Ontario Power Company Will Contract at \$2 H.P. Less Than Was First Estimated Possible

FARMERS FEAR TO SEND SUPPLIES OF MILK

Yesterday's Shipments Adequate, But Small Dealers May Not Hold Out.

The milk situation is in a decidedly complicated condition. It is claimed by city dealers that agents of the Producers' Association are terrorizing the farmers and preventing them from sending supplies to the city. Mr. Lock of the Grimsby Dairy, who was out Woodbridge way yesterday, is responsible for the statement that threats are being made of violent measures to keep the producers in line. Meantime the supply available in the city yesterday was adequate. There was no story of famine, but the outcome of the strike may be a split in the ranks of the dealers, unless the big men in the business can devise some means of helping the smaller firms along. The big dairies have sent out purchasing agents to distant parts, and are getting large consignments of milk, but the small firms cannot do this. The situation now depends upon the smaller dealers. If they are content to wait until the purchasing agents can send in enough to satisfy everybody the farmers may be beaten, but if the small firms get impatient and break away in a body, the reverse may happen. Supply at Woodbridge. It was nearly midnight when J. H. Lock of the Grimsby Dairy got back to town with his team load of milk. Early in the day his agent had telephoned him that he could get milk at Woodbridge, but that the farmers were afraid to team it in. Mr. Lock decided to go for it himself and took measures to protect himself from violence. "There's lots of milk around Woodbridge," said Mr. Lock after his return, "and I got all I could bring." The farmers don't know what to do with it. They have it in wash tubs and basins and anything they can get to hold it. "They haven't any pigs or calves to feed it to, and they are all sick of the situation and anxious to sell. Two men even offered to give the milk away, and accept anything I earned to give."

