

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CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

OF THE

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC RIFLE ASSOCIATION.

CONSTITUTION.

As Revised 5th May, 1881.

1. That this Association be called the "*Province of Quebec Rifle Association*," and shall have for its object the encouragement of rifle shooting in the Province.

2. Any person subscribing two dollars to the funds of the Association shall be a member thereof for the year in which such subscription shall be made.

3. A donation of twenty dollars in cash, at any one time, for that express purpose, or of a prize of not less value than forty dollars, to be competed for at the annual prize meeting, shall make the donor eligible for election as a life member at next annual meeting of Council.

4. Any regularly constituted Rifle Association or Corps subscribing ten dollars or upwards, per annum, to the funds of the Association shall be considered as being in connection with it and shall be entitled to a number of memberships, for competition only, in proportion of one for every dollar so subscribed. The Association thus affiliating is to select from its members the persons to hold such memberships.

5. There shall be a Patron and Vice-Patrons, named by the Council. (The Lieutenant-Governor of the Provice of Quebec for the time being, shall be respectfully requested to become "Patron.")

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6. There shall be a President, to be elected at the annual business meeting of the Association.

7. There shall be four Vice-Presidents—one for each Brigade Major's Division—to be elected in the same manner as the President.

8. There shall be a Council composed as follows, viz:

1st. Two members from each Brigade Major's Division, to be elected annually at the business meeting.

2nd. One representative member from each affiliated Association or Corps in this Province.

9. The President, Vice-Presidents, the District Deputy Adjutants-General of Militia and Brigade Majors, for the Province of Quebec, shall be members "ex-officio" of the Council. Five members of Council shall form a quorum, and in the event of vacancies occurring in the elective members, from any cause whatever, the remaining members of the Council shall have the power of filling such vacancies. All members of Council, excepting representatives of affiliated Associations, must be individual members of the Association.

10. Representatives to the Council shall be chosen by the Associations they represent, and the names of delegates when changed shall be sent to the Secretary at least one month prior to the annual meeting.

11. The Council shall, at its first meeting, choose from its members a chairman.

12. There shall be a Secretary and a Treasurer, both to be appointed annually by the Council, and holding office during pleasure.

13. The Council shall have the sole management of the income and funds of the Association, rendering an account to the yearly meeting, such account having been previously audited by a person or persons, not members of the Council, who shall be annually shall als the affat all such tial to b and view

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come early pere **an-** nually named by the Council for that purpose. The Council shall also have the entire management and superintendence of the affairs and concerns of the Association, and shall or may do all such acts or deeds as shall appear to them necessary or essential to be done for the purpose of earrying into effect the object and views of the Association.

14. The Council shall be regulated in their proceedings by such by-laws as may from time to time be enacted by them; no by-law being in any case altered or new one proposed, without at least one month's notice of such intention being given to each member of Council.

15. The Annual Prize Meeting shall be held at such time and place as may be determined on by the Council, and the prizes shall be competed for in accordance with such regulations as may be passed from time to time by the Council.

16. An Annual Report, embracing an audited account of the finances, shall be drawn up by the Secretary, and shall (having been previously submitted to the Council) be published as soon after the prize meeting as may be found practicable.

17. An Annual Business Meeting of the members of the Association, for the election of Officers and Council, who shall assume office on first day of succeeding January, and the transaction of other business, shall be held at such time and place as may be determined on by the by-laws.

18. No alteration in the Constitution shall be made, except by a resolution duly passed at the annual business meeting or some adjournment thereof, and no such resolution shall be proposed unless a notice in writing of the terms of such resolution, signed by two members as proposer and seconder thereof shall have been given to the Secretary one month at least previous to the annual business meeting, at which the same is to be proposed and it shall be the duty of the Secretary to immediately notify all members of the Association of such proposed amendments, and also to post them on the bulletin board at the opening of the annual matches. BY-LAWS

As Revised 5th May, 1881.

1. The Annual Business Meeting of the Association shall be held on the second day of the annual matches.

2. There shall be two ordinary meetings of Council, the first of which shall be held immediately after the annual business meeting of the Association, and the second at such other time as the Council may then determine upon.

