

MINUTES

OF THE

TORONTO CONFERENCE,

Held in BRAMPTON, Ont.,

JUNE 8th to 15th, 1881.

THE EIGHTH SESSION of the TORONTO CONFERENCE was opened in the Methodist Church, Brampton, on Wednesday, the 8th day of June, 1881, at nine o'clock. The President, the Rev. N. R. WILLOUGHBY, M.A., occupied the chair. After singing the 323rd hymn, the Secretary, the Rev. S. J. HUNTER, read the 1st Chapter of the 1st Epistle of Paul to Timothy, and the Revs. J. C. SEYMOUR and J. HERBERT STARR led in prayer.

The SECRETARY called the Conference Roll, and 168 members answered to their names.

The Conference then proceeded to the election of a President, whereupon the Rev. JOHN GUINNIS LAIRD was chosen, who addressed the Conference in acknowledgment of the honour conferred upon him.

The ballot for Secretary resulted in the re-election of the Rev. S. J. HUNTER.

Lake's return to the work quite improbable, and they recognized the honourable manner in which he voluntarily resigned his parchment, because of being wholly engaged in business, which he deemed inconsistent with the relation he sustained to the ministry. The rest of the brethren, whose names are recorded as above, withdrew from the Methodist ministry and received their proper credentials. wo probationers also withdrew—Thomas H. Gilbert and Joseph Waite—the latter because of ill health.

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QUESTION.-Who have died since last Conference? I.-REV. ROBERT DARLINGTON.

Bro. Darlington was born in Ballytoney, County of Wicklow, Ireland, in 1807, and died in Brooklin, Ont., April 14th, 1881. When about twenty-two years of age, he was converted to God under the labours of the Rev. Fossey Tackaberry, and at once united with the Methodist Church.

He was soon appointed to the offices of class and prayerleader, then exhorter and local preacher, all of which he filled with pleasure and profit.

In the year 1833 he came to Canada, and in 1840 he was taken into the itinerant work, on the Whitby Circuit, as a supply. In 1841, he was received on trial, and travelled afterwards on the Nelson, Peterborough, Colborne, and Markham Circuits, with acceptability and success. In 1848, his health failed, and he was compelled to retire from the active work of the ministry—never more to enter the ranks.

He located in Brooklin, where he continued to reside, until called away from earth. During these years he had charge of a class, and preached on his own and adjoining Circuits. As a preacher, he was up to the average; as a class-leader, he excelled. At times he was a very great sufferer, which drew him nearer Christ, his afflictions being sanctified by grace. He loved dearly the Church of his choice, and defended most earnestly her doctrines and usages.

As he neared eternity he was much in prayer, and had a firm faith in Christ as his Saviour. He disclaimed all merit in himself, but relying solely on the redeeming blood of Jesus, he passed in peace and triumph to his eternal rest.

2.—REV. EPHRAIM M. KOYLE.

S. nada, and settled urs of age, under the ministry of the late Ezra Healey, he was led to true repentance, surrendered all to God, and united in membership with the Church. In April, 1840, he was appointed a leader, and in November following, an exhorter. The next year he entered Upper Canada Academy, where he laid the basis of an education by which he became better equipped for usefulness, both as a preacher and worker in the cause of truth.

He became a minister of the Methodist Episcopal Church in 1843, and two years after was united in marriage to Frances second daughter of the late James and Mary Culp, of Beams-After ten years acceptable service in the Methodist ville. Episcopal Church, he offered himself to the Wesleyan Methodist Conference, by whom he was received into full connexion. in June, 1853, and maintained, during the whole of his ministry, an unblemished reputation. His tendency of mind was literary. During the earlier part of his ministry he translated the whole of the New Testament in Greek, and, later on, he wrote a Critical Exposition of the Prophecies of Daniel. He was a man of more than ordinary intellect. His convictions of sin and duty were strong, and his conversion very clear. He was a devoted husband, a tender father, a sincere and abiding friend, a faithful minister, and a conscientious administrator of the Discipline of his Church. The fruit of his labours on many Circuits remain to this day. He had the satisfaction of knowing, during his life, that he had been an instrument in the hands of God of leading, at least, three thousand souls to the Saviour.

Bro. Koyle retired from the full work of the ministry, June, 1878. After the late Belleville Conference, he took up his abode in Cobourg. His health, sometime prior to his decease, was feeble; but not such as to excite apprehension of danger. On the last Wednesday evening he spent on earth, he accompanied his wife, as usual, to the class-meeting, where his testimony was very cheering, and his confidence in his Saviour's willingness and ability to save very child-like. It was just such a testimony we would like to have from lips we knew would soon be sealed

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by death. On Sabbath morning, November 21st, he appeared better than usual, and was a most devout worshipper in the house of the Lord. A few moments before the commencement of the evening service, he took his seat in church with his wife and son, and, after rising from private prayer, opened to the hymn chosen for the service. The bell was about to cease ringing, when the hymn-book gently fell from his hand, his head slowly drooped, and, though medical assistance was promptly rendered, human skill was unavailing. He, who a few minutes before, walked up the aisle into his pew, suddenly left the earthly house of his tabernacle, and, leaning upon the arm of his "Beloved," was led "through the valley of the shadow of death " into the " land of rest, the saints' delight." To those of the congregation who live near to God it must have been sublimely hallowing. On many there rested the solemn awe that dares not move. The "still, small voice" of God whispering "Be ye also ready, for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of Man cometh," was heard by all as never before.

Bro. Koyle's body was interred at Gormley, and a funeral sermon preached by the Rev. Reuben E. Tupper, a life-long friend. A memorial service also was conducted, at Cobourg, by the Rev. T. W. Jeffery, pastor of the Church, who preached, and the Rev. Richard Jones, who gave a concise and beautiful sketch of the life and labours of our departed brother:—

"When Thou sendest, Lord, for me, O let the messenger be love."

3.—REV. THOMAS HAMILTON.

