THAT THE STORY.

The Spanish Consul for British North America Has Confessed—Was He the Victim of Schemers?

Vancouver, July 22.—(Special.)—Captain Mellon, Spanish Consul for British North America, has been forced by the presence of the executive officer of the United States ship Bennington and a secret service officer of the Washington Government, to confess his schemes to aid Spain. The old man is in a state of hysterics for fear that the Canadian Government will deal harshly with him. He said to a correspondent: "I'll keep back nothing. Two weeks ago I was appointed Spanish Consul for British North America, in compliance with a promise made at Madrid. I was instructed by the Spanish Government to buy several 15-foot cruisers and put them on the route between British Columbia and Manila. There was placed at my disposal unlimited capital. I was instructed to engage competent men to pilot and man the cruisers, and was expected to bring 2000 wounded soldiers from the Philippines, shipping them over the Canadian Pacific Railway via Montreal to Spain, and on the return trip to take provisions to the besieged—in all 40,000,000 worth—to be bought at Vancouver. "Westernland, the pilot, was offered \$8000 to act as pilot for two months, and Capt. S. S. Scott was approached and offered honors and wealth to go into the service of Spain, but planning to buy the Canadian Pacific, he was not mentioned and not thought of by me until American papers published despatches to that effect. "HOGGISH AND HOGTOWN"

Ottawa Masons Dissatisfied by "Cheap John" Entertainment in Toronto

Arrangements so Poor That Delegates Had to Sit in Sweltering Hall, Without Even Ice-Water—Other News From the Capital.

Ottawa, July 22.—The Free Press has the following under the heading of "Hoggish and Hogtown": "The delegates to the Masonic Grand Lodge at Toronto have returned. A prominent Mason, speaking this morning, said that there was great dissatisfaction among the delegates over the cheap John entertainment provided by Toronto brethren. The miserable treatment received made it all the easier for Ottawa to capture the convention for next year on the first ballot by a big vote. Eight hundred delegates were at Toronto, and so poor were the local arrangements, the crowd had to sit in the sweltering hall without even a glass of ice water being provided. It is said that the Toronto delegates tendered the visitors a trip on the lake and charged them 50 cents, the ordinary fare, for the pleasure. The local brethren are determined that when the lodge meets here next year the visitors will get a taste of hearty Ottawa hospitality and the best provided Capital in any of the great convention cities. Whalers Icebound. Rev. L. O. Stringer, Anglican missionary, who is among the Esquimaux, writes here to say that of 11 whaling ships in the Arctic seas, that left for the west, only three got through last fall. The others were icebound. Denounce Attacks. Ottawa County lawyers passed a resolution denouncing the attacks of R. J. Wyckes, Q.C., on the bench and bar as unjustifiable, and asks that the Chief Justice of the Superior Court of Quebec take action. Being Settled Satisfactorily. Mr. P. W. Reseman, general manager of the Gaiterway Railway, stated to-day that the trouble between the Quebec Government and the Ottawa and Gaiterway Railway for taxes is being settled satisfactorily in any way. News Notes. The clergy of Ottawa are practically unanimous in their opposition to Sunday street cars, but all are not opposed to the proposed plebiscite to be taken next January on the subject. A deputation waited upon the Township Council of Nepean, which met yesterday, and asked that a bylaw be passed to prevent bicycle and horse racing on the roads of the township. The Council promised to do this at its next meeting. The investigation into the scandal in the Public Works workshops is being continued. The proof foreman, Adams, contends that all work done for him was done after hours and paid for by him, and denies having removed anything except freewood. Hon. Charles Mackintosh, ex-Lieut.-Governor of the Northwest Territories, will make Ottawa his residence in future, and the headquarters of the British American Corporation, of which Lord Dufferin is president and Mr. Mackintosh manager. Latest advices received by the Government from the Yukon state that the time distance between Victoria and Dawson City has been reduced to eleven days by the recent trip of the Aurora, which took the route up the Yukon River. Tadpole Picnic at Orillia. Orillia, Ont., July 22.—The largest picnic held in Orillia in years was given yesterday by the Tadpole Carriage Company to their employees and friends. Over 1500 people were carried by the carriages to Strawberry Island, Lake Simcoe, where the annual outing was held, and enjoyed a very pleasant afternoon. HELDEN NOW IN NAPANEE JAIL.

