' decisions, Ismet Pasha, the Turkish Premier and Foreign Minister, to-day telegraphed the League that if the Turkish troops commit acts of aggression on the frontier between Turkey and Iraq, Britain must bear the entire responsibility. The Turkish telegram which was given out to-night indicated that it had been distributed to all the members of the Council at the request of Ismet, who asks that the Council act to ensure respect for the decision it has previously reached.

WAHABIS ADVANCE THEIR POSITION.

JEDDAH, Arabia, Oct. 13. The invading Wahabi forces which have been threatening the security of Mecca, the chief shrine of the Islam world, have advanced from their position some distance from the city and have taken a position astride the route from Jeddah to the fort of Mecca and Mecca itself. It was announced to-day by the President of the Council of Notables here. This move by the Wahabis has restricted communication and the movement of supplies between Mecca and Jeddah.

AVOIDING CONTESTS BETWEEN LIBERAL AND CONSERVATIVE.

LONDON, Oct. 13. Apprehension of another era of Labor Government has driven the other parties to an accommodation that all appeals in the past have failed to accomplish, namely the avoidance as far as possible of three cornered contests over Parliamentary seats to minority candidates. The headquarters of the Conservatives and Liberal parties officially disavow that any such accommodation has been arranged, and assert that anything of the kind if it exists is the work of local election originators. Nevertheless it clearly indicates that good understanding, and this is seen in the Unionist predictions already enumerating the large number of Labor seats which are expected to be captured in London and elsewhere by the avoiding of triangular contests. The

first fruits of this understanding appeared to-night in the withdrawal of the Unionist candidate at Paisley, leaving H. H. Aquith, the Liberal, with a straight fight against the Labour alone. Similarly in the Trade-union district of Glasgow, the Unionist candidate has withdrawn and the Liberal nomination has been left to contest against Thos. Henderson, the Labour candidate. The withdrawal of Conservative or Liberal candidates have been effected in other constituencies in accordance with local exigencies, and should the process be continued it will bring about a complete change in the election prospects making any fair prediction of results quite impossible.

No Change in Immigration Restrictions

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—(By Canadian Press)—Despite much complaint against the drastic nature of the new immigration law which was passed by the last session of Congress, there is no prospect of its relaxation. This is the opinion of Representative Albert Johnson of the state of Washington, who is chairman of the House Immigration Committee.

Representative Johnson says there is more or less smuggling of immigrants across the Canadian and Mexican borders, but he does not think there is any more than usual. In fact, he believes smuggling under the new law and with an increased force of inspectors and agents along the border has been made more difficult. He pointed out to-day that under the new law the burden of proof is on a person entering the country to show he has been lawfully admitted. He can be apprehended in this country by any time and place and unless he can show he is lawfully in the country is subject to deportation.

Representative Johnson said immigration to this country now was almost at a standstill.

While the new quota is but 2 per cent on the basis of the 1890 census, Mr. Johnson says this is enough. He declares that in 25 years more the population of the United States will have increased 40,000,000 and will be over 150,000,000, and he believes that when this fact is considered the United States should go slowly in the admission of large numbers of immigrants. He expects no new important legislation on immigration the coming winter but does expect new naturalization legislation.

La Follette the Thorn in the Flesh

WASHINGTON — (Can Press) — Survey of the political prospects of the country over a month before the coming election, though it leaves much to be desired in the way of definite knowledge of what the voters will do, points to the selection of President Coolidge or throwing of the election into the House. On the basis of the present condition, John W. Davis, the Democratic nominee, does not seem to be a winner. The Republican leaders are strenuously claiming the election of President Coolidge as certain but the more astute of them are fearful of the strength of La Follette in the west.

Coolidge at this time has the lead over La Follette in the East. On the other hand, La Follette is strong in the West, in the country from the Mississippi to the Pacific Coast. Opinions are divided whether he will get enough electoral votes in that country to make it impossible for Coolidge to win in the electoral college and thus throw the election to the House.