Thomas Hamilton was born near the town of Newry, County Down, Ireland, in the year 1810. His parents were pious members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, and brought up their children under its influence. Surrounded by circumstances so favourable to religious knowledge and conviction, Thomas Hamilton grew up to manhood. At the age of eighteen

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or twenty years was convinced of sin, converted to God, and became a member of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. In the year 1832 he emigrated to Canada, and resided for some time at Port Hope, where he held the office of class-leader in the Church. He returned to his native country in 1835. Soon after his return home he joined the Primitive Methodists, and became one of their preachers. He travelled with that body about seven years, preaching in Ireland, England, and Wales. In 1844, he emigrated to Canada again, and settled in the Township of Clarke. In his new Canadian home he resided fifteen years. The New Connexion Methodist Church having a society in the neighbourhood he at once united with that people, and in the year 1859 was called by them into the itinerant ministry, in which he travelled sixteen years. At the time of the union between the New Connexion and the Wesleyan Methodist Churches, in 1874, his name was placed on the list of superannuated ministers. In this relation he served the Church faithfully to the end of life. He was always willing and ready to preach, and otherwise assist in promoting the work of God as he had opportunity. From the time of his retirement he lived at Meaford, with the exception of two years, during which he laboured as a supply, one on the Maxwell Circuit, and the other at Klineburg. His death was sudden and unexpected. On the morning of Saturday, May 21st, 1881, he arose, after a night of sound sleep, complaining of a pain in his chest, but saying he was not sick. At the request of his wife he lay down again, hoping to be relieved in a short time. She left him for ten or fifteen minutes to attend to some business. When she returned to his room he was asleep, as she thought; but it was the sleep of death. The sad news spread rapidly, and cast a gloom over the whole community. He was widely known, and highly respected in the neighbourhood where he spent the latter years of his life. He died in the seventy-second year of his age. " The memory of the just is blessed." " The righteous shall be had in everlasting remembrance."

4.—Rev. John Sanderson.

Our departed brother was born on the 12th of June, 1795, in Church Hill, County Fermanagh, Ireland. He was converted to God when about eighteen years of age, and at once united with the Wesleyan Methodists. His rapid improvement in grace and gifts led to his appointment soon afterwards to the office of a leader. This was followed soon after by a license to exhort, and in another brief space of time he was placed on the plan as a local preacher. These several positions he filled with credit to himself, and with hearty acceptance on the part of the people. He was recommended to the Irish Conference as a candidate for the full work of the ministry, but the rule which excluded married men as probationers debarred him from the desired position. Many persons who had profited by his ministrations as a local preacher having left their fatherland, and having settled in the Township of Cavan, urged him to come to this country. In compliance with their counsels he left his native land, with his wife and young family, in May, 1831, and landed in Quebec. Without delay he came on with other friends, and made his home among those whose call to him had been, "Come over . . . and help us." The friends, to whose invitation he had responded, belonged to the party that, under the leadership of the Rev. Henry Ryan, had a short time previously separated themselves from the Wesleyan Methodist Church. This small body bore the name of the "Canadian Wesleyan Methodist Church." An opening into its itinerant ministry having presented itself, Brother Sanderson entered it, and laboured with success, leaving behind him a blameless record. When this body became united with the "New Connexion," Brother Sanderson withdrew from its fellowship, and united once more with the Church of his earliest association, "The Wesleyan Methodist Church of Canada, in connection with the British Conference." This was about the year 1840. In the ranks of its ministry, with an unsullied record, and "in labours

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more abundant," he nobly stood until his failing strength convinced him and his brethren that his active work was done. In 1863 he took up his abode in Peterboro', where he resided for the remainder of his life, loved and respected by all who knew him.

In the bosom of this truly Christian family, in almost unobtrusive and quiet piety, he ended his pilgrimage. Dr. Carroll remembers him since 1833, and in a note to the writer says, that "he was esteemed as a faithful man, of good natural ability, who, with larger early mental culture and discipline, would have been more than a mediocre preacher." In his circuits he was beloved by his people, and respected by the community at large. His last days were associated with much physical suffering, which he bore with true Christian fortitude and resignation. He had no transports of joy, but solid comfort and abiding peace, the result of his unshaken trust in the merits of the Divine Redeemer.

He departed this life at 1.30 p.m. on Friday, 13th August 1880; and, on the following Sunday, his mortal remains, followed by a large concourse of our worthiest citizens, were deposited in the Little Lake Cemetery, there to await the summoning voice of the Archangel and the trump of God.



Your Committee beg to state, that their report is very gratifying, as it shows an increase in every department of Church work.

In the membership of the Church, assuming that the membership of the Saskatchewan and Japan Districts, and of Prince Arthur's Landing, in the Algoma District is the same as last year, we have an increase of 1,284.

The Sabbath-School work progresses rapidly. We report an increase of 57 schools, 126 officers and teachers, and 1861 scholars.

The Connexional Funds are in a healthy state. We report an increase in the Contingent Fund of \$97.38; in the Educational Fund of \$32.24; in the Sunday School Fund, \$62.40; in the General Conference Fund, of \$40.44, and in the Superannuation Fund, of \$319.95.

Your Committee would also report that, in accordance with the resolution of last years' Conference, they prepared a schedule for publication in the Minutes, and which shows that \$154,534.91 were paid for Ministerial support.

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3. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS.

Your Committee beg to present the following report:

1. Concerning a memorial from the Owen Sound District Meeting, proposing that the pastoral address be printed in sheet form and read, with suitable comments, to the congregations on the first Sabbath after Conference. While approving the general design of the memorial, your Committee consider some of its details impracticable. They recommend, however, that ministers attend to this part of their duty with the least possible delay, and that with a view to this, the Minutes of Conference be sent to them as early as practicable.

2. A memorial was received from the Lindsay District Meeting, calling attention to the large and painful deficiencies sustained by our domestic missionaries, and, in view thereof, proposing that the Central Board retrench the appropriations to our Japan work; that they employ but one clerk in the Mission Rooms; and that, where practicable, Indian Missions in Ontario be connected with the adjacent circuits and missions.

Concerning the first of these proposals, your Committee recommend no change. With regard to the second, they recommend that the Central Board be requested to employ only one clerk; or, if two be necessary, to employ one of them at a lower salary than at present. The third proposal has aready received the attention of the Stationing Committee.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

6. REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee have much pleasure in submitting their report for the present year, inasmuch as there are several facts which indicate a marked improvement in this important department of Church work. There is an increase of 62 Schools, and 1,692 Scholars, with 242 Teachers.

The number of conversions reported is 3,087, a larger number than was ever reported at any former year; 6,797 are reported as meeting in class, an increase of nearly 2,000; 6,233 are reported as learning the Catechism—a good increase. Still, the number is only about one in six of the total number of scholars. Your Committee would again most emphatically urge upon the members of the Conference to do their utmost to get this excellent formula into more general use. If we intend the Church to be sound in the faith we must begin with the children and fill their minds so full of the truth that there will be no room for the seeds of error. This is not the day for Methodists to

be indifferent about their doctrines. We may learn a lesson from the Church of Rome in this respect, and while we repudiate the errors of that Church we may nevertheless emulate their zeal by looking well after the children.

