Looks like war in the Coal Regions

Operators' Proposal is Rejected, and Mine Workers Demand Full Settlement or None - Per Capita Tax for Strike Fund Voted On.

Indianapolis, Ind., Feb. 1.—Rejection of the counter proposal of the coal operators of the central competitive district by an almost unanimous vote of the national convention of the United Mine Workers, today created a situation which, in the opinion of the officials of the miners' organization, will result in a disruption of the joint agreement and possibly a great strike of organized labor throughout the country.

Immediately following the rejection of the operator's proposal, the national convention set about providing means for accumulating a strike fund of \$5,000,000 in addition to the amount now on deposit in international district and sub-district treasuries of the miners' organization.

Looks Like War. The subject was brought up by Secretary and Treasurer W. B. Wilson, who said in view of the fact that he believed that the rejection of the operator's proposal meant a strike or an industrial war after a month or two, he informed the delegates that the funds of the international treasury could not be spent by depositing in a bank.

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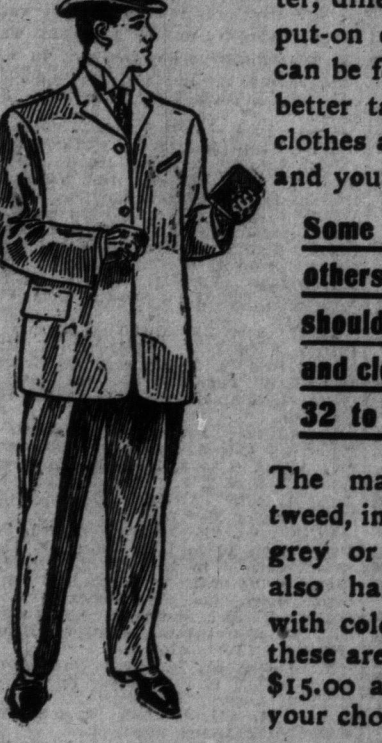

Joint Agreement BETWEEN THE Life Insurance Companies Doing Business in Canada

We, the undersigned Chief Executive Officers of Life Insurance Companies Doing Business in Canada, having regard to the fact that the status of our business is being lowered owing to the introduction of practices which are calculated to bring the whole system of Life Insurance into disrepute,

- 1. The practice of "Twisting Policies," i.e., inducing persons already assured to surrender, or those who have been accepted to refrain from accepting Policies applied for, with a view of persuading them to join another office, is entirely opposed to the interests of honest management, and will be regarded as disqualifying any Agent for further employment by any Company party hereto.
2. The issue by Agents or others of Statements by way of comparison respecting rival Institutions will not be allowed. The Companies parties hereto will not issue any comparisons or printed or written literature of any kind for Agents use or for public distribution, whether marked private or not, without furnishing copies to the Managers of all Companies in any way mentioned therein, and each Company agrees to put its imprint on all literature published or carrying out of the spirit of this agreement.
3. Engaging Agents or Canvassers while they are still in the employ of another Office is contrary to ordinary honorable business etiquette, and leads to unsuccessful Agents obtaining Advances contemporaries in Life Assurance. PUBLIC-OWNED HIGHWAYS WHY THEY ARE NECESSARY

Chicago Advocate Declares Municipal Ownership to Be a Practical Proposition.

John Z. White, of Chicago, a far-famed single tax lecturer, gave an address on "Public Ownership of Public Utilities" at the Empire Club luncheon yesterday. He was pleased to have the privilege of addressing an assemblage of Canadian gentlemen, even though a high tariff wall had been erected between the countries, for along with himself, millions of Americans were of the opinion that the Canadian people were the best.

"A people that does not control its own highways," he said, "is not entirely self-governing. Highways are an absolute necessity of civilized life. Their establishment and maintenance is necessary by acts of civil governments. Highways must be established by law. The primary question of public ownership was in the belief in self-government. No man on earth is competent to govern me as well as I govern myself."

The great objection that was made to public ownership was ordinarily an assertion that it would do much on the doctrine of Socialism, and under the application of the doctrine the employees in public offices of public utilities would dominate the political situation in order to live a civilized life people.

must perform certain acts as a unit or in a communal aspect. They must by law establish police power, that the nation may be safeguarded. Some form of land tenure must be had to secure peaceful occupation. It was found that most progress was made if people subjoined their property to a common ownership, to an interchange of trade products which involved a highway, and highways could be established by voluntary association but always by the community as a whole. If one country citizens were given legal authority, the principle of privilege was injected.

into the law. If any man was given the right to exercise police power he received a privilege the same being applied in power in land or power in highways. This was now the existing condition. IMPROVING NEWS SERVICE BETWEEN EAST AND WEST

Calgary Editor Argues That Canada's Interests Demand Some Changed Conditions.

The formation of a Canadian Associated Press was a subject earnestly discussed by the Canadian Press Association yesterday afternoon. The proposition was generally favored, the judgment of a number of speakers being that there was vast room for improvement in the domestic service now supplied daily papers of Canada.

The sentiment was strong in favor of an improved news service between the east and west. Mr. Atkinson, publisher of The Star, John Ross Robertson, proprietor of The Telegram, and a number of other well-known newspaper men engaged in the discussion. Col. G. G. Porter, secretary of the Daily Herald of Calgary, was present, having been invited especially to give the western view of the proposed news service.

Mr. Atkinson was sure the C.P.R. was anxious and willing to receive suggestions for an improvement. He pointed out that he was not criticizing the company's service, but merely wanted to promote a friendly improvement for the mutual benefit of both publisher and subscriber. The substance of the discussion was that it was perhaps undesirable from every point of view to have so many small news distributing associations spring up in Canada, in none of which the publishers had any administrative or anything to say.
