Oliver's Vote Against B.N.A. Restrictions Which He Will Support in Clause 16

So He Tells Bennett During Vivid Joint Debate at Woodstock—Says Clause is Necessary to Make it Clear That "Present" System is Continued.

MINISTER DOES NOT CONVINCED WHILE BENNETT IS CHEERED

Woodstock, June 7.—(Special).—The greatest political gathering ever held in Woodstock is the general verdict concerning the meeting of Hon. Frank Oliver and R. Bennett, the youthful orator of Calgary, in the open house to-night. There was no mistaking the result of the oratorical combat. Mr. Bennett was the complete master of the minister of the interior in the art of political jiu-jitsu. Mr. Oliver, however, waged a manly contest, and stood right up to his adversary. The gist of the debate was questions and answers, set down as follows:

Mr. Bennett: Has the west ever had the right to say what kind of a school system it should have?

Mr. Oliver: The west has always had as much right to pass legislation in regard to education as Ontario since confederation.

Mr. Bennett: If the autonomy bills pass, can we ever change the separate school system?

Mr. Oliver: So long as the B.N.A. Act exists the restrictions endure.

Mr. Bennett: Is there a single province in Canada that has had a separate school system since confederation? This has not had the right to pass an act?

Mr. Oliver: All the provinces are subject to the restrictions of the B.N.A. Act. If Manitoba is free, the credit belongs to the Liberal party.

Mr. Bennett: If the B.N.A. Act guarantees separate schools, why was it necessary to insert clause 16?

Mr. Oliver: Without clause 16, the B.N.A. Act would come into force automatically, and clause 16 becomes necessary to make it clear that only the present system is being continued.

Mr. Bennett: The present system of autonomy bills did not perpetuate the educational system of the territories, but merely restricted it.

Mr. Oliver: It did not matter whether legislation was passed at Ottawa or Edmonton as it was good.

This was seized upon as a bold statement, coming from an exponent of provincial rights.

Mr. Oliver, in reply to a direct question by Mr. Bennett, said he would vote in parliament to repeal the B.N.A. Act, which clause 16 would perpetuate.

Mr. Oliver said it had been within his power of the Dominion parliament for the B.N.A. Act, and he taunted the Conservatives with failure to remove these restrictions.

Shook Heads.

Each of the speakers received a rousing ovation as he finished his remarks. Oliver came in after the curtain, took his seat and was met by Mr. Bennett with a shake of the hand.

Oliver was accompanied by W. S. Carter, chief Liberal whip in the house of commons, D. W. Keim, minister of education, and other prominent speakers.

When Mr. Bennett was introduced the audience cheered lustily. Mr. Oliver said he had not expected to speak three times within a week in Woodstock.

The first question he would address to Mr. Oliver was whether the west ever had the right to say what kind of a school system they should have.

His second proposition was this: Is there a single province in Canada that has had a separate school system since confederation? This has not had the right to pass an act?

Proposal to Connect Emerson and Vassar to Shorten Grain Haul Threatens City Coeffs.

Winnipeg is Up in Arms

Winnipeg, June 7.—(Special).—The Canadian Northern Railway proposes to link up its Southwestern Manitoba system, the most prolific wheat district in the west, with the Lake Superior ports direct, by building a connecting link, some 65 miles long, between Emerson, on the international boundary, and Vassar, a point on the company's main line, between Winnipeg and Fort William. The new line will practically parallel the boundary, and will effect a considerable saving in time for the old routes, which all pass thru Winnipeg. This line has been surveyed some time, and 24 miles has actually been laid, but merely as tapping a valuable country. Now, however, the company announces that it has decided to construct the line in earnest, and tenders for the construction are actually being considered, with a view to completing the section in time to handle the present crop from the district concerned.

The company claims that this strategic move is necessitated by pressure on Winnipeg terminals, which premises to be increased in a short time, when the new main line to Edmonton comes into full operation. Notwithstanding these representations, Winnipeg may be expected to make a lively kick on the project, as it is the same time her position as the gateway of the west and threatens the tolls that she levies on traffic eastward, if not in cash at least in kind.

The whole principle of grain inspection will also be liable to modification under the proposed development, for at present every car of Canadian eastern-bound grain must pass thru Winnipeg and an elaborate system of inspection has been established, while Winnipeg has also been the principal market for country farmers and elevator concerns, and there is no alternative entry into the west. Strong representations are likely to be made from industrial quarters.

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Russia Refuses Peace Says Vienna Despatch

Meanwhile Washington Diplomats Are Excited Over Alleged Request for Japanese Terms.

RUSSIA REFUSES PEACE

Vienna, June 7.—It is learned here tonight that the Russian government has informed its diplomatic representatives abroad, including Count Cassini, the ambassador at Washington, that the time for Russia to conclude peace had not yet come, and that when it does arrive Russia will open peace negotiations with Japan independent of foreign intervention.

NO STAY.