3. Extraordinary meetings shall be summoned by the Secretary, if required, by any six members of the Council; notification being sent to each member of Council at least ten days previous to such meeting, and the requisition for the meeting and the notices to the members must state the object or objects of such extraordinary meetings.

4. The Council shall keep minutes of its proceedings at all meetings, which shall be entered in a book, kept for that purpose, by the Secretary, open to the inspection of all members of the Council, and published with the annual report.

5. There shall be a Finance Committee, consisting of three members of the Council, to be chosen at their first meeting.

6. The Treasurer shall deposit from time to time, in such chartered bank as the Finance Committee may direct, all sums of money received by him on behalf of the Association.

7. All expenditure for current expenses, which may be required by the Secretary, must be authorized by the signature of a member of the Finance Committee, and the Treasurer shall pay all orders duly signed in such manner. Other expenditures of a general nature are to be made only upon the authority of the Council of the Association.

8. A detailed statement of all Receipts and Expenditures shall be rendered annually to the Council by the Treasurer.

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THE SIXTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC RIFLE ASSOCIATION.

In presenting the report of the proceedings of the past season, it is desirable to make a full account of what has been actually accomplished, as well as what it has not been practicable to accomplish.

Our various competitions give as satisfactory results as ever, but the condition of the Ranges and of our finances still require some consideration.

In taking up the various subjects, we naturally begin with the ranges at Point St. Charles.

RANGES.

The repairs and new work authorized by the Militia Department last year, and which the contractor had left unfinished, were completed under the supervision of Lieut. Moffatt, M. E., in a most satisfactory manner.

The drainage of the surface water and the sewerage which still continues to accumulate from the G. T. R. works and the adjoining streets is a matter requiring the serious attention of the Association.

TARGETS.

The Council sent Lieut. Moffatt, M. E., to Ottawa to examine and make drawings of the Costen targets, and after careful examination, those built by the contractor last year were found not to correspond in several most essential points. As it was absolutely necessary to have the targets in good working order for the annual matches, and as the state of the inances did not permit the building of new ones, it was resolved to have a pattern one built and the four old ones altered and put in as good a state as possible to last out this season. This work was carried out under the direction of Lieut. Moffatt, M. E., and at the

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matches the targets worked as well as could possibly be expected, but for next year the entire frame work and four new targets will have to be built.

It is most important that all the targets should be kept in good working order, as the Association targets are used for the general practice of the whole Montreal Brigade. This will make it necessary to have all the iron frames of the Bacon targets gone over and repaired, as most of them are in a pretty shaky condition. The frame work of the Butts will also require to be repaired and in several places renewed. Part of this arises from the unsatisfactory contractor's work referred to in last report.

The Association are still in want of a proper building for offices.

PRIZE MEETING.

In drawing out the programme for this year it was found necessary to still further curtail the prize list, and in doing so we were obliged to omit the Cavalry and Small Bore matches.

There were 12 matches, 403 individual and 22 team prizes; valued at \$1,748, besides three cups, five medals and prizes in kind.

The timing system was very perfect, and the statistical department presided over by Lieut.-Col. D. T. Fraser was prompt and reliable.

We missed an old friend, Lt.-Col. Lamontagne, who has acted the last few years as Range officer, as also Lt.-Col. Mattice.

The positions were ably filled by Lt.-Col. Worsley and Major LeSueur, the former of whom took charge of the Skirmishing match and under whose direction every detail was perfectly carried out.

A new departure, which proved successful, was made in the marking. For several years past it has been very difficult to obtain quick and reliable markers. This year 20 markers were brought down from Ottawa and gave every satisfaction.

The "Dolan" Cup was won this year by Capt. Laurie, M. G. A. The "Steward" Cup was won by Capt. Todd, G. G. F. G.

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Badges have been given as usual to Affiliated Associations.

The total number of entries was 1,504 against 1,630 last year. There were fewer affiliated associations, but the same number of individual members.

MARTINI HENRY RIFLES.

The members of the Association are commencing to use this rifle more freely, quite a number of the Country Associations having applied for rifles for the use of their members.