Ontario's One-Horse System of Railways

The most popular thing, or rather the thing taken up by the World that meets with the quickest public recognition is our exposure of the one-horse administration of the railway transportation system of Ontario from Montreal, instead of from Toronto, the living centre of that business. Montreal administration of Ontario's railway system can be seen in the Yonge-street bridge, the delayed Union Station, the neglect to cure the Scarborough grades, the crowding of the Esplanade with thru business that could go to better advantage to the north of the city, the late hour at which out-going trains are despatched, etc., etc. There are few late trains into the city; you cannot even get from Hamilton to Toronto after 9.10 in the evening. Passengers from New York the night before do not get into Toronto before 11 next day, instead of at 8 a.m. The Wellington, Grey and Bruce country is badly served with slow trains, unnecessary changes and delays, old cars and insufficient car mileage. Said one ex-employee of one of the big lines: "When we used to refer a question from Toronto to head office we'd get back a wire, 'Can't do it,' or 'Nonsense,' or 'Will be up next week,' or 'Come down.'" They always turned it down and some Scotch and soda at the same time. Montreal railway administration has a Scotch and soda way of doing things. If one of the big men comes to Toronto he comes for a day in a private car, goes to the club and leaves in the evening with a promise that he'll take up the matter when he gets home. That ends it. The passenger departments, the sleeping, dining and parlor car departments, the handling of traffic should all be in the hands of a chief of staff in Toronto who is supreme and who makes it his one business to serve Ontario and Toronto. The needs of the passenger traffic in Ontario are entirely different from what they were fifteen or twenty years ago. Altogether the actual population of the province has not so greatly increased, local passenger traffic has grown more than 400 per cent.—an increase largely made up by the enormous expansion of passenger traffic in and out of Toronto. The service that was adequate for passenger traffic between small communities 20 years ago is absolutely insufficient to meet the conditions created by the wonderful growth of Toronto; hence intelligent railway management would not only have provided additional mileage and more trains and better equipment, but it would have completely revolutionized the schedules and service of the roads. Travel has now become a daily business for thousands of people and the occasional travel has been stimulated and directed to a common centre. Not only do people travel from Toronto through the province in all directions, but a steady stream of passenger traffic flows from the smaller towns and farms and villages, to the metropolis. We have pointed out that the C.P.R. and the G.T.R. have utterly failed to recognize the growth of Toronto or to stimulate the enormous passenger-traffic of Ontario. Between these two lines, in this province, there is neither competition nor co-operation. Among the most evident things which they have neglected to do respecting passenger traffic in and out of Toronto may be mentioned: (1) This enormous traffic has not been recognized or stimulated by any reduction in fare. The same fare was charged from Kingston to Toronto in 1906 that was charged by the G.T.R. in 1886. Travel to and from Toronto pays charges precisely the same fare as to and from any other point. Suburban fares, combination tickets and the various concessions that are extended by the railways to other cities are unknown to us. Occasionally it is true that the people of Toronto, in common with the rest of the province, may avail themselves of a cheap excursion. These excursion rates are usually one fare and one-third (2 cents a mile), but the people are crowded in the cars like herrings and all travelers on the train are subjected to the discomfort, even those who are not excursionists. (2) The early trains elsewhere provided for the convenience of large cities are not provided here. Often the first train goes out at 9 a.m. If there is an earlier train it is a slow train which is soon overtaken by the train leaving an hour later. There are some thru trains that stop at more stations than others, but there is no suburban express service or no suburban service in the true sense of the word. (3) The schedules are not made up so as to encourage and permit the people to come to Toronto, transact business and return to their homes on the same day and to permit Toronto business men to visit the various towns in the province, transact business and return at once. There is no reason why the round trip to Ottawa should take more than one day. People along the line of the G.T.R. go to Ottawa via Brockville. From Brockville to Ottawa they must travel by the C.P.R. There is no attempt to connect trains; on the contrary, there is an effort made to prevent connections. One way of making this trip is to get out at Brockville at 3 o'clock a.m., and wait until 6.30. Westbound G.T.R. trains habitually pull out of Brockville in the night of Toronto passengers arriving from Ottawa via C.P.R. They will not wait one moment to oblige a train load of passengers. (4) Not only has there been no increase in mileage or rearrangement of schedules to meet the enormous increase in Toronto passenger traffic, but the railways generally throughout Ontario have few cars and very poor ones at that. A traveling man complained that in going the other morning from Toronto to Orillia he found the train very crowded and very much overheated. He removed his overcoat and found there was no hook by which to hang it up. He was compelled to sit upon the coat or else endure very considerable discomfort. We have referred to the G.T.R. service from Toronto to North Bruce, where there are a number of towns, including Southampton, Tara, Port Elgin, Warton, Kincardine and Owen Sound. These towns and the country about them should be reached by a short and pleasant trip from Toronto. What are the facts? A traveler leaving Toronto at 4 p.m. for any one of these places will get to Guelph at 6.30, where he is supposed to make immediate connections perhaps at 7.30. It is not uncommon to find people standing about for an hour at the station afraid to leave the premises for fear they may be left unable to learn anything about the train which they desire to take. The northbound train may come along at 7 or 7.30, and the passenger then gets on board for Palmerston. By good luck he may get into Palmerston at half-past nine o'clock and for the first time he is able to get something to eat. The delay at Palmerston varies from thirty minutes to an hour and a half and the passenger is liable to arrive at Southampton in the neighborhood of 1 a.m. Should he succeed in getting someone out of bed and transacting his business the same night he may return the next day. To do this he must get to the station at 6 a.m. and is fortunate to get his first cup of coffee at Palmerston somewhere about 9 a.m. From Palmerston he will return via Guelph, arriving in Toronto at noon. But between poor, crowded cars, delays and slow trains, he will find this trip so long, tedious, disagreeable and uncomfortable that he will never take it up again unless he is compelled to do so. Specific instances that prevail are only too apparent. Certainly it is time for the business men and the press of Toronto, and if necessary the government of Ontario, to take action which will compel these railway systems receiving the most profitable part of their business from the Province of Ontario to cease discriminating against the City of Toronto and to give adequate and something approaching an up-to-date service to the enormous passenger traffic flowing in and out of Toronto every day; a traffic that can be doubled by intelligent sympathetic local administration.