What seems the most probable outcome is that the Republican organization, which is powerful and well-financed, will be able in the next month to strengthen itself enough in the west to elect Coolidge and keep the election from the House. But this is far from certain. The present scare of the Republicans may be the means of saving them, as it will arouse many to work who would not

have done so otherwise. Some Democratic leaders believe the nomination of Al Smith for Governor of New York will greatly strengthen the chances for Davis and that before long Conservative business interests will turn to Davis and away from Coolidge on the theory that the only way to keep the election out of the House is to choose Davis. This is a possibility, but the probabilities are against it. Will the La Follette strength in the

west advance or recede between now and November. Republican chiefs say it will recede but this is a guess. La Follette will soon enter on his speaking campaign and if his health permits him to carry it through he is likely to make converts to his own cause. Recession of La Follette strength cannot be taken for granted—that much is certain. Hard work by Republican organizations may overcome it in some of the close states.

Clever French Find Way to Beat Inheritance Taxes PARIS, Sept. 25 (A.P.)—A law was passed in France recently making the legal adoption of children relatively easy of accomplishment, and the new measure is resulting in loss of revenue to the government. Inheritance taxes in France are heavy. On a fortune of 1,000,000 francs a nephew who inherits must pay 400,000 francs to the state, a grand-nephew 441,000 francs, an unrelated inheritor 482,000 francs, but a child pays only 123,000 francs. Adopted children rank as real children, so it has become the habit for testators to adopt distant relatives and friends to whom they desire to leave money.

The Upward Trend in Commerce

DUNN'S REPORT OF FAILURES THIS YEAR.

A new low level for this year in number of commercial failures in the United States was reached during September, with 1,206 defaults reported to R. G. Dunn and Co. The decrease from the August total, which had marked the previous minimum, is about 14 per cent, and the decline from the high point of last January, when there were 2,108 failures, is 38 per cent. With fewer business days, a smaller number of defaults in September was to be expected; yet the reduction from the August figures is relatively the largest that has been recorded since 1917, and in two years since that time—in 1919 and 1920—eight increases were shown in September. For the third quarter of the present year, failures numbering 4,441 disclose a decrease of about 13 1/2 per cent. from those for the second quarter, which compares closely with the declines for similar periods of 1923 and 1922, and contrasts with increases in 1921 and 1920. In September and in the third quarter, more defaults occurred this year than last year, the increases being 6 and 18 per cent., respectively, but decreases are shown in each case from the totals for 1922 and 1921.

The comparison as to liabilities likewise reveals improvement during September, when an aggregate of \$34,296,276 was reported. This is about 38 per cent. below the August amount, is also considerably less than that for July, and, though materially in excess of the total for September, last year, shows decline from the figures for September of both 1922 and 1921. The exhibit for the third quarter is, however, distinctly adverse, due to the unusually large indebtedness reported in August. At \$126,263,495 the third quarter's liabilities are not only about \$5,700,000 above those for the second quarter, but are the heaviest on record for the third quarter, the previous high point being represented by the \$122,700,000 of 1921.

The monthly and quarterly reports of business failures are contrasted below for this and last year, with the liabilities for 1924; also, the totals for each quarter and the nine months.

WHO LEAVES THE COVER OFF?



A friend of mine says she wonders, if the toothpaste reactions are similar in all families. At my request she told me some of the things she meant by toothpaste reactions, and that I might inquire of my Reader Friends if they are unique or common.

Who, for instance, buys the toothpaste in your family? Is it a masculine or feminine job? This is still a mooted question in her household, my friend says, and it would be in ours if the guilty party had not been detected by the device of trying separate tubes. Produce and Provisions

(Trade Review).
Market Report—During the past few days upwards of 150 schooners have arrived in port from the outports with fish cargoes. As a result, this week has been a very busy one along the waterfront, a large number of labourers and coopers being employed at the various premises. The average cash price for Labrador fish is \$6.30 per quintal. In a few cases \$9.00 was paid for No. 1, though the general figure is \$8.50. Cod oil is \$14.00 per ton and it is generally thought this will be the highest paid for the season.

Cod Oil—A fair enquiry was noted but apparently there is little disposition among buyers to stock up. All sales reported were of such limited quantities that were there any larger supply available prices would certainly be greatly reduced. At the present time the market remains very steady and we see no prospect for much change as there is certainly no large supply in this country after such a poor fishery.

Cod Liver Oil—The outlook for refined oil is all right but the trouble is to get the price. There is no difficulty to sell all the cod liver oil we can make, but while Norway has such a large surplus stock there is no possibility of getting any advance sufficient to compensate the refiner in paying wages and cost of manufacturing over and above the price obtainable for common cod oil for industrial purposes.

