A "wind-rose" was charted and show-ed that 76 per cent of the cinder emit-ted from the stacks is blown into the river, due to the prevailing winds from the northwest. The other portion re-presents the area within which the re-maining 24 per cent of the cinder was distributed. This rose shows that less than one-quarter of the cinder emitted was deposited in an area from which complaints came. This fact indicates what a large amount was blown from the stacks, when less than one-quarter of it caused the protests that have been made. It is from a study of this wind rose, perhaps, that one can best appre-clate how serious this cinder problem really is, or rather was; since a success-ful catcher has been devised.