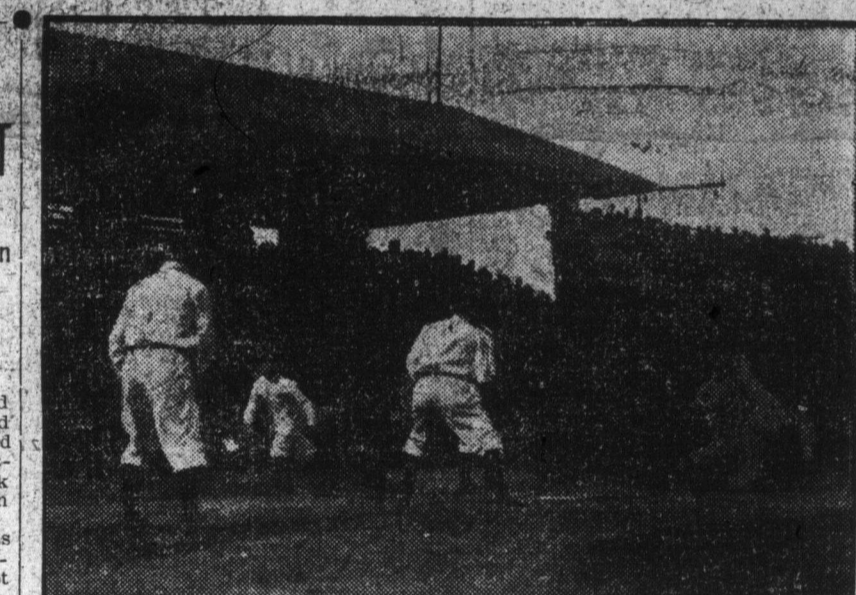

Coatsworth Fanned To Whitney's Curve

Premier, Mayor and Joe Downey All Had a Hand in Opening Baseball Season at Diamond Park Before Biggest of Opening Crowds.

Never has there been such a supple cious opening of the local baseball season as was yesterday's. With a civic reception at the city hall, an impressive parade, a crowd limited only by the accommodation of the ground and hundreds turned away, the premier of the province, the mayor of Toronto, and a member of the legislature to start things, and then a see-saw, heart-rending ten-innings game—what more could be desired, unless, perhaps, that the game had been won. But, then, it wasn't lost, as it might have been, so let the rosters be thankful and go out again to-day to cheer the Leafs on to another victory. Pat Powers, president of the Eastern League, looking genial, as is his wont, arrived in the city during the morning, and was met by Ald. J. J. Graham, chairman of the civic reception committee. The baseball magnate was escorted to the city hall, and was welcomed by the mayor, Joe Downey, M. L. A., was present on behalf of the legislature. Hon. G. F. Graham, who had been counted upon to stand at the plate to receive the premier's delivery, did not make his appearance, and Mayor Coatsworth was substituted. Welcomed by Mayor. After the group in the mayor's office had been swelled by a number of the sporting old-timers, including Ald. Sam McBride, Church, Whycock and James Hales, it was announced that the ball teams had arrived. Accordingly, the party descended to the entrance of the city hall, where a crowd of hundreds had gathered. The mayor expressed the pleasure it gave him to welcome the team home, and conveyed the wish that good, clean sport might always be the rule. President Powers promised that he would do what he could to promote clean, fast ball. The crowd cheered for Capt. Kelley, who, donning his cap, ran up the steps and promised good fast ball. He hoped that the pennant for 1907 would fly at the top of the city hall.

MUNICIPALITIES GET BARGAIN PRICES

Hydro-Power Commission Will Enter Into Provisional Contract

CITY'S RATE IS \$16.50

Terms Not for Exclusive Contract—Ten Years and Renewal.

Electric power at not more than \$16.50 per h.p. at the city limits is the basis on which contracts are to be signed in connection with the scheme of the hydro-electric power commission. With the authority of the government, the commission has decided to enter into a provisional contract with the Ontario Power Co. at a rate of \$16.40 per h.p. at the transformer station at Niagara. This will be subject to the acceptance of the formal contracts by the municipalities, about which there can scarcely be any question, now that better terms by \$2 per h.p. than previously offered by the commission are available. The commission will therefore enter into the contract with the Ontario Power Co., provided that some minor matters under discussion can be speedily arranged, and some other points more clearly defined. All this, it is anticipated, will be satisfactorily arranged in a few days, as the matters are of detail merely. The current to be contracted for is the usual alternating, 3-phase, 25-cycle current of 60,000 voltage. An agreed amount of power, with a minimum of 10,000 h.p., is to be kept available to the commission by the company at all times. Not less than three-fourths of the amount agreed upon is to be paid for monthly. If at any time the amount used exceeds three-fourths of the amount agreed upon, then the basis of payment shall be the gross amount taken for a specified period of twenty minutes during the month, or what is known as the high peak for the continuous time specified. The power will be measured by standard instruments, sealed and inspected by the contracting parties. With the minimum of 10,000 h.p. the commission will have the right to increase that amount at any time by giving 30 days' notice up to 30,000 h.p. Beyond this further increases may be made as the requirements of the commission make it necessary, on notice to be given as specified by the agreement. Ten Years' Contract. The contract will have a duration of ten years, with option of renewal for 40 years, or as long as the existing contracts between the Ontario Power Co. and the Queen Victoria Niagara Falls Park Commission remain in force. The price for the power up to 15,000 h.p. is to be \$16.40 per h.p. per annum for 24-hour power every day in the year. When the amount of power taken exceeds 25,000, the price per h.p. for the whole block is to be \$16. An over 40,000 h.p. has already been applied for by the western municipalities concerned, it may be taken for granted that the price will be figured at \$16 from the start. Right to Buy Elsewhere. The commission reserves the right to purchase power from other sources, such a provision being considered advisable on account of the necessity of having a continuous supply in case of accident. 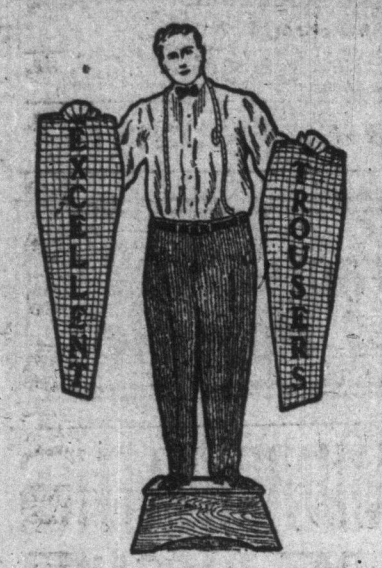