Flour—The wheat market has been advancing rapidly and we are certainly in sight of ten dollar flour. Manitoba wheat sold this year around one dollar per bushel and has touched one dollar and sixty cents per bushel this week. It is reported that notwithstanding the splendid reports of the crops that now when thrashing gives actual results it is seen that a considerable quantity of wheat has been frosted. This will reduce the quantity of milling considerably. Speculators considers this justified a further advance in price and the exceedingly good demand from Europe has had a very stimulating effect on the market.

Apples—We take the following clipping from one of the leading Canadian papers: "One of the cleanest apple crops ever gathered is now being picked, says the chief horticulturist of British Columbia." This is particularly true of the McIntosh Red which delights thousands of children and grown-ups every year. The apple crop of the famous Okanagan Valley is only 65 per cent. of last year owing to the extreme dry weather experienced, but this has had no deteriorating effect on the quality of these apples, which are of splendid quality.

From Labrador to Piccadilly

Pioneers, like great soldiers and sailors, are rarely orators, and much of Dr. William Grenfell's speech, delivered with extraordinary rapidity at the Overseas League luncheon at the Criterion yesterday, was lost in the rear of Piccadilly.

However, he gave us some facts and ideas of startling interest, and one felt the sincerity of this splendid doctor who, for sheer love of humanity, has spent thirty-two years in far-off Labrador, when he could have made a fortune in his profession had he stayed in London.

I was particularly interested in Dr. Grenfell's remarks about the effect of climate and environment on character.

Like Johannes Jensen, the Danish author, he believes that the virile races of the world come out of the cold countries.

Where is Labrador?

Considering the historic romance of the Labrador mission, now known as the Grenfell Association—it has an international board—there is a surprising ignorance about this great district in Britain's oldest colony.

Dr. Grenfell told us that a few days ago he met an educated man who thought that Labrador was an island in the Gulf of Mexico.

Lord Morris, a former Premier of Newfoundland, who presided at the luncheon, enjoyed this joke immensely, so did Mr. Robert Watson, a former secretary of the colony, now a director of the Grenfell Association. The Land of No Doles.

What a pity no member of the Government was present to hear how they solve the dole problem in Labrador. When a fisherman is down and out, the Grenfell Association sometimes lends him fifty dollars, but these wonderful folk don't accept charity, and if they can't pay back cash, they do it in work, or kind.

America, too, has played a big part in the work. Dr. Grenfell told of a famous eye specialist, Dr. Joseph Andrews, who, fifteen years ago, was about to retire to his home in California, but changed his mind when he realized that his services were still needed.

Now he is an old man, but every year he goes to Labrador, and still operates skillfully.—Daily Graphic, Sept. 27.

Cambridge Refuses Women Admission

There are still Dons left at Cambridge who belong to the old order and have never married.

Restrictions Here.

"There are more restrictions in universities on this side. In Oxford and Cambridge things are freer. Here attendance at lectures is compulsory. At Oxford and Cambridge you can work or not and attend lectures as you choose, although now most under-graduates see that they are foolish if they do not work. Again, university authorities here allude to the under-graduates as their 'boys.' In Oxford and Cambridge, even if it is a fiction, they are spoken of as men.

"Cambridge is the last stronghold against the tide of femininity," Mr. Sparrow stated. "Oxford has surrendered, and women now have equal privileges with men, attending the same lectures by right. But Cambridge stands out." is the opinion of Mr. Sparrow. "The under-graduates here splendid buildings and a fine tradition of their own, and are content with things as they are, in his opinion.

Not Bigoted.

Cambridge's attitude is not one of sheer bigotry, however, Mr. Sparrow pointed out. The demand for equal rights with the men does not come from the women under-graduates, who are quite satisfied with things as they are, in his opinion.

"Some disgruntled women Dons who want equal rights are the ones who put forward the demands, not the under-graduates," is the opinion of Mr. Sparrow. "The under-graduates here splendid buildings and a fine tradition of their own, and are content with things as they are," he says.

"Cambridge numbers mostly Conservatives among its ranks," according to Mr. Sparrow. "There are 800 members in the University Conservative Club and about 350 each in the Liberal and Labor clubs. Cambridge is very proud of Baldwin, who is a Cambridge man."

Cambridge Team.

