Robert McNair Tells How British Columbia Law Benefits Province

Vancouver, Feb. 18.—Robert McNair might almost be called the shingle king of Canada. He is now chiefly interested in the erection of the biggest shingle mill in the world, being the principle owner in four modern mills on the Puget Sound. When Mr. McNair talks shingles he talks as a true prophet, for he has the whole shingle situation of British Columbia at his finger ends. Mr. McNair was asked by the Colonist correspondent this morning if the rumors regarding the enormous demand for British Columbia shingles in the United States were correct. He said it certainly was correct. As he was interested across the line, he would prefer not to speak from a continental standpoint, but from a purely business standpoint. He would, therefore, state that it was due to the act of the legislature in prohibiting the export of logs to the States that the shingle industry existed. The mills that control the situation on the coast are seven or eight of them, and the mills that produce the shingles are also in the hands of a few men. Ottawa, Feb. 19.—There was an interesting discussion in the House of Commons today on the subject of the Clayton-Bulwer treaty and Alaska boundary. The question was brought up by Mr. Bourassa, who moved for papers. These the Premier said could not be brought down, as negotiations were still pending. Mr. Bourassa then launched out into a tirade against the home government for sacrificing the interests of Canada at the time the Clayton-Bulwer treaty was abrogated. At the very least the home authorities might have insisted upon the reference of the Alaska boundary question to arbitration. Sir Wilfrid Laurier would not discuss the question. He did not admit the British policy on this continent, but thought we should endeavor to reach a settlement by peaceful means. Mr. R. J. B. Bourassa insisted that the government should press for a settlement of the boundary question, as the longer it was delayed the more difficult it became to secure settlement. Mr. Gourley, who was sick of the British policy on this continent, thought he would go to the States, personally to fight for Canadian rights. He would show the blockheads of the colonies that they could not better away the rights of British subjects. Sir Wilfrid Laurier told Colonel Hughes that foreign consuls are still present over their consulates in Canada. The Liberal members have been told they have raised up a ping-pong table in one of the rooms of the Commons.

Treadgold Concession

Rights Which Are Granted the Syndicate by Dominion Government

Intercolonial Railway and Darroge Discussed by the Liberal Caucus

Ottawa, Feb. 18.—The Treadgold concession in the Yukon gives the company the right to locate hydraulic claims on any ungranted portion of the Klondike and its tributaries and the sole right to pump water and distribute it to the miners. It is claimed the concession, which runs for 20 years, does not interfere with existing mining or water privileges. The company is bound to supply at least 1,000 inches of water by July 1, 1905, half of which quantity must be available for other miners, with a maximum of \$1 per inch. It is maintained, however, that this clause has been altered to make the maximum charge 25 cents. By next December the company must spend \$250,000. The Liberal caucus this morning was presided over by Mr. Edwards, M.P. for Russell. As anticipated, the Intercolonial railway administration was the principal topic of discussion. Some of the Eastern Quebec members and from the Maritime provinces were particularly wrathful over the way in which the concession was given that the minister would be better. The House only sat a few minutes, the government having no business ready. The Senate is still discussing the address. J. E. Leonard, the new member for Laval, is appointed Conservative whip from Quebec.

Treadwell Mine Suffers By Fire

Hundred Men at Bottom of Shaft Have Difficulty in Escaping

Compressor Plant and Part of the Stamp Mill Destroyed

Seattle, Wash., Feb. 18.—Fire started in the famous Treadwell mine on Douglas Island, near Juneau, about 5 o'clock on the evening of last Tuesday. The fire, which started in the shaft, spread rapidly, and in a few minutes had reached the compressor building, the Mexican shaft, the tramways, and part of the 100-ton stamp mill. Over 100 miners were at work near the bottom of the shaft when it was caught fire. The shaft was choked with smoke, and volumes of it found its way into the workings where the miners were. There were several narrow escapes from suffocation, but the men finally escaped through a tunnel to the old pit, where they were rescued. WELSHMEN IN PATAGONIA

Mr. Chamberlain Receives Deputation Favoring Removal of Settlers to Canada

Toronto, Feb. 18.—The Evening Telegram's London cable says: "A deputation of Welshmen waited on Mr. Chamberlain today to ask that the government provide transport for the removal of Welshmen to Canada, a number of their countrymen and their families, who had emigrated to Patagonia, and desired a change of settlement. Mr. Chamberlain explained that the reception of the deputation was first mentioned, he understood the Welsh in Patagonia wished to emigrate to South Africa. Had this been the case, arrangements could easily have been made, but he was helpless to render them assistance to emigrate to Canada. He suggested that the deputation should call on Lord Salisbury, or that a subscription be started in the United Kingdom to raise the necessary funds of £10,000, or that the Canadian government might increase their liberal offer of £1 per head. The deputation was greatly disappointed. Lord Stratford was not present." It is reported that the Elder Dempster company will offer steamship transport to the Welsh settlers to Canada.

ROSEBERY'S STAND IS APPROVED

National Liberal Federation Declare for Unconditional Surrender of Boers

The resolution was carried by a large majority. Lord Rosebery, who presided, warmly welcomed the resolution and called on the Liberal members of the House of Commons to support the Liberal leader, Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, in his advocacy of this policy.

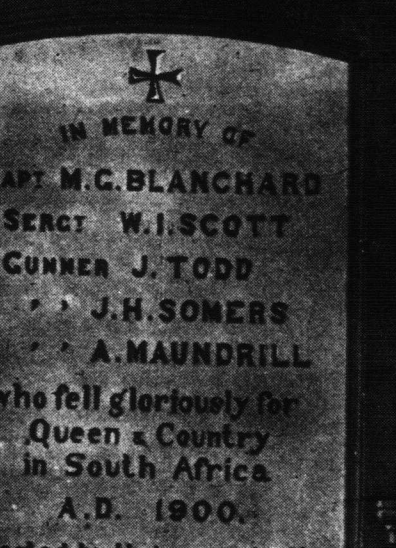

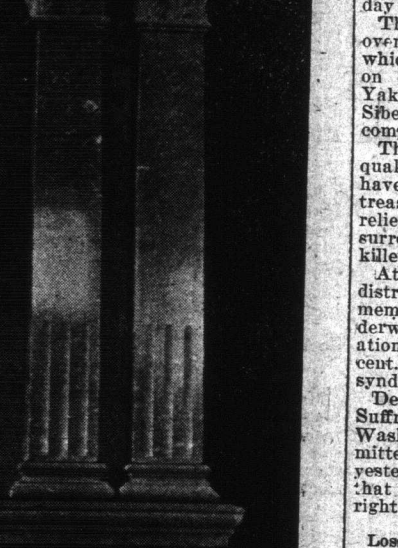
