# FOURTH BLAZE IN Montreal, Jan. 30—At a Canadian Railway Club banquet, at the Windsor Hotel here, Saturday, Hon. F. B. Carvell, said that so long as he was to preside over the railway board, freight and other rates would be fixed so as to make it possible for the railways to pay running expenses and allow a reasonable profit. In Montreal and maritime provinces, he said there was no trouble about giving the railways reasonable rates. For other parts of Canada, he was not so enthusiastic. As to wages of railway employes, this was not a subject, he said, that particularly concerned the commission, but when present rates expire a year and a half hence, the public and the employes must realize that there should be a readjustment.

Two alarms from box 5, corner of Mill and Union streets, about 11.80 o'clock on Saturday night called the fire department out to fight a serious fire in the offices of R. P. & W. F. Starr, Ltd., coal dealers, in Smythe street.
