mine workers as a whole, and in con-sequence imposing upon the public, a total average increase in excess of the total average increase in the cost of living, because if this course be adopt-ed, the result would be that the total increased burden placed upon the min-ing industry will be far in excess of the increase in the cost of living. If this principle were applied in industries gen-erally, it is obvious that the resulting cost would be passed along to the gen-eral public and the increased wages would increase in a rapid spiral, taking as a minimum the percentage of increase in the cost of living. In the long run this would add many new and serious burdens to the cost of living of the en-tire public and would fall more injuri-ously upon the working classes than upon any others.
