The late Major Alexander James Boyd was the eldest son of Sir John Boyd (Chancellor), and was born in Toronto 37 years ago. These letters were dated at Sterkfontein as late as feb. 28, and indicated that he was then in charge of a line of blockhouses. Major Boyd went to South Africa with the first draft of reinforcements for the first Canadian contingent, and was present at the battles of Zand River and Doornkop and entry into Pretoria. He returned home and again enlisted as an officer of the Baden-Powell Constabulary, recruited in Canada.