"PLAY BALL!" For hours last night the operator at The World office switchboard repeated over and over again:

Hundreds and hundreds of queries came from all parts of the city. And this interest will continue thruout the season if Toronto continues to "play good ball."

Baseball, as a commercial enterprise, is unique. Great crowds assemble to witness a game of lacrosse, but to have a lacrosse game every day in the week, and for three or four weeks in succession, would be out of the question.

Hockey can be played more frequently because crowds can attend after night, and some cities at times are "hockey-mad." Ottawa, this past winter, was a case in point. But there is no game that, year after year, can command such steady patronage as baseball. In Canada it has fairly exterminated cricket, which for centuries had been the national game of Great Britain.

There are reasons for this. The game is played in so short a time as to permit men to see it without neglecting their business or missing their dinner. It is a game full of uncertainty, the stronger team not always winning. There is no stopping to rest; no wasted effort; almost every ball that is thrown directly contributes to the final score.

FLEMING'S BAD CURVE. Manager Fleming's application to have curves put in at the intersection of Yonge and Richmond-streets should be turned down by the city engineer.

It should be laid down as a fixed rule by the city engineer that nothing but rectangular crossings should be permitted on the main thoroughfares of this city.

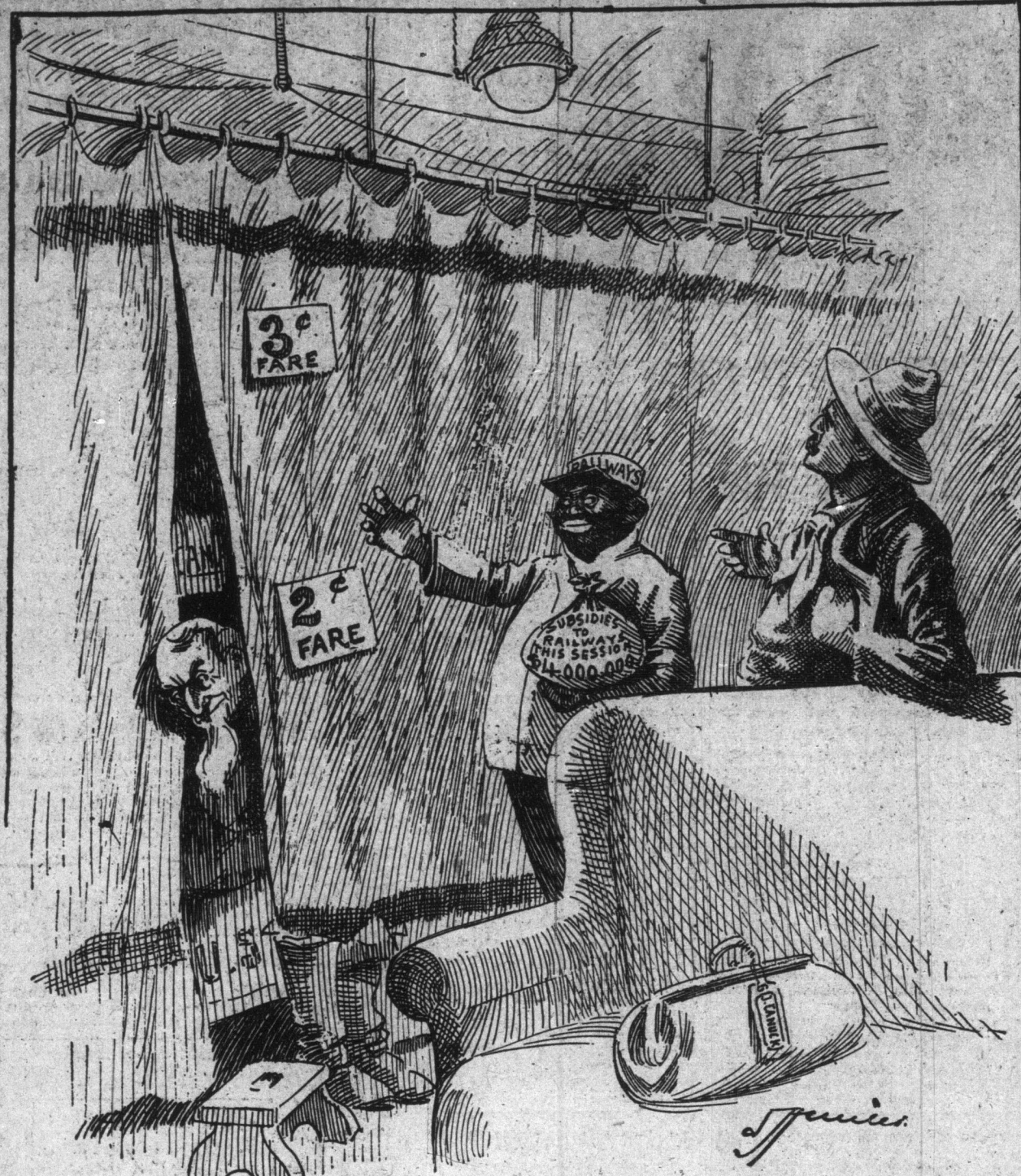

leux's successorship to the twin portfolios of post office and labor suddenly developed in the new minister a most remarkable activity. He at once assumed the laboring oar. His bill for settling labor disputes attracted world-wide attention—his postal arrangements from Great Britain and the United States, has made several nations sit up, and his activities in the politics of Quebec, while less sensational, may prove in the end no less important than the independence of Mr. Bourassa.

The labor disputes bill is now on trial in the western coal strike and while all good citizens must hope for the best, it is idle to deny that it is in no little danger of becoming ridiculous. The truth is that nothing but government operation and control can effectively guarantee the proper and efficient administration of any great public utility.

