

AIRPLANE FLIGHT

British Expedition to Start Next

London, Sept. 1—(Correspondence of The Associated Press.)—John L. Cope, leader of the expedition to the South Pole to start next June, says his airplane flight to the Pole will be about 750 miles. "We shall be compelled to take a sledge with us and extra provisions to enable us to return in case the airplane breaks down," said Mr. Cope. G. W. V. A. LEADER WHO OFPOSES GRATUITY

Pertinent Queries by Branch President Who Does Not Regard \$2,000 For All as Equitable

Toronto newspapers are filled with letters on "soldiers' gratuities" these days. The following is an interview from the Toronto Telegram with a veterans' branch president opposed to the \$2,000 grant:

"The G. W. V. A. is not half through with the government, or, failing the government, with the public," said Parkdale President A. T. Hunter, K. C., when approached by the Telegram as to his opinion of the latest decision on returned soldiers' war gratuities. "The trouble has been that the crude stuff about \$2,000 has embarrassed our efforts," he continued. "The government was the last person who should have been handed such a proposition because the government knows better than any of us what a splendid cohort of cushy fellows were at some time or another in France. It was a poor inmate of Argyll House that could not hop over to Boulogne to qualify for the French ribbon."

People who cry "Great is Diana of the Ephesians" do not ultimately assist any cause. When we have tried to talk to any business man about the question of further aid to the returned soldier he has fastened on that proposition for \$2,000 for every man that was in France." Then he asks some questions: \$2,000 for the man that was in France four years?

\$2,000 for the colonel who took a seven days' Cook's tour?
\$2,000 for the chap who stayed at Havre or Etaples?
\$2,000 for the chap who stayed in the third Echelon A Rouen?
\$2,000 for the draftee that came after the armistice? And so forth.
"At Vancouver the G. W. V. A. grew up and discarded the \$2,000 stuff as you hed a milk tooth," President Hunter added. "This War Gratuity League chum has picked up our milk tooth and tried to bite with it. Result, a sore gum.

SAVED ROLLING STOCK FROM THE BOLSHEVIKI

General Jack Tells of Evacuation of Perm a d Adjacent Districts as Soviet Forces Advanced

Omsk, July 20, via Vladivostok, Aug. 12—(Correspondence of The Associated Press.)—Ninety per cent of the railroad rolling stock in the Perm, Ekaterinburg and Sheliabinsk districts was pulled out before the territory was given over to the Bolsheviki, according to General Jack of the Inter-Allied technical committee, who assisted in the evacuation. Over 30,000 freight cars and approximately 600 locomotives were saved.

The railroad bridge over the Kama at Perm, 970 yards long, was put out of commission by the Siberian military before leaving. It is not so seriously damaged however, that it cannot be easily repaired. One complete span was dumped into the river.

The Kama fleet, thirty-nine vessels, several of which had been converted into gunboats, but later dismantled, was accidentally burned.

General Jack left Perm four hours before the Bolshevik shells began to fall in the town. With him came Otto T. Glaman, American vice consul, who had been asked by the Russian authorities to rough at his post as late as possible for the moral effect of his presence on the population during the days of evacuation. General Jack was loud in his praises of Glaman for valuable assistance rendered him in keeping trains moving.





Ohio has big game but is seeking to protect and restore her inland fisheries and bird shooting proserves. The shooting of quail is now prohibited and the authorities are now seeking to introduce the English pheasant on a large scale and have had very good success. Mr. Stuber says that the pheasants are bred on game farms and that 8,000 were sent out this spring all over the state. In addition 600 eggs went to each county of the state. Fifty game sanctuaries have been set apart where the birds are unmolested and it is intended that the overflow from these sanctuaries will soon stock the woods of the state with these fine birds. There is only a ten-day open season, from November 15 to November 25 and only cock birds may be shot. A serious effort is also being made to restock the Ohio woods with the wild turkey.

The state department is also stocking the inland waters with game fish and this year took from Lake Erie 167,000 mature fish and placed them in the inland lakes and streams. This in addition to the larger work from the hatcheries which are turning out some 2,000,000 fish every year.

It is most pathetically ruined in places and it made big lumps come in my throat. I could so well picture what the place must have been like—and outside the great dead trees and the mutilated ground—what tales they could tell! Nearly all the trenches are filled in now but one can easily trace their significant outlines.