In addition to the rifles loaned by the Militia Department, the Dominion Rifle Association have loaned us twenty of the best pattern.

A list of the moveable property accompanies this report.

GRANTS.

As usual the Dominion Government grant was received, but as yet the Provincial Government have not seen their way to restore the annual grant, which has not been paid for the past two years. A deputation consisting of Capt. Prevost and the Secretary, proceeded to Quebec in May last and presented a petition which had been numerously signed by the members of the militia force and the friends of the Association. They were cordially received by the members of the Government who assured them that if the Treasurer saw his way clear to place the amount in his estimates, they would be only too happy to give their consent to the appropriation. But, unfortunately, this was just what the Honorable gentleman could not do, so the appeal was in vain.

At the annual meeting of competitors in August a motion was passed that a petition be again signed on the field by the competitors themselves, which was done and our Sherbrooke friends undertook to present it to the Hon. Mr. Robertson.

D. C. R. A.

The Province was well represented at the Dominion rifle matches at Ottawa in September, and though not quite so successful as last year, fairly held our own. We can claim second team prize in the "Minister of Militia" and "Dominion of Canada" matches. Fourteen places in the "grand aggregate." Two badges in the "Governor-Generals." The first four men on the Wimbledon Team and six out of the first twenty.

By the removal of Capt. G. H. Balfour, 8th Batt., to Winnipeg, the Province loses one of its best and steadiest shots, and this Association one of its most prominent and active workers.

SPECIAL PRIZE.

J. H. Steward, Esq., of London, Eng., has again donated a handsome silver plated cup for competition next year. The Association would be glad to have more friends of Mr. Steward's turn of mind.

We affiliated as usual with the National Rifle Association of Great Britain and the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association.

COLLECTIONS.

We are under obligations to a number of our old friends, for liberal subscriptions repeated again this year, but an effort must be made to increase the list, so that our prize list may be made what it used to be.

Those who have supported us are entitled to our hearty thanks.

PRESENTATION OF PRIZES.

It had been resolved that there should be a public presentation of prizes won at the annual matches, but for this year it was found impracticable to carry out the plan. The idea, however, is a good one, and we trust will be acted upon next-year.

SUGGESTIONS.

We would suggest the following as work which the new Council might attend to particularly:

1st—Get a grant from the Provincial Government.

2nd—Obtain means to build a new office on the Ranges.

3rd—Should the Corporation decide to build a drain through the Ranges; arrange with them to have the work done as quickly as possible and before the shooting season commences. 4th—G 5th—A 6th—H 7th—H

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the as om4th—Get a report at once of the work required on the Ranges for next spring, and whether any improvement can be made in the arrangements for marking.

5th—Arrange with the Brigade office to work jointly with them in repairing and renewing the butts, &c.

6th-Have all the iron targets brought in at once and repaired.

7th—Have the wooden frames of the Costen targets stored so that they will not warp.

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Finance nmittee.

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MEETING OF COUNCIL.

MONTREAL, 16th April, 1884.

Present: Lt.-Col. Van Straubenzie (in the chair.) Lt.-Cols. Harwood, Brosseau, Hughes and Fraser. Capts. Hood, Trotter, and Prevost, and the Secretary.

Minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.

The financial position of the Association was considered, and Major Blaiklock and Capt. Prevost were appointed to prepare a petition to be presented to the Provincial Government asking for a renewal of the usual grant.

A circular from the Secretary, D.C.R.A., with reference to the testimonial for Col. Gzowski, was read, and on motion was directed to be forwarded to the affiliated associations, asking for their co-operation: subscriptions to be sent in before 1st July.

A letter was read from Lord Melgund, stating that the Governor-General intended presenting two medals for competition at the annual matches. The Secretary was directed to return the thanks of the Association to His Excellency.

It was decided, on motion, to have, if possible, a public distribution of prizes after the matches; also that the matches commence on 12th August.

The Committee on the Ranges were authorized to examine again the defective work of last year's contractor, and to take steps to have the ranges and targets put in proper order.

COUNCIL MEETING.

MONTREAL, 11th June, 1884.