Another matter to which your Committee would beg to call the attention of the Conference is children's meetings. The founder of Methodism laid it down as a rule that where but ten of the children of our people can be got together, the minister was to meet them. Your Committee believe that such meetings would be of great service in securing the children to the Church of their fathers. Your Committee are also glad to record the fact that the collection for the General Sunday School Board has been better observed than at any former year. They do, however, regret that there are some important Circuits which neglect to take the collection. Such a course is not only unfair to other schools, but it is a violation of the Discipline.

Your Committee would recommend that the collection be taken in the month of September, and they hope that next year all will remember the collection.

It affords your Committee much pleasure to learn that the Sunday School publications at our own Book Room are in increasing demand, and they hope that the time may soon come when all our schools will patronize that establishment as they feel assured that said publications are equal, or even superior, to those of any other house, and the ministers are respectfully entreated to aid in this department. In respect to other publications, your Committee would entreat the ministers to discountenance those all in their power, as some of them are semi-secular and unpatriotic, and should by no mean, be circulated in our schools, especially on the Sabbath.

In conclusion, your Committee can only reiterate the sentiments which they have expressed in former years respecting the importance of using every means possible to induce the children to practice the principles of Temperance, and they would also recommend that they should be encouraged to render increased aid to the missions, either

8. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

We rejoice that from the commencement, Methodism has ever taken a firm and decided stand on the subject of Temperance. In harmony with the past, we are as firmly as ever persuaded that it is the imperative duty of the Methodist Church to speck out and act with all the emphasis and power possible, upon every suitable occasion, until this terrible evil is conquered, and total Prohibition becomes the law of our Dominion.

In order to aid in the progress, and bring about the ultimate triumph of this cause, for which thousands are praying, and which will so redound to the temporal and spiritual welfare of millions, we cordially recommend—

1st. That the Temperance Question should continue to occupy at all times a very prominent position in all our Church periodicals, for our young peop

2nd. That all our ministers and preachers be most respectfully and urgently requested, in view of the enormity of this evil and the havoc wrought in our churches and communities, to frequently preach upon the subject.

3rd. That special Temperance prayer-meetings be held in all our churches, and that our people be requested to earnestly pray the great Head of the Church, that the Divine blessing may rest upon the efforts put forth for the sup pression of this evil.

4th. We heartly re-affirm the urgent recommendations of previous years: That as the Dominion Parliament has placed within our reach a law which is the nearest approach to Total Prohibition ever enacted by our Legislature, we would most earnestly impress upon all our people, as their conscientious duty, the necessity of aiding in the passing, and thorough enforcement, of the Canada Temperance Act of 1878, until we can, at an early date, secure Total Prohibition, without which we will not rest satisfied. We rejoice that this Temperance Act has already been adopted in two cities, and in twenty-two counties in our Dominion, and that most encouraging reports have been received of its beneficient effect.

5th. We rejoice at the continued zeal and usefulness of the Dominion Alliance, and most cordially recommend our people to sustain and aid it in its grand efforts, especially in its watchfulness and zeal for the preservation of the Temperance enactments now in force, against the incessant attacks of its unscrupulous enemies who are ever on the alert to weaken or destroy it.

6th. In reference to the resolution of the Walkerton District, anent the character of the wine used at the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, we would most emphatically re-affirm the requests of previous years, that as it is now within the reach of all our people to obtain for this solemn service the pure juice of the grape, harmless in its effects, and a fit emblem of the precious blood of our blessed Lord;

therefore we would most earnestly recommend our people to use it and no other.

7th. Your Committee recommend that provision be made for the establishment of Temperance Societies in connection with our Churches, under the direct supervision of the Conference, and that a Secretary be appointed, whose duty it shall be to direct and advance the interests of this work. We believe that by such a system of societies our Church would take its true position, and be more effective in relation to this great reform.

Your Committee regret that the recommendation of the Conference of last year was so completely ignored in reference to their request, that a column be placed in the Schedules for the returns of the number of children who are pledged to Total Abstinence in our Sunday Schools.

In harmony with the suggestion, as to the advisability of having a Secretary for the Temperance Society of the Toronto Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada, it was unanimously carried in the Committee that the Conference be respectfully requested to appoint, to this important position, the Rev. Thos. W. Campbell, B.D.

9. REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS OF ONTARIO LADIES' COLLEGE, WHITBY.

The Directors of Ontario Ladies' College, in this their Seventh Annual Statement to the Toronto Conference, are pleased to be able to report progress. The past collegiate year has been, in many respects, one of gratifying success. The average attendance of boarders has been seventy-three, of day-pupils twenty,-showing an advance on last years'

attendance, and encouraging us to expect continued and increasing prosperity. The Directors never felt more fully convinced, than at present, of the efficient condition of every department of the College—literary, musical, fine art, and domestic, and do therefore confidently recommend it to the Conference and the country as worthy of the fullest confidence.

The Principal and Lady-Principal are well known for scholarship and teaching ability, as well as kind and judicious oversight; the subordinate teachers are selected with great care; and we have, therefore, no hesitation in stating that the educational work of the College will meet the requirements of the most ambitious pupil, both as to range and thoroughness of instruction. The re-appointment of the Principal, Rev. J. J. Hare, M.A., also, as Governor, we think, will conduce to the efficient management of the College, and we therefore request the Conference to confirm the appointment.

We are sparing no effort or expense to make our College a refined, Christian, and happy home for young ladies, where a broad and liberal culture can be obtained at a comparatively low rate.

The buildings are large, elegant, and well adapted to school purposes; the grounds afford ample room for pleasant, exhilarating out-door exercise; the rooms are furnished in good taste with everything requisite to comfort; the table is well supplied with wholesome and nutritious diet; the cost per year, in advance, is greatly reduced; thus enabling us in all these respects to offer advantages unsurpassed by any Ladies' College in the Dominion.

We may also state that much care is taken to secure to pupils first-class intellectual advantages outside the regular College classes. Lectures—historieal, literary, and scientific —facilitating regular study and adding to general information upon subjects not included in the course are arranged for by the Governor; whilst the Lady-Principal, by frequent lectures, endeavours to form correct and refined habits of thought and action.

Physical education receives its due share of attention. Calisthenics, walking, and riding are taught by a competent master.

The Department of Music is under the direction of Prof. Fisher, of Toronto, a gentleman of well-known ability and experience, who will teach piano, voice-culture, organ, theory of music, harmony, and composition.

Being desirous of greatly increasing our attendance of boarders, we are, for next year, making exceedingly liberal offers to ministers and others who pay for their daughters' board and tuition for a whole year in advance. We commend the College to the patronage of the members of this Conference, hoping that every one may feel it a privilege and duty to contribute his influence and help to its prosperity.

