SURPLUS: The time devoted by the commission to the investigation of surplus investments is given equivalent importance in the Fielding bill. Following the provision of triennial distribution of surplus, this legislation would have the ascertainment of the surplus an annual thing, with an apportionment equitably to all policies entitled to share, after setting aside dividend payments and a contingency reserve of limited amount. Options to policyholders in this regard are included. The participating policies would naturally be charged with losses arising from the shrinkage in the value of securities to the extent to which they have been credited with profits during the current dividend period, if such losses require it, the deductions for shrinkage to be carried as a liability, and the company's accounts modified accordingly.

It will require a great deal of expert consideration to make plain the policyholder's real interest where it comes to be affected by amendments of accounts so clocklike as is here provided for.

The company shall in all cases require the holder of the policy to elect how dividends shall be applied: and all deductions and modifications must be shown and the reasons therefor set forth in the annual statement of the company filed with the superintendent of insurance.

CONTINGENCY RESERVE: As to the limitation of the contingency reserve referred to in the foregoing paragraph, the bill provides that every life company may accumulate, in addition to the amount of the valuation of its policies, percentages of the said valuation, to wit: (1) less than \$100,000, twenty per cent., or \$10,000, whichever is the greater; (2) over \$100,000 the contingency reserve percentage shall decrease one-half of one per cent. for each \$100,000 of valuation up to \$1,000,000; one-half of one per cent. for each additional \$1,000,000 up to \$10,000,000; one-half of one per cent. for each additional \$2 .-500.000 up to \$20.000.000; one-half of one per cent. for each additional \$5,000,000 up to \$50,000,000, and one-half of one per cent. for each additional \$25,000,000 up to \$100,000,000. The sliding scale is not a smooth grade, but the contingency reserve shall not exceed four per cent. as a maximum.

INVESTMENTS AUTHORIZED: No subject touched by the investigation was threshed out more laboriously than the investment of company's funds, and no portion of the bill now under consideration will be more carefully studied than the limitations to be fixed in this regard. They are as follows:

1. Guaranteed securities by the Dominion or a provincial gov ernment.

Mortgage bonds of any company incorporated in Canada 2. outstanding without default for at least five years upon real estate and other assets of a market value of at least 25 per cent. in excess of the amount of the bonds.

3. Unsecured stocks outstanding for at least seven years without default.

4. Preferred stocks paying four per cent., where, the dividend payments have been regular for at least seven years.

5. Common stocks paying five per cent. for at least ten years without interruption (provided that not more than 20 per cent. of the total issue of such bonds, debentures or stocks shall be purchased by any company).


6. Real estate mortgages not to exceed 60 per cent. of the value of the property.

7. Life or endowment policies issued by the company itself or any other licensed life insurance company in Canada.

8. Loans on bonds, debentures, stocks, etc., real estate or leaseholds not exceeding 60 per cent. of value.

The total amount invested in or loaned upon securities other than Canadian, not to exceed by more than 20 per cent. the re-insurance value of policies other than Canadian policies. Here is a severe limitation of loans on foreign securities.