The postal changes were needed, no doubt, but have they been wisely thought out and considered? Judging from the Liberal newspapers, it would not be surprising if Mr. Lemieux would be forced to retrace his steps and agree to a change in the postal convention.

As to Quebec, it is significant that Mr. Brodeur, upon going abroad, turned over marine and fisheries to Mr. Templeman, also it is a department most intimately connected with the River St. Lawrence. Not only this, but it is an open secret that he threatened to forego his trip to England rather than transfer his department to Mr. Lemieux. As to the relations between Mr. Lemieux and his successor as solicitor-general (Mr. Bureau) there can be no manner of doubt. It is war and open war between them.

Mr. Lemieux may suffer also from the jealousy that attends the new man who is moving too fast. He has certainly gone up like a rocket. Will he remain as a fixed star in the political sky of Canadian politics?

IMPERIAL PREFERENTIAL TRADE. Altho the discussion of the question of imperial preferential trade by the assembled premiers ran its expected course it served at the same time to disclose more sharply and clearly the discordant attitude of the present British government. Its isolation was not removed by the declaration of Sir James Mackay, who officially represented India, to the effect that the interests of the great eastern dependency did not call for any change in her fiscal system.

The interests to which he referred are of course those of the British manufacturers who find in India one of their best markets and naturally dread the competition of native products. As has been repeatedly pointed out, Indian opinion favors the encouragement of home industries and in this connection it is only necessary to recall the agitation instigated by the Lancashire cotton spinners against the imposition of a duty on cotton imports for revenue purposes. In order to protect their Indian market the British government of the day compelled the levying of a countervailing duty on native goods. Did Indian opinion prevail it would be found on the side of the self-governing communities who recognize the necessity of promoting their home manufactures by a protective system.