10. REPORT OF VISITORS TO THE ONTARIO COLLEGE, WHITBY.

Your visitors regret that the time at their disposal did not give an opportunity for that thorough examination of the Ontario Ladies' College, Whitby, which the importance of the interests involved render desirable. The Rev. Dr. Jeffers was unable to be present, but the other two members of the Visiting Committee devoted the greater part of a day to the duty assigned them.

They are of opinion that the amount of teaching-work expected of the Principal, the Rev. J. J. Hare, is such, as to render difficult the efficient and vigorous oversight and management of the multifarious interests of the College which devolve upon him. So far as we had the opportunity of examining, we were impressed with the excellence of the instruction given by him in the important department of Natural Science, which is especially committed to his care. 1881.]

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The high reputation, as a distinguished and successful educationist, of Miss M. E. Adams, late of Brookhurst Seminary, Cobourg, renders her addition to the Faculty of Instruction highly advantageous to the College, and we doubt not that the young ladies under her charge will greatly profit from her experience and eminent accomplishments. Miss Adams also devotes much care to the religious instruction of the students of the College.

Miss Jarvis, the second lady teacher, exhibited a special adaptation to her work, and the classes under her instruction, as well as those of Miss Rorke, gave evidence of the careful and thorough training they had received.

Of the excellent instruction in the Fine Arts Department we had ample demonstration, in the numerous specimens of drawing and painting from nature and from good studies, under the direction of Miss Windeat, a former student of the Art Academy of Toronto.

A wise regard for the health of the young ladies was manifested in their admirable calisthenic drill, under Major Dearnelly.

Several of the pupils we understand have been successfully prepared for the somewhat rigorous intermediate examinations of our Public School System. We repeat the expression of regret, affirmed in former reports, that some adequate system of inspection of our Ladies' Colleges, by the Department of Public Instruction does not obtain, which would secure the official recognition of their literary degrees.

We recognize the increasing rivalry to our denominational institutions of the rapidly improving High Schools and Collegiate Institutions of the country, but we doubt not that this Conference will appreciate the continued necessity for furnishing the opportunity to parents and guardians for the higher instruction of their daughters in institutions under the direct watch-care of our Church.

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11. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee beg leave to report:

That although the evidence placed at their disposal has been meagre, it has, nevertheless, revealed many facts indicative of a healthy and prosperous state of things in the Churches and congregations committed to our charge. First among these is the numerical returns from our Circuits and Stations which show a net increase of some 1,200 in the membership of the Church. In some localities there have been extensive and powerful revivals of religion, and in others—which in the judgment of your Committee is a still more encouraging sign of the times—there has been a quiet and continuous work of grace resulting in the conversion and addition to the Church of many souls.

The subject of evangelists and of special evangelistic services have engaged the attention of your Committee. Very emphatic testimony has been borne by members of this Conference to the beneficial results which have followed the labours of at least one honoured brother, minister of a sister denomination, who has laboured extensively during the year within the bounds of the Conference, and in some instances in our own churches. As the result of the services conducted under his leadership it is believed that considerable numbers have found their way unto our own as well as into other communions. And this, among other things, has suggested to the minds of your Committee the enquiry whether it might not be wise for the Conference to set apart certain of its own members to this special department of Church work. It is well known that some who have no more than ordinary qualifications for the regular pastorate, have special gifts for distinctively evangelistic work; and it is believed that some of these might be fully separated to this work, with decided advantage to the work. In this way, while we would secure all the advantages connected with the

labours of outside evangelists, we would have a guarantee for the orthodoxy and ethical soundness of their teaching which we cannot have in respect to such as are beyond our control.

Your Committee are of opinion that the prevalent skepticism of the times has not made itself felt to any considerable degree in our congregations, and they are of opinion that the most effectual means of shutting out from the minds of our people this appalling form of error is that they be thoroughly instructed in the doctrines of our holy religion. The lucid exposition of the Holy Scriptures, and the thorough presentation of that doctrinal system which we have received from our fathers, and in which we believe the most essential principles of these scriptures are embodied and set forth, your Committee are fully aware of the difficulties with which this sort of doctrinal and instructive preaching is beset, at a time like the present, when, as it is to be feared, so many are attracted to places of worship whose chief object of pursuit is of entertainment, but they are satisfied that at any cost in the form of sacrifice of popularity if needs be, the positive, accurate, and careful teaching of our pulpit should be maintained. This is not the time when the teaching function of the ministry should be abandoned or held in abeyance. The Sunday School and Bible Class, valuable as they are as auxiliaries to the pulpit in this respect, can never take its place or do its work. The same may be affirmed with equal truthfuluess of the press. It is not easy to set too high a value upon a sound and pure religious literature; and it is matter of devout thankfulness that religious books and periodicals of the purest and best character are so easily procured that the humblest homes need not be without an abundant supply of them. It must not be forgotten, however, that amid the busy bustling activities of this restless age, there is great danger of these being treated with habitual neglect. As a matter of fact, it is believed, the reading of a considerable proportion of Church members is almost entirely confined to the daily So far as our own doctrinal standards are connewspapers.

cerned, humiliating as the thought may be, it is believed that among our people generally they are but little read. It follows that if they know our doctrines, especially if they get such an intelligent hold upon them as to make them a defence against the prevailing skepticism and error which are abroad, it must be as the result of careful instruction from the pulpit.

Prominent among the dangers to which our people are exposed, and from which they need to be vigilantly guarded, which have been brought to the notice of your Committee, is the encroachments of the world in the form of the inordinate pursuit of pleasure, of gain, and of worldly distinction. Against the former of these, the young people committed to our charge, require to be faithfully warned. A wise and prudent enforcement of our Discipline touching the matter of amusements which cannot be indulged in in the name of the Lord, or consistently with the dignity, gravity, and purity which becomes the character of those who profess to be the sons and daughters of the Lord Almighty was, perhaps, never more needed than it is to-day. But of still greater importance is it that those principles of honour, and uprightness in the transaction of the business of life which constitute the essential elements of commercial morality should be, at any cost, maintained in their integrity in our This is a large and difficult subject which requires Church. more time and thought for its elaboration and effective treatment than your Committee have been able to bestow upon it. But though they have not been able to enter at length into its discussion, they could not allow the opportunity to pass without inviting the earnest attention of the Conference to a matter of such vital importance. There is danger in these times that religion should become a thing of the Sabbath and the sanctuary, and that its precepts and principles should not be allowed to exert their proper influence during the secular days of the week on the common business of every-day life. The gambling spirit which pervades the commercial world, the parent of such manifold disaster, and which is fraught with so much peril

To point this out with the distinctness which its importance demands is one of the most delicate and difficult, but at the same time, one of the most imperative duties of the pastor.

