Captain One Of First To Leave

Johnson Broke All Precedents Of The Sea

Quickly Away From The Sinking Liner Munro

Life Raft Capable of Carrying 26 Was There But Said He Had No Time to Touch It—Only Two Boats and One Life Raft Left Vessel

(Canadian Press.) Philadelphia, Pa., Feb. 12.—Breaking all precedents of the sea, Captain Edward Johnson, of the wrecked steamer Munro, was in the first boat to leave the sinking vessel, according to his own testimony late yesterday afternoon...

Some sailors cut the lashings of the life raft passed up by Captain Johnson, and it got away with four persons clinging to it. Only two boats and one life raft out of six boats and eight life rafts left the vessel.

BOY 2,500 YEARS OLD VISITOR TO THE CITY TODAY

T. G. Taylor Here With Inca Mummy Which He Found in Chili

An Inca mummy found a few months ago in Chili by T. G. Taylor, of Halifax, is a visitor to St. John today, and was displayed to the curious gaze of a chosen few at the Victoria Hotel, where it is an unregistered guest in a little green box on a bed of plush. Archaeologists have pronounced the mummy, which is that of a boy, to be at the very least 2,500 years old.

Extend The Island Breakwater at Once

Report on St. John Harbor By A. D. Swan, British Expert

Further Dredging in Channel—New Short Breakwater Off Partridge Island—Would Not Lengthen West Side Wharves to 1000 Feet—Berths Near Ferry Possible—Bridge at Head of Harbor

The report of A. D. Swan, a British harbor expert, who visited St. John last fall, has been submitted to the minister of public works and a copy was presented to the council of the Board of Trade at a meeting this morning.

I am of opinion that the present breakwater from the shore towards Partridge Island should be extended without delay, as to entirely close the gap and connect up with Partridge Island. Fairly heavy seas come through this gap at present, and what is of even more importance, is the vast amount of siltation material which is carried through tending to block up the main entrance channel.

SEPTEMBER FOR ATLANTIC FLIGHT

Aero Club's Committee Makes Study of Conditions

ENTRIES ARE COMING IN It is Found That of All Months September is Best—June Rejected Because of Thick Fog Then Off the Grand Banks

(Canadian Press.) New York, Feb. 12.—After making a detailed study of weather maps of the North Atlantic ocean for the last ten years, the water flying committee of the Aero Club of America has decided to recommend the month of September to aviators as the best month in which to attempt a trans-Atlantic flight.

"We have found that June is a bad month for the flight at St. John's, Nfld., the proposed starting point," says Henry A. Wisewood, chairman of the committee, because about two-thirds of the month is habitually foggy, and the fog extends out from the Grand Banks for a distance of a fourth way across the Atlantic.

LONELY SENTRY TRIES TO FLIRT BUT MAKES A SERIOUS MISTAKE

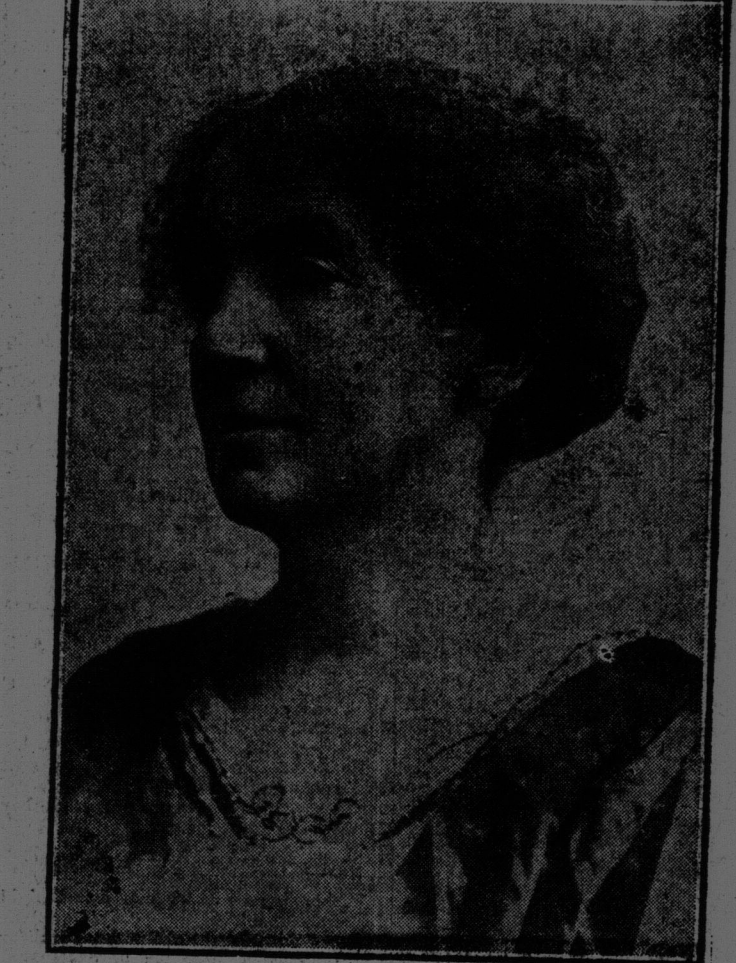
Young Woman With Whom He Wanted to Chat Was Kaiser's Daughter