Washington, D.C., June 7.—Diplomats in Washington were tonight aroused to a point of expectancy unequalled since the inception of the war in the far east by the news from St. Petersburg of the czar's wish to know Japan's peace terms. This interest was heightened by a call which Mr. Takahira, the Japanese minister, made at the White House by appointment, shortly after 9 o'clock, and immediately went into conference with the president. They remained together about 20 minutes.

REV. DR. ARMSTRONG OF OTTAWA IS MODERATOR BY ACCLAMATION

Presbyterian Assembly Commences Session at Kingston—Heavy Vote of Thanks to Dr. Milligan.

Kingston, June 7.—(Special).—The thirty-first general assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Canada met tonight in Grant Hall with 1600 present. The moderator, Rev. Dr. Milligan, presided, and delivered the annual sermon, characterized by eloquence and an earnest and aggressive spirit. His theme was the living and destiny determining word, based on Hebrews iv, 1. The word was perpetually existent, not obsolete. It was ever operative and indifference in relation to God was excluded. Eternal truth must take its color from the condition of those to whom it came. Christ must reign; life and not death must be the issue. The living word was the only one fit to deal with man's highest interests. Sin consisted in unlikeliness to God. There must be growth in the inward parts. Motives counted for everything. Dr. Milligan had traveled 9000 miles in the west during the past year and realized as never before the number of earnest men out there planting the banner of civil and religious liberty.

He then referred to the case sustained by Dr. Caven's death, and to Dr. Warden's illness, and recommended that he be given a full year's rest. Rev. J. W. MacMillan of Winnipeg was appointed in his place to assist the clerk.

The name of Dr. Falconer was not proposed and the chief office went to Rev. William Armstrong, D.D., of St. Paul's Church, Ottawa, by acclamation. Last year he ran second to Dr. Milligan. His proposer was Rev. Dr. Bruce of Manitoba College, Winnipeg.

During the evening Dr. Milligan referred to the fact that for the first time the Presbyterian Church had been recognized by its moderator being invited to a state dinner given by Earl Grey last January. On this occasion the governor-general stated that, in an Englishman he believed there should be no connection between the church and state in Canada, and he had congratulated the Presbyterian Church on the great work it was doing in this country. 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Vigilant Sinks U. S. Schooner That Refused Signals to Stop Two Fishermen Are Drowned

Lake Erie Tragedy Was Result of Accident—"Grace M" Was 5 Miles Inside Canadian Limit and in Spite of Cannon Warning Tried to Escape.

VIGILANT SINKS U. S. SCHOONER

Port Stanley, June 7.—This morning about 9:15 the government cruiser Vigilant, Capt. Dunn, sighted a fishing tug about six miles east of Middle Island, Lake Erie, and about five miles north of the boundary line. The captain changed his course and made towards the tug, which proved to be the Grace M. of Lorain, Ohio, Capt. William Galbraith.

The tug came towards the Vigilant, and when quite near her, Captain Dunn signalled with his whistle for them to stop. No attention was paid to the signal. Then Captain Dunn whistled to stop, but the tug shot past the Vigilant with full steam.

Two fishermen were drowned, named Martin Olson of Cleveland, and William Anderson of Lorain. The tug admits that Captain Dunn was in no way to blame.

CANADIANS NOT TRUSTED?

London Financial News on That Mexican Purchase.

London, June 7.—The Financial News, referring to the Mexican Light and Power Company, a Canadian concern operating in Mexico, says that the company's capital is being bought all the time by the view to the introduction of the shares on the London market.

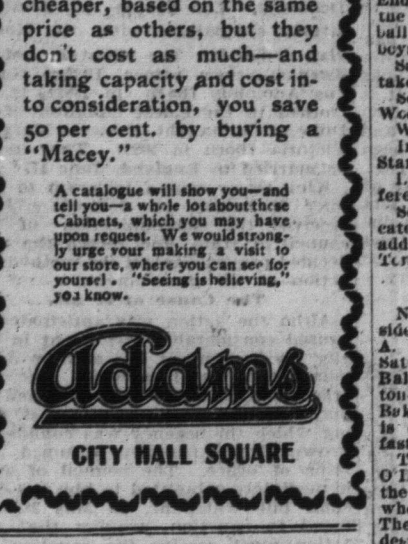

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RUSSIA WANTS TO LEARN JAPAN'S TERMS OF PEACE

Instructions Sent to Ambassadors to Make Inquiries—Indications Make It Appear That Roosevelt is the Man of the Hour.

St. Petersburg, June 7.—As a result of the meeting of the council of ministers held at Tsarsko Selo yesterday instructions were telegraphed this afternoon to the Russian ambassadors at Washington and Paris to the effect that Russia is desirous of learning Japan's peace conditions.

The efforts that President Roosevelt has been making to bring the belligerents together entered on a distinctly new phase last night.

St. Petersburg, June 7.—Ambassador Lamsdorf had an audience of the emperor in the afternoon upon the subject of Ambassador Cassin's communication and at 11 o'clock last night U. S. Ambassador Meyer called upon Count Lamsdorf at the chancellery and remained with the special ambassador for some time.

Whether this visit was upon the invitation of Count Lamsdorf or not cannot definitely be stated, but there is reason to believe that the visit was arranged by the emperor's staff.