The Cambridge team is composed of R. A. Butler, ex-president of the Cambridge Union, Pembroke; A. P. Marshall, president of the Union, Caius College; and J. W. S. Sparrow, secretary of the Union and president of Cambridge Law Society. Already the team has debated with Bates College, St. Francis Xavier and Dalhousie. From Montreal they go to Toronto.

In the United States they will meet fourteen universities.

Cambridge Refuses Women Admission

Will Not Agree to Concessions Granted by Oxford—Old Order Changes.

Differences between universities on this side of the Atlantic and historic Cambridge where Dons, until fifty years ago, were not allowed to marry, were stated recently by J. W. G. Sparrow, of Trinity Hall, Cambridge, member of the Cambridge Debating team, which will engage McGill University in debate at a mock parliament.

"On this side of the Atlantic universities appear much more business-like, with all the appearance of a business house," Mr. Sparrow said. "There is an atmosphere of work, of getting things done and of dispatch. In Cambridge there is a medieval atmosphere. 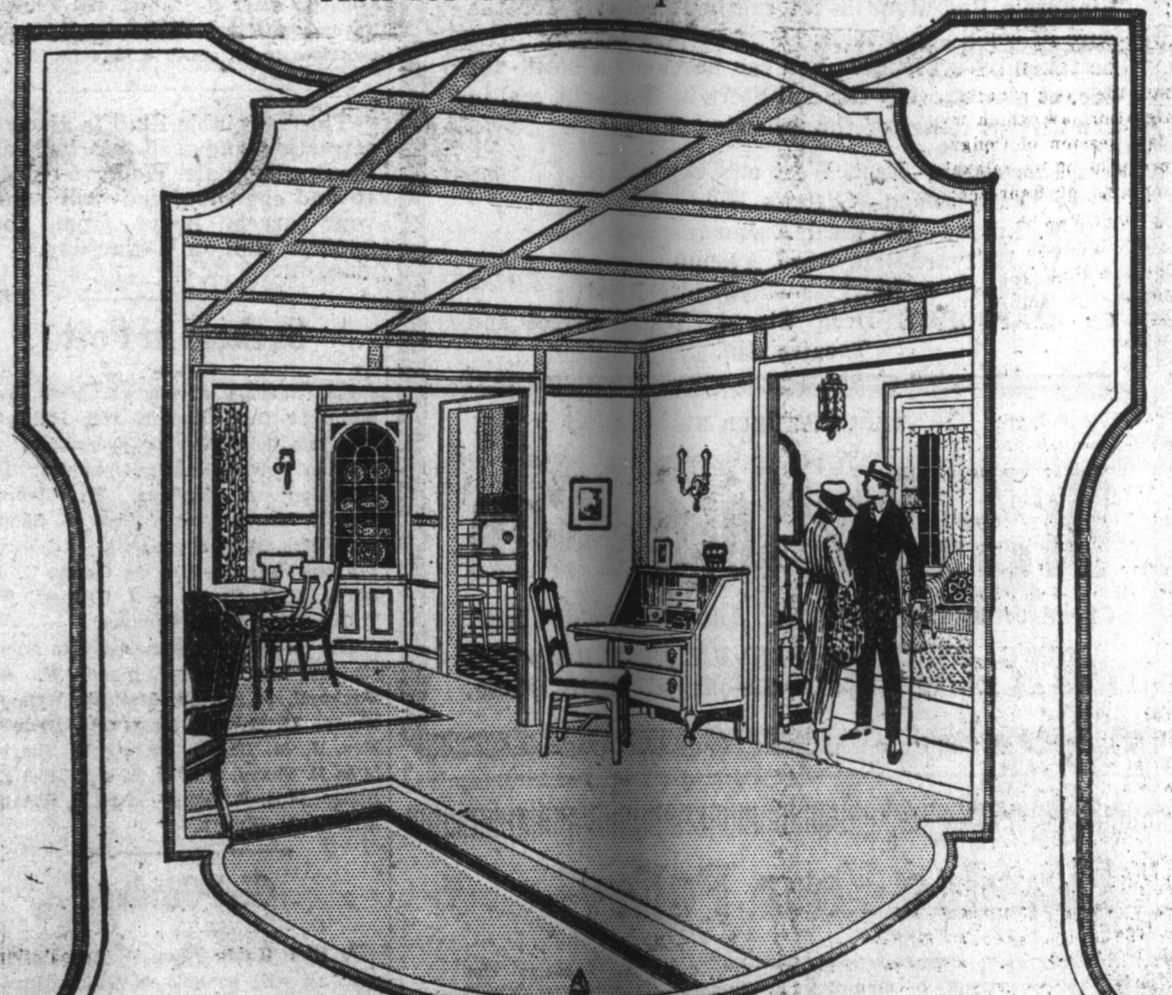