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COURSE OF STUDY

TO BE

PURSUED BY CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY IN THE TORONTO CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH OF CANADA.

Preliminary—English Branches: English Grammar and Composition, Arithmetic, Geography, Ancient History (Schmitz'), Modern History (Collier's British Empire). Eiblical History: New Testament History (Smith's). Theology: Wesley's Sermons, i. to lii.; Wesley on Christian Perfection.

The standard of qualification for young men recommended to be received into our Conferences as Probationers, shall not be lower than fifty per cent., of the marks on the Preliminary Course of Study.

Any Candidate who may present a public school teacher's certificate of the second class, or a certificate of having passed a matriculation examination at any of our Universities, shall not be required to be examined on the English branches of the Preliminary Course ; but he shall be required to pass an examination on the subjects of Biblical History and Theology—two and three, Preliminary Course—before the Examining Board of his Conference, or for the College at which he may be pursuing his studies.

First Year.—Biblical Introduction (Angus' Hand-book, Pt. i.); Biblical History (Smith's Old Testament History); Theology, (Fletcher's Checks, Chaps. i. v.)

Second Year.—Exegesis (Wesley's and Watson's Notes on Matthew; Wesley's and Whedon's Notes on John); Church History (Kurtz' History of the Church to the Reformation, Stevens' History of Methodism to the death of Wesley); Theology (Watson's Institutes, Part ii. Chaps. i. to xvii.)

Third Year.—Exegesis (Wesley's and Whedon's Notes on Roman's); Rhetoric (Whately's); Church History

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Fourth Year.—Theology (Watson's Institutes, Parts iii. and iv.) Apologetics (Hopkins' Evidence of Christianity; Garbett's Dogmatic Faith); Logic (Whately's); Metaphysics, Hamilton (Bowman's American Edition); Stewart's Active and Moral Powers; Discipline of the Methodist Church of Canada.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR GRADUATES IN ARTS.

Candidates who have proceeded to a degree in Arts, or who may do so prior to Ordination, shall pursue the following Course of Study:

Preliminary.—Theology (Wesley's Sermons, i. to lii.; Wesley on Christian Perfection); Biblical History (Smith's New Testament).

First Year.—Biblical Introduction (Angus' Hand-book, Part i.); Theology (Fletcher's Checks i. to v.)

Second Year.—Biblical History (Smith's Old Testament); Theology (Garbett's Dogmatic Faith); Hopkins' Evidences of Christianity.

Third Year.--Exegesis (Gospel of Matthew and John in Greek; Wesley's, Watson's, and Whedon's Notes on Matthew and John); Church History (Kurtz' History of the Church to the Reformation); Theology (Watson's Institutes, Part ii., chaps. i. to xvii. inclusive, and Part iii. and iv.)

Fourth Year.—Exegesis (Epistles to the Romans in Greek; Wesley's and Whedon's Notes on Romans); Church History (Fisher's History of the Reformation; Stevens' History of Methodism to the death of Wesley); Theology (Watson's Institutes, Part ii., chap. xviii. to the end); Discipline of the Methodist Church of Canada.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR PROBATIONERS AT COLLEGE.

All Candidates on Probation, except Undergraduates in Arts, who are recognized by their Annual Conference as such, on being appointed to College, shall pursue the following Course of Study:

First Year.-Systematic Theology; Exegesis; the Greek Language; Homiletical Studies; Rhetoric and the English Language; Logic; Church History; Hebrew, or Natural Science.

Second Year.—Systematic Theology; Exegesis of the New Testament in Greek; Homiletical Studies and Elocution; Metaphysics; Church History; Hebrew, or Natural Science.

Third Year.—Historical Theology; Exegesis of the New Testament in Greek; Homiletical Studies; Ethics and Evidences; Old Testament Exegesis, or Natural Science.

The option allowed in No. 5 each year shall be determined by the Faculty of Theology according to their judgment of the circumstances and ability of the student.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR CANDIDATES FOR THE GERMAN WORK.

All Candidates, before being recommended to the Conference to be received on trial, shall pass a satisfactory examination in the following subjects :----

Preliminary.—Elements of German Grammar; Nast's Larger Catechism; The Calverin Church History; The Discipline of the Methodist Church of Canada.

After admission on trial, they shall be examined each year during their probation as follows :----

First Year.—Jacoby's Compends of Doctrines and Scripture Proofs; Wesley's Sermons, Vol. i.; Hare on Justifica1881.]

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Second Year.—Wesley's Sermons, Vol. ii.; Wesley on Christian Perfection; Fletcher's Appeal; Saucer's Church History; Wurst's Grammar.

Third Year.—Nast's Introduction to the New Testament; Lisco's Exposition of the Creed; Nast's Wesley and his Coadjutors; Pearson on Infidelity; Ahn's First Course of English.

Fourth Year.—Warren's Logic ; Luthard's Apologetics ; Harless' Christian Ethics ; Ahn's Second Course of English.

The Candidates shall present a written sermon each year on some subject embraced in the course of study.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

THE REV. JOHN BREDIN presented the Report of the Board of Examiners, as follows, which was adopted :----

The Annual Meeting of the Board was held on the 10th of June. The general results of the examinations are deemed highly satisfactory. Only one candidate wholly failed in his examination, and only one Third Class Certificate was issued. Twenty-eight young men received Second Class Certificates, most of them of a high grade; and twelve young men received First Class Certificates.

THE EASTERN SECTION, comprising the Picton, Belleville, Cobourg, and Peterborough Districts, in Brighton; to be attended by the Revs. Wm. H. Laird and S. Sing.

THE CENTRAL SECTION, including the Lindsay, Whitby, Toronto, Brampton, and Walkerton Districts, in Yorkville; the Revs. Dr. Hunter and James Thom, B.A., attending thereat.

THE NORTHERN SECTION, embracing the Algoma, Owen Sound, Collingwood, Bracebridge, Barrie, and Bradford

Districts, in Barrie"; to be attended by the Revs. John Bredin and N. R. Willoughby, M.A.

The manuscript questions shall be sent to the Secretary not later than the first day of February next. The Secretary shall supervise the printing of the questions, and afterwards distribute them.

Examiners shall report results to the Secretary immediately after the examinations.

The Rev. Dr. Harper was re-appointed Chairman, and the Rev. John Bredin, Secretary for the ensuing year.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING CANDIDATES.

