Moscow, Oct. 17.—News comes from Central Asia that all prominent Afghans who dare leave the court of the Amer are seized to save their lives. The monarch is said to be insane and subject to frequent violent fits. Many high dignitaries have been put to death for no cause save the Amer's crazy whim. Two have even been buried at the stake and one court functionary is said to have been boiled to death in the Amer's dogs.

Famine Follows Crop Failure. The failure of crops in parts of Russia, and the consequent famine, is reported in detail in these despatches some time ago, is bringing in its train the inevitable famine. In consequence of the failure of the crops in the Department of Agriculture from Bakr reported among the inhabitants of Transcaucasia and Nagaze, due to scanty fodder, the cattle, M. Vermeulen of Moscow of Agriculture, has arrived in Moscow to examine into agricultural conditions in the threatened districts.

A sub-committee of the Allocation Committee held a conference yesterday with the representatives of the York County Council to settle the question of the cost of maintaining the latter's quarters in the new City Hall. At a previous meeting the city offered to pay 75 per cent. of the expenses if the county would pay the other 25 per cent. The offer, however, after being considered, was refused, and Warden Woodstock said that the county was willing to pay 21 per cent., but no more.

The city representatives then lowered their figure to 22 per cent., but the other party remained obdurate and refused point-blank to pay any more.

**Did Not Succeed.**  
Chairman Lamb called them for their closeness, and tried to jolly them into agreeing to his proposition, but it did not go down, and another meeting will be necessary to settle the difficulty.

**Wants a Cash Iron Agreement.**  
General Manager Pearson of the Consumers' Gas Company wrote to the Mayor yesterday, saying he had been instructed by his company to say that if enough residents on the island would agree to have gas put in their houses, and the city grants a lease of the property on Muggs' Landing for 21 years, renewable at a rental of \$100 per year, and a fixed tax of \$200, the company would be willing to begin the construction of their plant immediately.

**Was Would Be Expensive.**  
Enclosed with the letter is a circular copy of the agreement which the residents would sign when they had gas put in their houses. The circular says that the works will cost \$40,000 to erect, and owing to the extra expense the company would be put to in maintaining the same, together with the smallness of the quantity consumed, they would be compelled to charge \$150 per thousand feet.

**Trouble Looming Up.**  
It looks very much as if there will be more trouble over the Lansdowne-avenue crossing. Both of the railway companies refuse to consent to a level crossing, and the board of the gates there is knocked on the head.

**Building Permits.**  
The Toronto General Trusts Company have been granted a permit for alterations to a two-story store at the corner of Long and Church-streets, at a cost of \$1000, also took out a permit for a three-story brick residence on the corner of College and Robert-streets, at a cost of \$2500, also took out a permit for the erection of a two-story brick dwelling at the corner of Macpherson-avenue and Yonge-street, at a cost of \$2400.

**Another Applicant.**  
Mayor Shaw received yesterday morning another application for the position of Chief of the Fire Brigade. This time it is from P. G. Gibson, who is now in charge of the Montreal Brigade. The applicant visited the Mayor in person. He is well recommended in connection with the department there, and has seen 15 years of service.

**Trouble Over a Road.**  
When Lever Bros. commenced building their mammoth soap factory, the road to St. Paul's was the subject of much discussion. Goodham & Worts made a lick to the City Engineer. Yesterday morning Ald. Saunders and Street Commissioners paid a visit to the place, and discovered that the foundation for the building was on the building yesterday, and the workmen were busy in connection with the road improvements, and as a result, Goodham & Worts have their entrance to the bryar cut off.

**Look Out for Surprises.**  
The report of the Medical Health Officer on the physical condition of the firemen will be made public shortly, and some surprising disclosures are expected. Dr. Bland has completed his examination, and is now busily engaged in preparing the report.

**Notes.**  
Ald. Woods is reported to be improving steadily, and will be able to be around the building again in a few days. Ald. Steiner has gathered a deal of information during his visit to New York, particularly in connection with the department there, and he intends to make the best use of it when the time comes.

**Cook and His Cloak.**  
Within the past two months three water-proof cloaks, worth about \$70, were missed from the show rooms of the Gatta Percha Rubber Company at 91-93 West Front-street. Detective Chief Constable Macpherson, and the cloaks were recovered in an Adelaide-street alleyway. The officer secured a description of the person who pawned them, and employees of the company were also alerted. The stolen cloaks were recovered in again. John A. Cook, a street railway motorman of 20 Lipplacott-street was seen about the building yesterday, and he was afterwards arrested on King-street with a cloak in his possession.

**Runaway on Yonge-Street.**  
A horse attached to one of J. Simmer's fleet of delivery vans ran away yesterday afternoon on Yonge-street. Opposite the T. Eaton Co.'s store several bicycles were wrecked by the colliding horse and team. At Queen-street the horse was caught.

Liquidator Sutton of the Massachusetts Benefit Life Insurance Association has been awarded \$6000 for his work in winding up the concern.