Nfld. Poultry Association

The October meeting was held last night at the Board of Trade. Lettices were received from Messrs. W. K. Chaney, Grand Falls; James Pike, St. John's; and Judge Froehlich, of Antigonish, Honorary Members. Mr. Samuel Abbott, of Musgrave Harbor, offered a quantity of finely ground mussel shells for sale. The Association decided to admit light Barr'd Plymouth Rock birds in the same class as dark Barr'd birds. The president reported that a gentleman who had recently visited the fall fairs at Fredericton, N.B., St. John, Pictou, Antigonish, and Charlottetown, reports that the Newfoundland show is much better arranged and the quality of birds much above the Canadian average. The local show is greatly superior in every way. His Excellency kindly forwarded a clipping on Poultry Culture taken from the "Advertiser" which was read to the meeting by the President. The weekly report of the Nova Scotia laying contest showed that a pen of Barr'd Rocks, owned by a Newfoundland, Mr. Douglas Thomas, (formerly of St. John's, who owns the farm at Truro where Mr. Jack Bell did some training) is leading with 1,098 eggs to Oct. 1st, while a pen of white Leghorns is second with 1,095 eggs. As there are only five birds in a pen this is wonderful work for eleven months. Secretary McCarter reports that his April hatched White Leghorn pullets are laying since September 29th. The following gentlemen have been elected as an Executive Committee, to arrange the 12th Annual Exhibition, to be held in the C.L.B. Armoury on Nov. 26, 27, and 28. The President, Messrs. W. D. McCarter, Show Secretary Otto Ruseh, P. S. Morrissey, John Duff, Stephen Emberly, and Stanley White. It is likely Judge J. P. Landry or Judge Warrington will pay a special visit to make the awards.

It was decided, in order to encourage the breeders of the silver fox industry to offer them, free of charge, the use of the Gymnasium, and to award prize ribbon. The Association also decided to offer another special room downstairs to the breeders of Newfoundland dogs, and it is hoped to award a championship silver cup for the best display. It is hoped to secure two veterinary surgeons and a good judge of fox fur to act as judges for both of these classes. Permission was given Spencer Club to run a refreshment booth at the Exhibition and they will be asked to cater for the annual dinner, November 26th. This year's show promises to be another success.

Not Fair to West End

Editor Evening Telegram,
Dear Sir,—I wish to bring under the notice of the Municipal Council a public grievance that the people of the West End labor under at present, and feel convinced that the Council, in their wishes, will have the matter rectified as quickly as possible.

For many years there was a public closet near the Gas House in this portion of the district. The Council had it removed several times, placed it further off towards the river. Also when the laborers were employed breaking rocks, when the business was completed, they removed the sheds, which was right enough, but they also removed the closets, which was entirely wrong. To be brief, Mr. Editor, as it stands at present, there is not a public convenience, in the shape of a closet, from the Mill Bridge to Rogerson's Cove in St. John's West. Many of the houses have no modern improvements, and the inconvenience suffered by the people should be evident to the members of the Municipal Council. It would be only necessary for one or two of the Councillors to visit this portion of the town to see the absolute necessity for the erection of at least two of these public closets, and I feel safe in saying that now the matter has been brought under the notice of the Council it will not be necessary for me to refer to it again—and the grievance will be done away with by the erection of the closets, which will not be a great drag on the resources of the Council.

2,000 Miles Under the Sea

Submarine K26, the largest underwater craft in the British Navy, has just completed a 20,000-mile voyage, the longest ever made by a submarine. Though the voyage lasted eight months, officers and crew lived aboard the submarine throughout the whole cruise without any assistance from a parent ship. Everything that was required was carried in the submarine itself.

This notable feat carries one back to the pioneer experiments in submarine navigation made in America at the end of the eighteenth century. What would the men who made them, or the first Napoleon, who also showed considerable interest in the subject, have thought of the K26?
Even Charles Brun, who built the first mechanically-propelled submarine in France, in 1863, had probably no idea of the tremendous future which was to open up before the new invention.