Fire in Ruins. Fire broke out again in the ruins of the Daves Brewery, East Queen-street, at 11:14 o'clock yesterday morning. It was quickly extinguished.

There can be little doubt that the British ministry would have preferred, had the subject of imperial preferential trade been left severely alone by the pending conference. The free traders were insistent, had the conference met under Mr. Balfour's administration, that no discussion should be permitted, and, altho conditions have gone to their liking, they would rather have seen the premiers refrain from re-affirming the resolution passed at the 1902 conference. Unable to prevent their attitude towards imperial preference from going on record, Mr. Asquith attempted to diminish its effect on British public opinion by holding out hope that in other ways imperial trade relations may be improved. He specifically mentioned steamer services, commercial agencies, the reduction of the Suez Canal dues and establishing mail communication with Australasia by way of Canada, as offering possible opportunities for practical result. This he stated the more earnestly because duty had fallen to differ from the views of the other states represented. Much can doubt be done along the lines he indicated, but nothing so valuable and enduring as that accruing from the adoption of the principle of preferential trade.

Wants a Share. William G. Armstrong has begun an application for the purchase of the Toronto and Ontario Railway Co. from Thomas Crawford, Murdoch McLeod of New Lake and John McMartin of Cornwall for a consideration that he is entitled to an undivided one-sixth interest in certain mining lands in the Township of Cobalt.

False Imprisonment. William David George Dickson has issued a writ against Robert Greig of Toronto, claiming \$10,000 damages for malicious arrest and prosecution and for the false imprisonment of Dickson by Greig.

An Old Judgment. As far back as June, 1889, The Central Bank recovered a judgment for \$8317.57 against J. S. Robertson and Charles Robertson, on which a payment of \$1000 was made in December, 1905. Upon an examination of defendant, Chas. Robertson, as a judgment debtor, it was learned that he had a balance in his credit at the Imperial Bank, corner of Yonge and Queen-streets. An attaching order was granted by the master-in-chancery attaching the moneys.

Policeman's Troubles Settled. A. J. Simman, a policeman, had a falling out with a brother officer, William H. Craig, and his sister-in-law, "Cassie" Moore, over certain buildings on Euclid-avenue that the parties were interested in building. An action was begun, but matters have been arranged, and no consent order has been obtained from the court dismissing the action without costs. Craig had paid his credit at the Metropolitan Bank to remain until the trial; now Craig is allowed to deal with the money as he may be advised.

Must Stay in Jail. The application made to Chief Justice Meredith upon the return of the writ of habeas corpus at the instance of the discharge of Ross Howard, the young man accused of abducting Euphemia Wilson, the young girl in whom he is charged with seducing, J. R. Cartwright, engaged, was refused. J. R. Cartwright, deputy attorney-general, appeared for the crown.

Lis Pendens Removed. In the action brought by Joseph St. Clair Montgomery, builder, against Ernest Franklin Arnold, dentist, and his wife over an agreement to sell house No. 826 on St. George-street, an application was made to Chief Justice Meredith in chambers for an order to vacate the certificate of lis pendens filed by the defendants. The order was granted.

Appeal Allowed. The divisional court has handed out judgment in the matter of re Kemp, brought by the A.O.U.W. on the appeal from Chief Justice Falconbridge, declaring Corinne Johnson entitled to certain moneys in court, the proceeds of a certain policy issued by the A.O.U.W. to Charles B. Kemp. The appeal is allowed without costs.

WOMAN'S AUXILIARY CLOSE. Surplus of Money Voted to Various Church Needs.

Yesterday, morning and afternoon, the closing sessions of the Anglican Women's Auxiliary Convention were held in Guild Hall.

APPROVE POSTAL RATES BUT PRESSMEN ASK TIME

Resolve That Regulation Be Not Effective Till Next Year—Uniform Wrappers.

The revision of the postal relations between Canada and the United States, with respect especially to newspapers and periodicals, was discussed by the executive of the Canadian Press Association at a meeting held yesterday in the Rossin House.

The efforts of Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, postmaster-general, for the betterment of the Canadian publishers' position, were acknowledged, but while appreciating what had been done on their behalf the members of the committee were averse to having the revision sprung on them too suddenly, and the request will be forwarded to the postoffice department that the new code of relations be postponed till the beginning of next year.