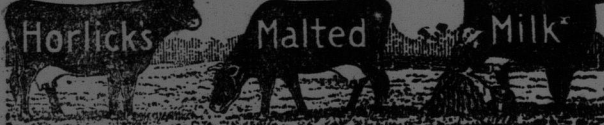

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRE

Philip MacLeod, Liberal-Conservative candidate in the federal by-election contest in Victoria, C B, yesterday defeated J. S. Morrison by thirty-two votes. At the annual dinner of the Fredericton board of trade members last night in the Y. M. C. A. hall there, more than 100 were in attendance, and optimistic speeches were made. Fredericton was forecasted as future railway and jobbing centre of the province. An able address was given by the president, J. D. Palmer. In the findings of the committees appointed to investigate the charges of corruption made against members of the Quebec legislative assembly made public yesterday, Messrs Bernard, Begevin and Mousseau were adjudged guilty of having accepted money in connection with the passage of a certain bill. Mousseau received \$4,150 and the other two something less. The school house at North Head, Grand Manan, N. B., was totally destroyed by fire last evening at a loss of \$8,000 covered by \$2,000 insurance. The Greater New York Council of Longshoremen has ordered a strike of 28,000 members of the union to begin on Monday next unless the Berwind-White Coal Co. which supplies almost all of the trans-Atlantic steamship companies, pays its men more than \$50 a month. The company employs about 6,000 longshoremen. The house of lords yesterday adopted an amendment to the address in reply to the speech from the throne by a majority of 188 in favor of a general election on the Irish home rule question. Albert McLaughlin, farmer, of Oakdale, Me., was found to death yesterday while driving. Three persons died yesterday in New York from the cold. There is much suffering in the poorer districts of the city. Schoolboys returning to their homes in Minneapolis, Minn., discovered a fire on the roof of a house, and through the use of snowballs had the fire pretty well out before the apparatus arrived.

NO QUARTER FOR TAMMANY

(New York Herald) There must be no compromise with Tammany and Charles F. Murphy, President Wilson declared yesterday to Governor Glynn, who called on him with William F. McCombs, chairman of the Democratic National Committee. "The situation in New York is excellent as the result of the conference," Mr. McCombs said. Publication of a letter from Richard Croker to the late John Fox, in which Mr. Croker said that Charles F. Murphy was a big handicap to the McCall campaign and that "the Hall" could not win under Murphy leadership, caused a stir among Tammany men. Samuel A. Beardsley, attorney for the estate of Anthony N. Brady, told in the John Doe investigation of the payment of \$25,000 by the late financier to Charles F. Murphy, and corroborated Mr. Murphy's version of the transaction by testifying that Mr. Brady said he got back one of his \$25,000 contributions.

After a supper in the Y. M. C. A. building last night the directors met in monthly session, J. Hunter White presiding, and considered routine matters and other business. The monthly reports submitted were encouraging, those of C. D. Howard, physical director; D. D. Milligan, boys' secretary; and S. O. Watt, secretary, being well received. The general report showed a total of 687 members, four less than last year.

Daily Hints For the Cook

Poor Man's Pudding. Butter a pudding dish. Over the bottom of dish, scatter half cup well washed raw rice, half cup sugar, a pinch of salt, a sprinkle of nutmeg. Then pour on one quart of milk. Bake in a medium oven one and a half hours. Don't stir at all, either before or after it goes into the oven. The time of baking may vary, but bake until the rice shows above the milk, and it is done. Every grain is separate and the milk is like cream. If the oven is too hot the milk evaporates and it is too stiff.

English Bath Buns. Sift one quart flour into bowl, add 1/4 teaspoon salt. Make hole in centre and break in four eggs, then add 1/2 cup lukewarm milk, in which dissolve one yeast cake and 1/2 cup butter. Mix thoroughly with spoon and set aside to rise in a warm place 1 1/2 hours. When light, turn out on floured board and sprinkle with five tablespoons sugar and three tablespoons chopped almonds, and work them into the mass by drawing the tips of the fingers lightly and quickly through the dough. Do not knead. Then drop by spoonfuls, 1/2 inch apart, into greased pans. Let rise 10 minutes. Bake in hot oven. This makes two dozen. Process takes about two hours and fifteen minutes.

