The representatives agreed to have the property to come in on the pole of the land paying in full for local improvements. A recommenda-tion will be made to council. Chief Thompson urged the board to ministe consideration of amending the bylaws of the fire department bene-fit association, as several firemen wish

Controller McCarthy explained that the main amendment would be that the main amendment would be that men who retire after less than 30 years' service would have their allowance based on the amount of their salary three years previous to retiring. Mayor Hocken declared that a report of an actuary will have to bet obtained before definite action could be taken. This was approved and an actuarial report will be secured. Determined to assist as much as possible in providing work in the city

possible in providing work in the city possible in providing work in the city throout the winter, the board decided to accept a higher tender for pipe from a local foundry than from a foundry in the United States. This pipe will cost nearly \$100,000, and the tender accepted is \$2,400 higher than the lowest the lowest. "The city has been fleeced by a lot

"The city has been fleeced by a lot of incompetents," said Controller Church, referring to the report of Judge Winchester upon the investiga-tion into the contracts and accounts of the board of education. "The fleec-ing was thru the incompetence of the head of the building department. Where is the judge's report?" No Copy for Board. "I haven't received a copy yet," Mayor Hocken stated, "and I don't know the contents."

know the contents." "Why did the judge hand his report to the board of education instead of this board first?" Controller Church demanded.

demanded. "I am surprised at the report going to the board of education first," Mayor Hocken replied. "As soon as we get a copy of the report we can ask our legal department who we can proceed against, if the city has been fleeced." Commissioner Forman reported that a piece of city property on Bay and Front streets which has been expropri-ated by the Dominion Government, cannot be turned over to the govern-ment before \$77,000 is paid for release from the sixteen year lease to the G. T.R. The property is valued at \$160,-000, and the city will get only \$83,000 out of the property. The government has agreed to erect public buildings on the property. The matter was sent on to council.