The sentiment of the meeting, and incidentally the majority, if not of all, the members of the association, was crystallized in a resolution, which was unanimously adopted.

In this they placed themselves on record as being in accord with Hon. Mr. Lemieux, with respect to this adjustment of postal interchange upon an equitable basis, but inasmuch as the immediate application of the new postal rate upon short notice, and in the middle of a subscription year, had entailed much inconvenience and loss, they suggested:

(1) That the postmaster-general be strongly urged to make every possible effort to secure a postponement of the date for the coming into force of the new order until Jan. 1, 1908.

(2) That the postoffice department should furnish publishers with stamped wrappers of a size suitable for their mailing purposes at the cost of the stamps.

(3) That the domestic rate on newspapers be revised and made more favorable to the publishers.

These requests were resolved in conclusion, should be pressed upon the postmaster-general, Mr. Lemieux, by a delegation consisting of J. C. Clark, president; H. B. Dally, J. F. MacKay and C. W. Young.

It was also decided at the meeting that a souvenir containing historical sketches of the entire press of Canada, should be issued at the time of the next annual convention of the association in commemoration of the fiftieth anniversary of the organization, which occurs next year.

power and the territory to be served are among the points not yet definitely settled.

It is probable that some of the other companies will avail themselves of the opportunity thus afforded of supplying part of the power which may be required.

Penalties are provided for in case of non-compliance with the terms and conditions of the contract are based on a tender submitted to the companies by the commission at a certain time ago, when a request was made for the submission of the figures. The offer of the Ontario Power Co. was the most favorable.

The Ontario Power Co. has authority to generate 180,000 h.p. at Niagara and may export one-third of this amount, leaving 120,000 h.p. to dispose of in Ontario. They have five generators already installed, producing 55,000 h.p.

May Make Contract. It is of importance to the municipalities concerned to know that they can now at any time enter into a provisional contract with the hydro-electric power commission. It is not necessary for them to wait until a bylaw is submitted to the ratepayers. Such action will greatly facilitate the work of the commission, and the provisional contract may afterwards be ratified.

The formal contract which has thus far been awaiting the sanction of the negotiators will be sent out to the municipalities as soon as they are concluded, as anticipated, in the course of a few days.

Fourteen Want Power. Already 14 municipalities have applied for power as follows:

Table listing municipalities and their power requirements: Toronto (15,000), Toronto Junction (4,000), Guelph (2,000), Galt (2,000), Woodstock (2,000), Ingersoll (2,000), Stratford (2,500), St. Mary's (750), Preston (500), Berlin (1,000), Waterloo (700), Hespeler (500), Brantford (2,500).

In addition to these St. Thomas and Paris have applications pending.

Delivery the Next Point. The next point to be settled is the delivery of the power to the city. The government has made good, and more than made good, in all that it has undertaken so far in connection with the hydro-electric power commission. It is highly improbable that at the present advanced stage of the proceedings, anything will be permitted to disappoint the needs and the interests of the people. To convey power from Niagara to the municipalities a transmission line must be built. The existing line is no more than will carry present requirements. If a new one is to be constructed, the inference is that the hydro-electric commission will be compelled by the nature of the situation to build their own line out to the municipalities.

The possession of a right-of-way on existing railway tracks simplifies the problem to an amazing degree, and the actual work is easy.

Toronto householders may begin to look forward to an era of cheap electric service. A new German lamp, using one watt per candle, has out the present electric lighting efficiency in three, and will easily knock out gas at the rate possibly under the contract about to be consummated. Every month produces new devices in lighting, cooking, heating and other economical appliances of electricity. Electric irons are extensively used. A neckwear house on Front-street has a very large installation. Other small goods are treated by electricity to a large extent. The heat can be directly applied, and more efficiently in these instances. Decorative lighting and advertising devices are extending rapidly.