Present: Lt.-Col. Martin (in the chair.) Lt.-Cols. Fletcher, Brosseau, and Fraser. Majors Kennedy and Blaiklock. Captain Hood.

Minutes read and confirmed.

The sub-committee and delegation to the Quebec Government reported that the petition had been presented, but that the Provincial Treasurer could not see his way clear to grant the assistance necessary.

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ernment the Prone assistThe Committee on the Ranges reported that the work of the contractor Morrison was not according to order, and much of it would have to be done over and completed.

It was decided to submit the accounts of this contractor to arbitration. Major Kennedy was requested to act for the association.

A model wooden target was ordered, cost not to exceed \$18.

The Executive Committee, to draw up the programme and carry out the matches, was appointed.—Lt.-Cols. Straubenzie, Martin, Fletcher, and Fraser; Majors Bond, Blaiklock, and Mudge; Capts. Balfour and Prevost, and Lieut. Whitman.

Several suggestions were discussed as to changes in the programme and referred to the Ex. Committee.

The Treasurer was authorized to issue a circular asking for subscriptions as usual.

THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Met on 12th, 16th, and 17th June, to prepare the programme and make arrangements for the matches.

The case of the contractor for repairs to the ranges for last year was considered, specially with reference to his not returning the money (\$100) loaned to him on account of the Government contract.

MEETING OF COMPETITORS

On the Ranges, 13th August, according to notice.

Present: Capt. Trenholme, Vice-President (in the chair). Lt.-Col. Martin, Lts. Jamieson, Whitman, Sherwood, Waldo; Capts. Todd, Jackson, and others; about 100 in all.

The object of the meeting was explained to be the discussion of any matters connected with the matches, and submitting any suggestions thereon to the Council.

It was desired that the next programme make more clear that the upper part of the 3rd class target does not count in skirmishing match. The question of left arm shooting in military matches was mentioned as a matter requiring definite decision.

The question of increasing value and reducing the number of prizes was also discussed. The younger shots preferred as many chances as possible, and the older shots as large prizes as possible.

A resolution was moved and carried unanimously, to sign and forward a petition to the Quebec Government for a renewal of the usual grant.

The question of Martini shooting was then discussed, and a proposal to leave it out (if any matches be left out) was carried by a vote of 46 to 43.

The above suggestions were referred to Council and meeting adjourned.

ANNUAL MEETING.

Minutes of Annual Meeting of members held at Point St. Charles Ranges, Wednesday, 13th August, 1884.

Present: Capt. Trenholme (in the chair.) Lt.-Cols. Martin, Fletcher, and Fraser. Major Blaiklock. Lts. Jamieson, Forrest, MacFarlane, Whitman, and Chamberlain.

The minutes of last meeting having been already printed and distributed were taken as read and confirmed.

The election of office-bearers was proceeded with and resulted as follows:

President : Hon. A. P. Caron, Minister of Militia.

Vice-Presidents: Lt.-Cols. McEachern, Scott and Ouimet, Capt. Trenholme.

NOTE.—In further explanation of the Regulations and special rules for this match, it is intended to be carried out as nearly as practicable in the following manner:—

1. The sections will draw lots for places, after the officers, markers, &c., have withdrawn into the butts and signalled that they are ready.

2. The targets will be raised and lowered by order of the officer in com mand in the butts; he may raise them up at irregular intervals, but they will always be up 15 seconds; the score will be kept in the butts until all sections have completed firing.

3. In the 1st Series, skirmishing, at about 400 yards, the sections will be extended as far as the ground permits; officers will accompany each section, and one officer will command the whole line; this officer will give the order by bugle call to advance or retire, after the signal is given to the butts that everything is ready; the extended line will then advance or retire until the targets appear, when it will halt and fire without word or command, as the targets will only be exposed 15 seconds.

The line of sections will remain halted until the officer in command gives the order; but whenever the targets appear, the line will fire whether it has moved or not; the targets will appear ten times, but each man must only fire one shot each time.

Sights may be adjusted at any time, but rifles must not be loaded until the targets appear.

4. Penalty for each infringement of any of these regulations will be 3 points.

The officer in each section will have to see that these regulations are observed.

Richochet shots will be counted as direct hits.