He Was Coupled to Constable Sills on the Journey—A Raw Boned, Lanky Chap—Napanee People Recognize Him.

Napanee, July 22.—(Special.)—Up to-day your correspondent has tried to gauge public opinion while at the same time giving publicity to all the evidence adduced so far by the authorities. To-day a brief statement of how the case is viewed by those within the mystic ring, designated the detective force, is given. The newest thing in the Napanee case is the coming of Holden. The World boarded the train at Kingston Junction and arrived in town with the prisoner, County Constable Sills and happy Detective Dougherty. At Kingston the prisoner and his guards had a square meal at the restaurant, and after getting on the train, occupied the smoking end of the first-class car. "Fished With Holden. Prisoner Holden was shackled to Constable Sills' strong left arm, though the coupling link was hidden by a cloak. Holden is a large man, a raw-boned, lanky chap. He looks about 50, is beardless and partially bald. He has a prominent nose and a lantern jaw. The set of his mouth denotes determination. Since his arrival in town scores of persons have identified him as one of the tramps so much spoken of. One little country lad was heard to say: "That's the man I used to fish with last year." Detective Dougherty, to whom much of the credit of the capture is due, is a splendid specimen of physical fitness. In his statement of the case, told to The World in the train, for the most part under pledge of secrecy till a proper time, it appears that the detectives are sure they can fasten complicity upon Prisoner Ponton. HON. MR. BLAIR'S ERRAND.

He Has Not Yet Given Up His Idea of Making the Canada Eastern Railway Contribute to the Government's Cause.

Montreal, July 22.—(Special.)—There has always been more or less curiosity manifested in political circles, both in New Brunswick and old Canada, as to the nature of Hon. A. G. Blair's errand to England. The trip of the Minister of Railways and Canals has, it appears, something to do with negotiations leading up to the Canada Eastern Railway, running from Fredericton to the Town of Chatham, on the Intercolonial. It will be remembered that Hon. Mr. Blair endeavored to get the sale of the Canada Eastern to the Canadian Government through Council some months ago, but the deal was thwarted by the Ontario members of the Cabinet, who held the same terms were not such as to commend the transaction to their judgment, and there was also a rumor afloat that the Canadian Pacific was after the line and had offered Mr. Alex. Gibson something less than a million dollars for the road in question. As the Canada Eastern was generally looked upon as a road that would become a good feeder to the Canadian Pacific, and if in the latter company's hands, the traffic would be drawn to the C.P.R. rather than to the Intercolonial at Chatham. The story goes that Hon. Mr. Blair has never given up the idea of having his views, which were favorable to the purchase of the road by the Government, accepted by the majority of his colleagues, and rumour has it that Sir Wilfrid Laurier is inclined that way, upon condition that such a sale would bring strength to the Ottawa Administration in the Province of New Brunswick. The road, however, as well as most of the stock of the Alexander Gibson Manufacturing Company, appears to be in the hands of Messrs. Farworth and Jardine of Liverpool, and it is with these gentlemen that the Hon. Mr. Blair and the Ottawa Government now have to deal. It is said that the Minister of Railways and his colleagues are agreed that it is most important that Hon. George E. Foster should be defeated in York, and that Mr. Blair thinks that the proposed railway deal might be a very effective means to this end. It is also said that the Minister's aim is to secure from Farworth and Jardine an option on the road for the sum of \$1,500,000, and to use every possible means to have the deal put through as soon as possible.

PEOPLE OF GOD MEETINGS.