What Buffalo Does. On a larger scale Buffalo furnishes an example of competition with steam power in pumping. A 25,000,000 gallon electric pump costs \$35,000 to install. Three triple-expansion steam pumps of 25,000,000 gallons each cost \$125,000 to install. With coal at \$2 a ton, and electric power at \$1 a horsepower, the electric pumping costs \$5.40 per 1,000,000 gallons, with 200 feet head. HOME RULE FOR IRISH
ON CHAMBERLAIN PLAN
 Same Relationship as Between the
 Dominion Parliament and the
 Legislatures.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.)
LONDON, May 3.—With every appear-

MARINE
TORONTO AS OCEAN PORT
STEAMERS SAIL DIRECT
 Three Freighters of Canadian Lake
 Line From England Here
 Without a Break.
 The "Corunna," the first of the three
 new steel package freighters bought
 by the Canadian Lake Line, Toronto,
 in Britain, cleared from the Middlesboro,
 England, on Friday, April 22, bound
 for Toronto. She is loaded with a full
 cargo of pig iron consigned to Messrs.
 Samuel, Benjamin & Co.
 The "Morena," the second steamer,
 cleared from Middlesboro, England, on
 May 2. She is also loaded with pig
 iron for the above mentioned firm, and
 the "Neveda," the third steamer, will
 probably clear Newcastle, England,
 the early part of next week with a
 full load of pig iron for the same firm.
 These cargoes are probably the first
 on record to be consigned for from
 Canada and delivered direct by steam-
 ship from an English port to the City
 of Toronto without transfer at Mont-
 real.
 While this is not an established ser-
 vice, it is an indication of what can
 be done, and in the future with deep-
 ened canals a regular servicemight be
 established, making Toronto practically
 an ocean port.
 After delivering their cargoes, the
 "Morena," "Corunna" and "Neveda"
 will go into commission in the regular
 bi-weekly service between Montreal
 and the head of the lakes, carrying
 package freight up, and grain down.
 The Canadian Lake Line steamers
 "A. E. Ames" and "J. H. Plummer"
 are now on their way down from Mont-
 real loaded with grain for Fort
 William and Kingston, respectively. The
 steamer "E. M. Pellatt" left Toronto
 last Saturday for Port Arthur and
 Fort William with a full cargo of
 package freight.
 The fact that she carried five auto-
 mobiles consigned to Port Arthur will
 give some idea of how that town is
 progressing.

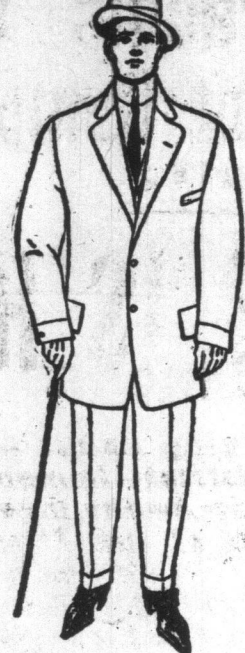

CITY AID TO HOSPITALS ENOUGH FOR THE RETURN

Dr. Sheard Does Not Favor Increasing Per Diem Grant—James St. Extension.

Dr. Sheard, referring yesterday to the report that the city hospitals, which are getting a per diem grant of 50 cents per patient, would apply for an increase to 75c, said he would oppose any such request as the hospitals were now receiving quite as much as they deserved in consideration of services rendered to the city, as they declined to take in such cases as mumps, measles, chicken-pox, and erysipelas.

The city should have a definite understanding with the hospitals, he maintains, declaring that there is a tendency on their part to choose the most interesting surgical cases, and to make the city look after the others.

Dr. Sheard admitted the suggestion that the city might build a hospital that would have abundance of room for rejected patients suffering from the diseases mentioned.

The civic grants to hospitals last year were: General, \$17,850; St. Michael's, \$13,718; Western, \$4,988.50; Grace, \$3,392; St. John's, \$2,625.50; Hillcrest, \$3,045.50; Hospital for Consumptives, Western, \$6,070.50; Hospital for Consumptives, Gravenhurst, \$2,144.50; total, \$49,219.50.

Extension of James Street.

The city solicitor reported to the works committee yesterday that as Judge Winchester had added some property to the area assessable for James-street extension, notice should be given to ratepayers involved, that they might further petition should they so desire.

Controller Hubbard objected that, to allow such a procedure would mean that improvements could be blocked in future, whenever Judge Winchester might choose to add a couple of names to the list of assessable property.

As, under the statute, the city council is empowered to go ahead with any street extension on a two-thirds vote, and as the extension is favored by a sufficiently large majority, the extension, while it may be delayed for a time through a procedural, will ultimately be carried out.

It would cost \$100,000 to build the bridges necessary to allow an entrance from Sirachan-avenue, and the land demands would amount to about \$50,000, so the city engineer reported.

Coincident with the withdrawal of the invitation to Delmas came the news that the faculty of the Law School had decided to establish a censorship over inviting lecturers.

Delmas is the first lecturer ever invited to speak at Yale whose invitation was cancelled.
