FOR TIGHT, EASY AND SWIFT Conditions for Tenders for the Supply OF ELECTRICAL ENERGY Will be Considered by the Board of Control This Afternoon.

The Board of Control will meet today at 3.30 p.m. to consider the draft conditions for tenders for the supply to the corporation of the City of Toronto of electrical energy to be used for light, heat and power.

The conditions, as recommended by the City Engineer, are as follows: The energy is to be delivered at a point within the city limits, not yet precisely located, but (approximately) in the neighborhood of the water works main pumping station at the foot of John-street, or at or near the foot of Yonge-street.

The contractor is to supply proper Watt-hour integrating meters of a type satisfactory to the City Engineer, and payment is to be made at an agreed rate per electrical unit, for each hour of service, the rate being to be one electrical h. p. for each horse power of capacity.

No. 3. For electric street railways, direct current at constant potential of 550 to 600 volts, 3000 electrical h. p.

No. 4. For incandescent lighting on the Edison three-wire system; direct current at constant potential 115 and 230 volts, 2000 electrical h. p.

No. 5. If it shall appear economical to operate the city works by means of water power, the proposed supply of electrical energy, there may be required for this purpose 200 electrical h. p. in the form in which the same is to be supplied being a matter for future agreement.

No tender will be considered which does not contemplate the supply of electrical energy in sufficient quantity, and in each of the forms necessary to supply the present demand, and further to meet the demand for increased demand if such should arise, for each form of supply at the rate of 10 per cent of the initial installation in each year given above, approximately the maximum demand. The demand varies from one hour throughout the day, the supply is to be maintained for each day for 24 hours, and for street lighting during the customary lighting hours, to wit, from half an hour after sunset to an hour before sunrise daily.

Tenders must state when the delivery of energy will begin and when the installation will be completed, and the date hereinafter specified.

Tenders may offer one rate per electrical h. p. per hour for all forms of supply, or may offer a different rate for each form, and the electric energy to be brought into the city from a point outside of its corporate limits, the City Engineer will assign routes on or under the streets, wherever the electric transmission line may be constructed, and the same shall be placed underground when it shall be deemed expedient to do so, in the Parliament-street on the east, Bloor-street on the north, Bathurst-street on the west, and the water of the Bay on the south, and may be an overhead line strung on poles when constructed outside the said area. Provided also that the construction of any such line shall be under the supervision and to the satisfaction of the City Engineer. And further provided that such line shall not be used for the supply of electric energy to any person, corporation, or partnership other than the corporation of the City of Toronto, within the limits of the said city.

Any contract entered into by the city for the supply of electrical power will expire later than the 31st day of December, 1910.

Parties tendering are required to submit with their tenders a cash deposit or marked cheque for the sum of thirty thousand dollars, payable to the order of the City Treasurer as a guarantee of good faith, and that the security as hereinafter provided shall be satisfactory, which deposit will be retained by the city until the contract is finally executed and the security given by all parties concerned.

The contractor is required to furnish security satisfactory to the City Treasurer, and to enter into a bond and contract satisfactory to the City Engineer for the due and proper fulfilment of the undertakings.

The general conditions (Form Z) forming part of all works Department contracts for the corporation of the City of Toronto are also to form a part of this specification, and may be obtained on application to the City Engineer.

The corporation of the City of Toronto does not intend to accept the lowest or any tender.