Before a Chairman or Superintendent shall propose a Candidate to the Conference to be admitted on probation, such Candidate must have been a member of our Church for one year, and a Local Preacher in good standing for six months, and approved and recommended by the Quarterly Official Meeting of the Circuit or Mission on which he resides. He must also pass a satisfactory written examination, and an oral examination such as the Examiners may deem necessary, on the subjects prescribed by the Conference as the Preliminary Course of Study.

No Candidate shall be recommended by any District Meeting, to be received on trial for that year, who does not 5*

produce a certificate from the Examining Committee of the District to which he belongs. But the cases of all young men on trial shall be reported to their respective District Meetings.

All recommendations of Candidates to be received on trial shall be made at the February Quarterly Official Meeting, and the Candidates recommended shall appear before the next meeting of the Examining Committee of the District to which they belong.

The District Meeting shall require the Superintendent of the Circuit, from which any young man is recommended to be received on trial, to give a written statement of his religious character, talents and usefulness, educational advantages and acquirements, employment and means of support, and such other particulars as the meeting may deem necessary; which stotement shall be signed by him and recorded in the District Book.

If in any given year the number of Candidates recommended by the District Meeting shall be greater than the Stationing Committee deem it prudent to employ for that year, the Examining Board shall meet at Conference, and determine who are the most suitable to be employed for our Itinerant work, and who are to be placed on the List of Reserve; being governed by their own class lists and those of the District Meetings.

The District Meeting shall examine, as heretofore, all the Candidates in regard to their religious experience and belief of our doctrines, together with their general qualifications and suitability for our Itinerant work, and shall arrange them in three classes, according to the results of the Examination.

Nothing in our present Course of Study shall be understood to prevent a District Meeting, in special cases, from recommending a Candidate to the Conference for reception on trial, after examination by the Chairman, before the District Meeting, on the subject of the preliminary Course of Study. 1881.]

Cornish, and published at our Book-Room, and would express its high appreciation of the work as one of great value to both ministers and laymen, in view of the vast amount of accurate historical information which it supplies. The Conference heartily commends this Cyclopædia to the patronage of the Church.

The Superannuation Fund.

"Whereas, 'The Superannuation or Worn-Out Ministers' Fund' was established and perpetuated by annual subscription of ministers, and generous contributions derived from other sources, solely for the support and maintenance of worn-out ministers, and whereas the disbursement of the fund is largely committed to the Board of Management under certain prescribed provisions and laws, be it therefore resolved :—

I. That feeling the gravity of the responsibility to this fund; and with a deep sense of its obligations to honestly carry out the laws regulating the expenditure of the Fund, this Board cannot in justice to itself and others commute with any minister who is vigorous in health and who is physically qualified for the active work of the ministry.

II. "That in the judgment of this Board, the placing of any one on the Superannuation Fund who is not physically incapacitated for this active work, is a wrong done to the present legitimate claimants upon the fund, and also a wrong done to the same class of claimants in the near or remote

future, and is also further a perversion of the funds contributed by ministers, and others, exclusively for the support of worn-out ministers, and the widows of deceased ministers.

III. "That as the Superannuation Fund is now totally inefficient to meet the present claims of truly worn-out ministers, and widows having unquestioned claims thereon, and for whose benefit this fund was instituted, and is continued, this Board would respectfully, but as earnestly as respectfully, entreat the Conferences concerned not to place as claimants upon the fund any of its members who are physically incompetent for the active work."

Rev. J. C. Seymour's Work.

It was moved by the Rev. John Learoyd, and seconded by the Rev. George Leech, and carried, that whereas, the Rev. James C. Seymour has written and published a racy and very earnest religious book, entitled, "Voices from the Throne," and understanding that he purposes to give the profits of the book towards our Missionary work, we, the Whitby District Meeting, would cordially recommend the book to the favourable consideration of the different Conferences.

The New S. S. Hymn-Book.

Moved by the Rev. R. Duke, and seconded by the Rev. That in view of the great and growing claims of benevolent and Christian enterprises upon the liberality of the Church, and in view of the probability that these claims will be more pressing in the future than they have been in the past, we deem it of the utmost importance that the duty of devoting a portion of our earthly substance to religious and benevolent uses should rest upon an intelligent apprehension of Scripture-teaching, rather than upon mere impulses growing out of a passing interest in some particular cause, and inasmuch as we have reason to believe that the question has not received from Christians generally that This Concareful attention which its importance demands. ference directs all its Ministers to bring the subject of proportionate giving before all our congregations, showing from Scripture, the duty and its advantages, as well as the blessings, temporal and spiritual, which flow from a faithful discharge of the same, and exhorting our people everywhere to test God's promise by coming up without delay to the Scripture standard of giving to the cause of God.

The Sabbath.

Moved by the Rev, E. S. Rupert, seconded by the Rev. Dr. Sutherland, that this Conference directs that in future no reports of the Sabbath services be furnished by any member of Conference to any telegraph-operator or publisher of a newspaper on the Lord's Day, as we consider such practices inconsistent with the sanctity of the day which the Lord hath blessed.

Expenses of Delegates to Ecumenical Council.

Moved by the Rev, John Shaw, seconded by the Rev. N. R. Willoughby, that this Conference recommends that the expenses of the delegates to the Ecumenical Council be paid out of the Contingent Fund, to the extent of \$150 for each delegate that may go.

Standing Committee on State of the Work.

Moved by Dr. Young, seconded by the Rev. P. D. Will, that a Standing Committee of five, on the State of the Work be appointed, one of whom shall be a Secretary to whom the Chairmen of Districts shall send a report of the work on their Districts, not later than the May District Meeting, in order that he may prepare a General Report to be submitted to the ensuing Conference.

The Committee appointed by the President were—the President, Dr. Jeffers, J. Shaw, N. R. Willoughby, M.A., and Dr. Sutherland. The Rev. John Shaw was appointed Secretary.

An Embarrassed Church.

Resolved,—That the Rev. H. McDowell and Henry Harper, Esq., have permission to canvass for subscriptions for the relief of Wesley Church, Bolton Village, Albion Circuit.

Alternates to Ecumenical Council.

On motion it was *Resolved*,—To elect Alternate Delegates to the Ecumenical Council. Dr. Jeffers was elected from the ministers, and Warring Kennedy, Esq., of Toronto, from among the laymen by a unanimous vote. Dr. Jeffers resigned at a subsequent Session.

Standing Resolutions.

Order of Connexional Collections.