World's Description Has Drawn Big Crowds to See the Strange Exercises. The World's article on the grotesque services held in St. Augustine's Church by "The People of God" has been the means of crowding the edifice on every meeting, people coming from all over the city to witness the peculiar form of worship. The police have also evidently seen The World, for last night an officer was on duty at the door to see that the enthusiasm did not reach too high a pitch. Bro. B. H. Irwin, who opened the campaign a week ago Thursday, has returned home to Nebraska, but it is expected he will return in time for tomorrow's services. Elder Raymond conducted the meeting last evening, and the gathering was a very representative one. Members of the Salvation Army and other denominations were present. The crowd of visitors hung round the entrance doors and the conductor called on them repeatedly to take seats and make themselves at home, but the curious spectators were more inclined to stand where they would be in close proximity to the constable. After the singing of several sacred solos by Rev. Theodore Grey and other members, the elder read an extract from Scripture and then followed several experiences related by the worshippers who had been relieved of some one or other malady. The congregation joined in sympathetic cries. While the service is in progress, old men and women can be seen wringing their hands in joy with streams of tears flowing down their cheeks, and the younger generation look on at their elders with pity and surprise, not knowing what it means. The most important part of the service and the most curious is the final, when the worshippers kneel in front of the lecturer and call on the Lord for life and salvation. The campaign will continue until Wednesday.

HOORAY FOR HERO HOBSON.

A Splendid Reception Given to Him at Washington Yesterday. Porter Proud to Carry His Badge—He Escaped Observation at First, But Some One Spied Him, and Then There Was a Scene of Enthusiasm—He Bore a Message From Sampson. Washington, July 22.—The most agreeable event of the day was the arrival at the Navy Department of Lieut. Hobson, of Merimac fame. The officials were not informed of his approaching visit, consequently there was no official at the railway station to meet him, and his reception was truly democratic. He succeeded in escaping observation, as he passed through the train shed, followed by a porter, proudly carrying his bag, but before he emerged from the station, some one spied him, a hoot was sent up from one throat close by, and in a moment the station resounded with vociferous shouting. The cry of "Hobson! Hobson!" rang out, and the crowd closed about him, shaking his hands and pushing him about until he was rescued by the police and escorted to his carriage. As he approached the office of the Secretary of the Navy, a large crowd which had gathered about the doorway, gave a hearty welcome. Secretary Long came out of his private office, and grasping Hobson with both hands, said with sincerity: "Lieutenant, I am glad, very glad to see you." Later Secretary Long stated that Hobson did not bring the long-expected report from Admiral Sampson, and his brother officers on the destruction of the Cervara fleet. The exact purpose of his visit was explained by the following order, under which Lieut. Hobson had come to the United States: "You will proceed north in the St. Paul, to New York. Thence you will proceed to Washington and report to the Secretary of the Navy and acquaint him with the object of your visit, as set forth in my letter of the 14th inst., regarding the work upon the Christol Colon. Explain to him fully the position and condition of that ship, and receive his instructions regarding it. "Be as expeditious as possible in bringing the matter of a renunciation of the Christol Colon, if it is practicable to do so, this fine ship may be saved to the United States Navy. "The time of your departure from New York will ask for orders from the Secretary of the Navy; otherwise you will return to duty on board the Christol Colon. "Very respectfully, "W. T. Sampson, "Rear-Admiral, U.S.N."

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Wheat imports into France.

Wheat imports into France. A singular feature of the trade in wheat last week is found in the fact that there has been a net export of 1,320,000 bushels, as compared with 250,000 bushels to Belgium, although the Parisian quotations after deducting duty were much lower in France than Belgium. It must be the wheat that has been imported into France is going in under the temporary admission arrangement through which millers, on exporting flour, obtain a drawback of the duty on its equivalent wheat, which drawback is now being calculated as to form a bounty to millers, who appear to expect that they will be able to purchase native wheat soon enough and cheap enough to grind and export within the period allowed after present importations of foreign wheat.

A Beecham Estimate.

A Beecham Estimate. Beecham estimates the increase in the world's wheat crop for 1898 at 84,000,000 bushels, as follows: Argentina, 24,000,000; India, 64,000,000; United States, 32,000,000; 600 bushels; Roumania and Bulgaria, 24,000,000; Austria-Hungary, 24,000,000; 600 bushels; United Kingdom, 8,000,000 bushels. The Russian crop is still a doubtful element, and we, of course, know nothing of the next Argentine crop, which is to be reaped at the awkward period for the harvest, viz., at the end of the year. If our preliminary forecast becomes true, the world will produce in 1898 some 120,000,000 bushels beyond her requirements, a surplus which may justify a return to the old level; but it is very probable that at anything below that level the depleted reserves will be filled up.