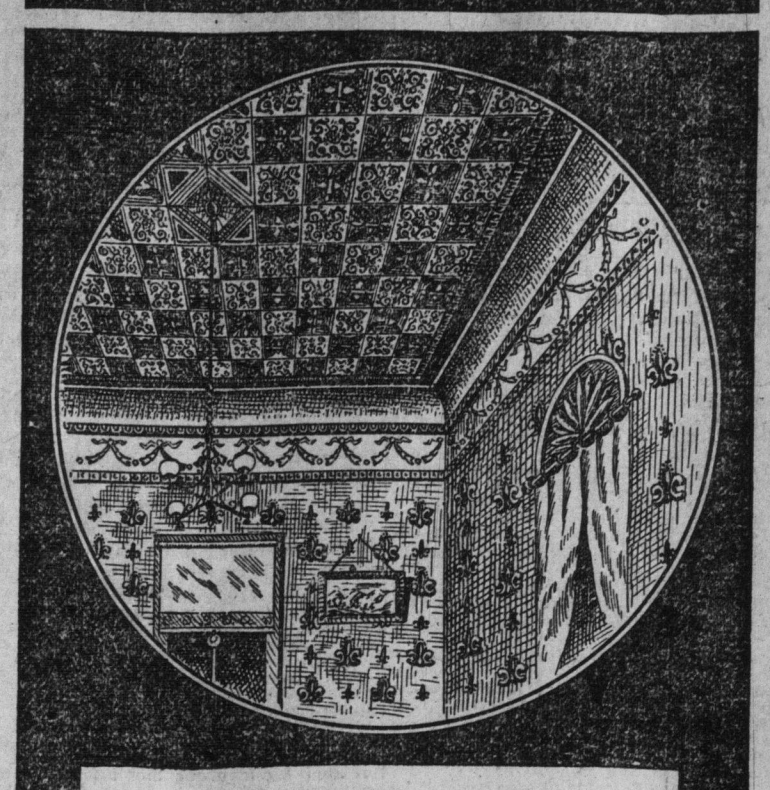

## KICK ABOUT WATER RATES.

People at Toronto Junction Complain of the New System of Rating.

## NORTH TORONTO COUNCIL MEETS

Thanksgiving Day's Sham Fight Will Centre Around the Junction—Other County Notes.

Toronto Junction, Oct. 17.—(Special).—Robert Rowland was this afternoon lodged in the cells on a charge of stealing money from Newton Raybould. The theft is said to have been going on for some time and the detection was made by the police through marked bills. He will appear for trial in the morning.  
The new rating of the town for water service, as was natural, is beginning to cause complaints, and this fact was very forcibly brought out at to-night's meeting of the Works and Waterworks Committee, when several complaints were lodged. The trouble arises from the fact that for the past few years houses have been rated the same, year by year. For instance, if a family was increasing, if boarders were taken, or if the occupant kept a horse and cow, the rating kept on the same. When the town desired to make a settlement with the bondholders, the bondholders insisted upon higher rates being charged for water. They showed that the people of Toronto Junction were getting water for less than many other towns in Ontario. The result of the opinion that the system should be self-sustaining. The Council changed the system so as to give a rebate of 50 per cent. instead of 60 per cent. and rated each house as if it were a detached house. True, some houses now pay a few dollars more than formerly, but the rate, whilst in the gross is more than Toronto, in the net it is less, because Toronto gives but 20 per cent. discount, whilst the Junction gives 50 per cent. The Council seem disposed to adhere to the by-law, though some instances, where milkmen keep many cows, there would appear to be a slight injustice.  
The Public and High schools will close on Wednesday night until Monday morning. The sham fight on Thanksgiving Day will largely centre around Toronto Junction. It is understood that the attacking party will attempt to capture the railway communications of the city, whilst it will be the endeavor of the defenders to repulse them. This mode of attack is supposed to be for the benefit of the militiamen who are going to South Africa, as a supply of the officers with maps, showing the railway lines leading into the city.

**Arora.**  
Mr. Charles Willis is under treatment for a broken collar bone caused by falling from a tree while procuring beehives for the cultivator near the Davisville tannery. Being extended and strengthened to permit of the safe passage of the Metropolitan tannery.  
Division Court will be held here by Judge Morgan on the morning of the 24th inst., and in the afternoon a Court of Revision of the voters' lists, against which there are 111 appeals, will be presided over by the same authority.  
Melville Foreman was arrested here on Monday evening by Constable Savage on a charge of stealing a horse and buggy from the Wootton livery at Newmarket. The man had hired the rig on Saturday and did not return it. A Buffalo robe also found, was not in the man's possession at the time of the arrest. Before Magistrate Woodcock yesterday a remand was made to the Wootton livery at Newmarket, if possible, if not, the man is to be committed to the jail.

Johannesburg isn't a nice place to live in just now, so Dick Hensel, a Toronto boy, who went there four years ago, decided not to stay there, and he came home, arriving in this city at the beginning of the week.  
Hensel is the sturdy road rider of the Royal Canadian, who brought so much glory to himself and the East End club a few years ago. He left Toronto for Johannesburg on Sept. 6, 1895, and he departed from Johannesburg for Toronto on Sept. 4, 1896. While in South Africa he was not so glad as he was when he left, for he got along very well until attacked by a serious illness at the beginning of the summer. Galt, Oct. 17.—(Special).—One of the most peculiar freaks of lightning that have been heard of in this section occurred at the home of Mr. George Aitken, a farmer near Glen Morris, on Saturday afternoon. Mr. Aitken and his two brothers, John and Robert, were standing in a room, when the bolt entered the house. It ran along the house, passed under the foot of John's bed, raising it slightly, and then tore the sole off Robert's boot and also burnt two holes in his stocking. The flash then passed out of the house at the south corner, about 40 feet away. Mr. Aitken's foot was not materially injured, but was left in a sore condition.