The collections in aid of the Connexional Funds shall be taken up in the following order, viz.:

- 1. CONTINGENT FUND.—In the months of September and March.
- 2. SUPERANNUATED MINISTERS' FUND.—In the month of October or November.
- 3. EDUCATIONAL FUND.—In the month of February or April.
- 4. SABBATH SCHOOL FUND.—In the month of September.
- 5. GENERAL CONFERENCE FUND.—In the month of July.

Collections for Connexional Funds.

That it is the judgment of this Conference, that when collections for Connexional purposes are appointed to be taken in any of our churches, the whole of such collections throughout the day shall be appropriated to the respective Funds to which they are related, without any deduction for the Circuit, or any Trust or other Fund.

Ministers Removing.

That in case of ministers removing, they shall be held responsible for the supply of the pulpit on their old Circuits two Sabbaths, and for the supply of the new the third Sabbath after the Canference. 1881.]

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METHODIST CONFERENCE.

Ordination Sermon.

That the Ordination Sermon be preached by the ex-President of Conference.

Application for Additional Preachers, and List of Reserves.

1. That in future no application or recommendation for the appointment of a young man, in addition to the Superintendent in any Circuit, shall be entertained by the Stationing Committee unless such application is accompanied by a distinct pledge from the Official Quarterly Meeting of such Circuit that, at the end of four years, they will receive a married man in place of such single man.

2. That the Chairmen of Districts are hereby instructed to bring before the Quarterly Official Meetings of Circuits on which a married and a single man have been stationed for the past four years, the necessity for making provision for two married men at the earliest practicable date.

3. That we recommend the formation by the President and Stationing Committee of a "List of Reserves," upon which shall be placed the names of all young men recommended for the ministry whose services are not imperatively required to supply the work.

4. That when young men are recommended for the work of the ministry, and are placed upon the "List of Reserves," it shall be distinctly understood that their probation shall not commence till they are appointed to a Circuit by the proper authorities.

Grade of Certificates of Probationers and Candidates.

That the District Meeting be required to include in their recommendations, concerning Probationers and Candidates, the average secured by them in their literary examinations, as well as the grade of their Certificates.

Constitution of the Toronto Conference Missionary Committee.

The Missionary Committee shall consist of the President and the Secretary of Conference, the Chairmen of Districts, the General Secretaries, and the Lay Treasurer of the Society, and one layman from each District, to be appointed by the laymen at the May District Meeting.

Resolved,—That as the Constitution of the General Society makes no provision for the transmission of funds to the Head Office, it shall be an instruction to the Treasurer of all Committees to transmit promptly to the General Treasurers all contributions received by them.

CONFERENCE PUBLIC SERVICES.

1.—EDUCATIONAL MEETING.

The Conference Educational Meeting was held on Wednesday evening, June 8th, commencing at 7.30, the President in the chair. Appropriate and able addresses were delivered by Rev. O. R. Lambly, M.A., Dr. Harper, and Dr. Nelles.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,-

We gladly avail ourselves of the opportunity afforded us by our annual assembling together, to renew to you the assurance of our affectionate regard, and our deep solicitude for your spiritual and eternal wellbeing, and to address to you such words of greeting and counsel as the circumstances of the time seem to us to require. The history of the past year, which has just passed under careful review, calls for devout gratitude to Almighty God, while it affords abundant evidence of your fidelity and devotion to the great interests committed to us as a Church. It is believed that in no former year was a larger amount contributed for local purposes, and yet there is a handsome increase in all our Connexional Funds. While Divine Providence has been rapidly enlarging the field committed to us for moral cultivation, and multiplying the agencies for carrying on the work, it is matter of rejoicing that there is a corresponding enlargement in the spirit of liberality which pervades our people in every part of the Dominion. So far as the

Missionary Fund is concerned, there appears to have been during the year advance all along the line, the income from almost every circuit and station being in advance of that of previous years. The united contributions of ministers and people within the bounds of the Toronto Conference alone, so far as it has been ascertained, amounts for this year to the magnificent sum of \$42,433; and if there has been—as we have no right to doubt—a corresponding increase in the other Conferences, the aggregate givings of our Church this year for evangelistic purposes alone will scarcely fall short of \$131,000. We mention these things to the glory of the grace of God, by which His people have been enabled to sacrifice so liberally and cheerfully for His service.

We rejoice also in the evidence furnished us by the returns which have been received from the various Circuits and Stations, that the same Divine agent who has inspired you, beloved brethren, with this disposition to give, has at the same time given you a mind to work. Of this we have abundant proof in what has been done in a single department of Church work. It has been to us special matter of thankfulness, that so many of you have been actively and usefully employed in ministering Sabbath-school instruction, and we rejoice greatly in the results which have been secured by your exertions in this field.

The number of Sabbath-school scholars reported as having been converted during the year is 3,087, and the number meeting in class is 6,797, being an increase of about 2,000 as compared with the previous year. It is not indeed pretended that all these conversions are the direct result of Sabbath-school instruction; but by this means doubtless much of the precious seed was sown, which has sprung up and brought forth 1881.]

fruit under the stimulating influence of those showers of blessing which have come down in connection with the various forms of evangelistic services which have been conducted with so much success in various places during the year.

The year which has just closed has had the effect of calling special atttention to the conversion of children. During this year probably more than any other in our history as a Conference, if not as a denomination, has our Father in heaven been fulfilling the Scripture which says, "Out of the mouth of babes and sucklings hast thou perfected praise." Skepticism in respect to the possibility and reality of the conversion of children, even those of very tender years was, perhaps, never more effectually rebuked than in some of the revivals which have taken place during the last few months. Hundreds, and even thousands of these little ones, have been brought to God, and have given satisfactory evidence, to experienced Christians by whom they have been examined, of the genuineness of their experience and the reality of the saving change which Divine grace had wrought in them. To some of us it appears almost like the introduction of a new dispensation, the inauguration of a new stage of Christian development, the dawning of a new era in the history of the Church, in which she shall look chiefly to the children, as the means of recruiting her membership, and when her evangelistic efforts shall be very largely directed toward bringing these little ones to the conscious experience of salvation. Without pushing this view too far, we are safe at least in recognizing in this work of grace among the children in Toronto, and many other places, a Divine call to increased diligence and earnestness in our efforts to save the little ones. And here is a work in which all

may engage. It is not the work of pastors and teachers alone, but it is the duty especially of parents to whose care more than that of any other, the spiritual interests and the immortal destiny of their own children are committed. We affectionately beseech you, whom Divine providence has put into the parental relation, that, while you avail yourselves of all the help within your reach, you do not attempt to transfer the work of the salvation of your children to anybody else, but regard it as something which has been specially committed to you, and for which you are held responsible by Him who made you parents.

