CARRY IT TO THE POLICE COURT

In his message to the council yesterday Mayor Kennedy pointed out that the result of the survey bill passed at the tail end of the session, would be to decrease our taxes by \$70,000 a year. In consequence of the decreased assessment made by the bill, the rate for the current year will be higher than heretofore. The injustice of the survey bill is being talked of on all sides. Such a clamor will be raised against it that the new code of it will be put in force. Indeed, we are led to believe that the unjust provisions contained in the act will not bear argument in a court of law. It is certainly contrary to the law of a country which professes to be a democracy to pre-arrange that the man who has two acres of land should be assessed less than his neighbor who has but half an acre.

THE INNOCENT LAGER BEER

Major Kennedy Reviews the Assessment Legislation—Was It an Injustice to the City?—Proposed That Tax-Collectors Act as Bailiffs and Finishing By-laws Passed—Fletcher's Resolutions. The City Council had a three-hour session yesterday afternoon, the principal feature of which was animated discussion of many resolutions. These were against a liquor license for the Ferry Company Hotel at the Island; for information as to assessments and exemptions; and the legality of two years' assessments, the rating of premises under street sidewalks, the appointment of a municipal auditor, and the appointment of tax-collectors may act as bailiffs, the railway crossing at Lansdowne-avenue, distribution of dog and finishing by-laws, West End car facilities.

Liquor License at the Island

H. C. Hammond, in a letter on behalf of the Toronto Ferry Company's application for a liquor license, stated that the Island residents were in favor of the application, the granting of which would increase the tax on liquor drinking at the Island.

W. H. Lockhart Gordon, secretary of the Island Residents' Association, protesting against the application and asking that the City Solicitor oppose the same before the council.

Ald. Davies thought the license commissioners were the proper parties to whom the license should be referred.

Ald. Scott moved, seconded by Ald. Oliver, that the council request the license commissioners to grant a license to the Ferry Company at the Island and that the City Solicitor be instructed to appear in opposition to such license.

Samuelson thought it desirable to have a report from the license commissioners as to the consumption of liquor at the Island.

Ald. Jolliffe strongly opposed any license.

Ald. Leslie objected to the council interfering in the matter. The Legislature had provided the machinery for granting a license to the Island, and it should be left to the license commissioners to decide whether it should be granted or not.

The council had just as much right to say that the license should not be granted as the license commissioners had to say that it should.

Ald. Oliver specially objected to a liquor license at the Island, which he considered to be the resort of women and children.

Ald. Davies: How has prohibition succeeded at the Island? There are more fines for illicit selling there than in any other part of the city.

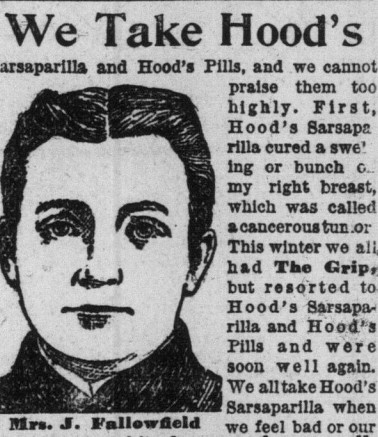

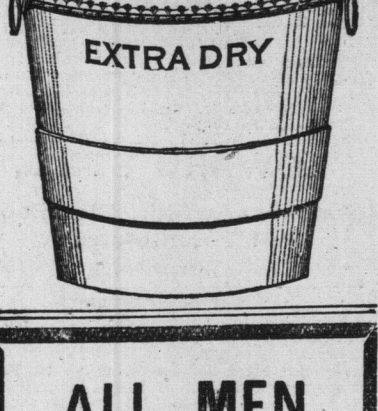