At a time when so much effort is being put forth for the religious instruction of our children, it were sad indeed if we, who are more advanced in life, should fail to diligently and prayerfully study the Word of God. Never was there a time when a profound and accurate acquaintance with the Holy Scriptures was more important than it is at the present time. It is needed as a defence against the forms of error which threaten us on every side, and as the means of preparing us for the work which the Head of the Church has given us to do. The Bible is the armory of God from which our weapons must be drawn if we are to be successful in fighting the good fight of faith, that we may lay hold on eternal life. And yet, brethren, in these days of intense secular activity, when every man must move on or run the risk of being trampled under feet, and when the energies of so many are concentrated in one grand continuous and tremendous effort, if not to be rich, at least to improve their worldly circumstances, there is great danger of religious reading and thought being neglected. We are sure you will bear with us when we say that we think we can discern perilous tendencies

in this direction. We have nothing to say against the ably conducted secular newspapers which circulate most largely among our beloved people. We rejoice that Canada has a press of which, whatever may be its short-comings, we need not be ashamed. But while it is due that we say this, we do not close our eyes to the fact that the daily newspaper, valuable and almost indispensible as it is in our times, may nevertheless become the occasion of much danger and mischief, by being allowed to take the place of the Bible, and those books the reading of which tends directly to the strengthening of our faith and the nourishing of our religious life. We affectionately entreat you, brethren, to vigilantly guard against this perilous tendency of the times, and to allow nothing to divert you from the daily reading and study of the Divine Word, and that sort of literature which tends directly to keeping the soul in continuous communion with spiritual and divine things, and to keep the sympathies with all those movements which aim at the glory of God, and the promotion of the best interests of men, warm and active.

We gladly embrace the opportunity of commending to your attention the excellent publications which issue from our own Publishing House. An extended experience and observation has convinced us of the great value and importance of the GUARDIAN and the MAGAZINE. The favourable reception which they have had, and still have, from the most intelligent of our people, shows that their views are, in this respect, in complete harmony with ours. But they are not nearly as widely circulated among the members of our Church as they deserve to be. No Methodist family should be without them. Of the Sabbath-school and juvenile periodicals published by the Book Steward,

we need not speak particularly. They are too well known and too widely circulated to require any particular commendation. The accomplished Editor aims at making them all that is required to meet an important want of the Church, and we rejoice greatly in the success which has attended his exertions. The religious books printed at the Book-Room deserve special attention. There is not one of them which may not be read with advantage by our people. We especially commend our new and excellent Hymn Book, which cannot be too speedily introduced into all our congregations. The new Sabbath-school Hymnal is also worthy of high praise, and its circulation and use in our Sabbath-schools cannot fail to be productive of much good. The new edition of Wesley's Fifty-two Doctrinal Sermons, in which the doctrines of our Church are compendiously, lucidly, and popularly set forth, with Introduction, Analysis, and Notes, by Dr. Burwash, deserves to be owned and read and studied by every Methodist. There are other works which we would like to mention, but time would fail us. We commend this matter to your prayerful consideration.

We have been greatly cheered by the representations which have been made to us during our Conference Sessions in respect to the noble work which is being accomplished by our Educational Institutions. They all appear to be in a state of vigorous and healthy operation. We need not speak particularly to you, beloved brethren, of the character of our noble Victoria University. Its works praise it. sufficient to give it a powerful claim upon the sympathy and support of the Methodist people throughout this country. Never was it more important to us as a denomination, never, as we believe, more important as a bulwark against the surging tide of skepticism and materialistic atheism which is setting in upon us, and threatening to sweep away from the science of the time the last vestige of anything like a direct recognition of the Divine. This is not the time to have the chairs of our Universities filled with anti-Christian or irreligious men, or to have the leaders of the coming generation trained anywhere else than beneath the shadow of the Cross. Of our excellent Theological Schools at Cobourg and Montreal, and of the work which they are doing, it is not easy to speak in terms of too high commendation. The time has come when, if we are to efficiently perform the work which has been committed to us, we must have a ministry which is not only intellectually disciplined and furnished, but which is also theologically trained. The time has passed when any one, whatever may be his natural endowments, can take up the work of a public instructor without a special training for it. The Christian ministry forms no exception to this rule. Though many of us who now speak to you have not had those advantages which our younger brethren who are coming forward to take our places have, we greatly rojoice in the facilities afforded them by our Theological Schools to get a sort of training which was not accessible to us at an earlier day. We heartily commend these institutions to your prayerful sympathy and your liberal support. If we say but little of our efficient and prosperous Ladies' Colleges, at Hamilton and Whitby, it is not because we do not set a very high value upon them and the noble work

which they are doing. We heartily commend them to your patronage and support.

There is another matter upon which we feel it to be our duty to say an affectionate and earnest word. While we gladly bear testimony to your abounding liberality, and hail with pleasure the fact that there has been an increase in all our Connexional Funds, we do not conceal from you the fact that our hearts have been greatly pained to learn that the income of the Superannuated Ministers' Fund, even this year, will not be sufficient to enable the Board by which that fund is administered, to pay our worn-out ministers, and the widows and orphans of such, the full amount of their At best, if every cent were paid, they allowance. would not, even those of them who have been longest in the work, have anything like enough to furnish them with a comfortable support. The cutting down of their scanty allowance, therefore, while it involves a serious injustice, of which a Christian Church ought not to be guilty, can scarcely fail to be the cause of much hardship and suffering. Brethren, these things ought not so to be, and we are persuaded that your attention only needs to be pointedly called to the matter, and this debt of justice and honour will be discharged.

"And now, brethren, we commend you to God and the word of His grace, which is able to build you up, and to give you an inheritance with all them that are sanctified." "We beseech you to present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. And be not conformed to this world; but be ye transformed, by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good and acceptable and perfect will of God." Remember, that Time is flying, that Eternity is just in advance of 1881.]

We long for a fuller consecration, for greater purity of life, for more intimate communion with God, for more of the heroic and self-sacrificing element of our holy religion which was so conspicious in the character of our Father, and for a richer endowment with power from on high, that in the year upon which we are entering our ministry may be a thousand-fold more fruitful than it has ever been in the past. "Brethren, pray for us." "Be sober, be vigilant, because your adversary, the devil, as a roaring lion walketh about seeking whom he may devour: Whom resist, steadfast in the faith, knowing that the same afflictions are accomplished in your brethren that are in the world. But the God of all grace, who hath called us unto His eternal glory by Christ Jesus, after that ye have suffered awhile, make you perfect, stablish, strengthen, settle you. To Him be glory and dominion, for ever and ever. Amen."