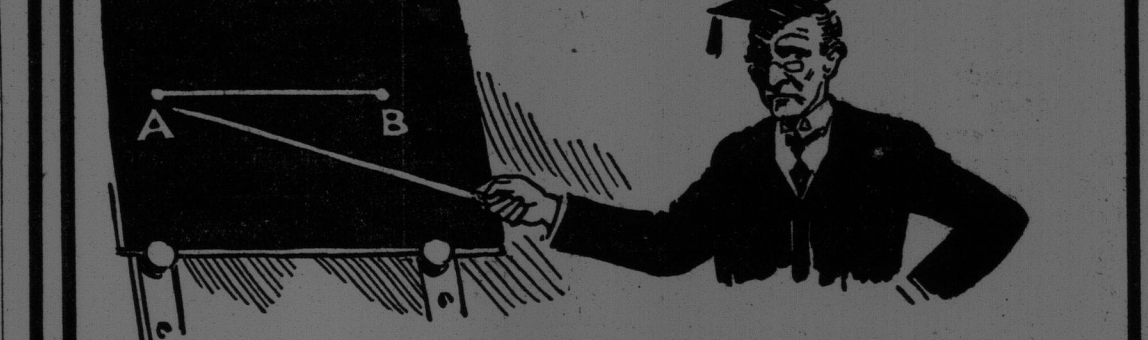

THE GUTELIUS REPORT

The long expected report of Messrs. Gutelius and Stanton on the construction of the new Transcontinental Railway is now before parliament.

The commissioners, in claiming that forty million dollars more than necessary was spent on the Transcontinental outside of New Brunswick, indicate where the over-expenditure was made.

No charge of extravagance or graft can be made in this connection. The Laurier government set out to make the Grand Trunk Pacific the best line of railway on this continent.

All the charges and imputations thrown out by the Tory press before the report was placed before parliament are reduced to this one fact, that Messrs. Gutelius and Stanton would have given the country a poorer railway, which of course would have cost less.

One of the reforms which is making very slow progress in Canada, and none at all in the province of New Brunswick, is that of providing for better care of the feeble-minded.

An Offer to Board of Trade—Rivals For South Shore Subsidy

At a meeting of the council of the board of trade today a letter was presented from Harry M. Jones in which he announced his intention of starting in April to make a long distance flight by stages of varying length from Buffalo through Ontario and Quebec, around Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia and thence to New Hampshire.

He would include New Brunswick in his itinerary and make a stop for a day at St. John if sufficient inducements are offered. The letter was referred to the exhibition association.

A. H. Wetmore and F. deL. Clements reported for the committee upon the All-British exhibition in London that Premier Fleming has not yet been advised officially of the plans. They will write to the president of the London Chamber of Commerce to ask if it is possible to have the exhibition opened and, if so, for details.

Mr. Gregory has also conducted boring operations at St. Croix. He declined to say anything concerning either case until he reported to Ottawa.

ST. CROIX HARBOR Further Inspection by Experienced Navigators—There is a Stir

(St. Croix Courier) J. M. Flewelling, secretary of the St. Stephen board of trade, has received a communication from Mr. Swan, harbor expert, who recently inspected St. Croix harbor for the dominion government. He wrote that he would be again next week, and would be accompanied by three experienced navigators, representing the principal North Atlantic shipping companies. Their object will be to make a thorough examination of the harbor and its approaches. This is very gratifying news to the board of trade members and to the people generally.

At a meeting of the board of trade this week, the secretary reported the receipt of \$20 from Captain Mowatt for the publicity fund, and of a further amount of \$100 from the board of trade of the same gentleman. Arrangements were made for having winter views of the harbor taken.

E. W. Ward reported more than \$600 of the \$1,000 publicity fund already subscribed, with several prominent citizens to be waited upon. The committee was authorized to proceed with the preparation of the proposed booklet.

The following resolution was adopted: "Whereas, matters in connection with the development of St. Croix harbor have so far advanced that it is necessary to know at what price surrounding property at St. Croix Point can be secured; therefore resolved, that the secretary of this board be required to secure the desired information, and the price at which an option can be secured."

The matter of interesting the governments of the United States and Canada in a grand celebration at this point, of 100 years of peace, in 1914, was informally discussed and some further steps taken in that direction.

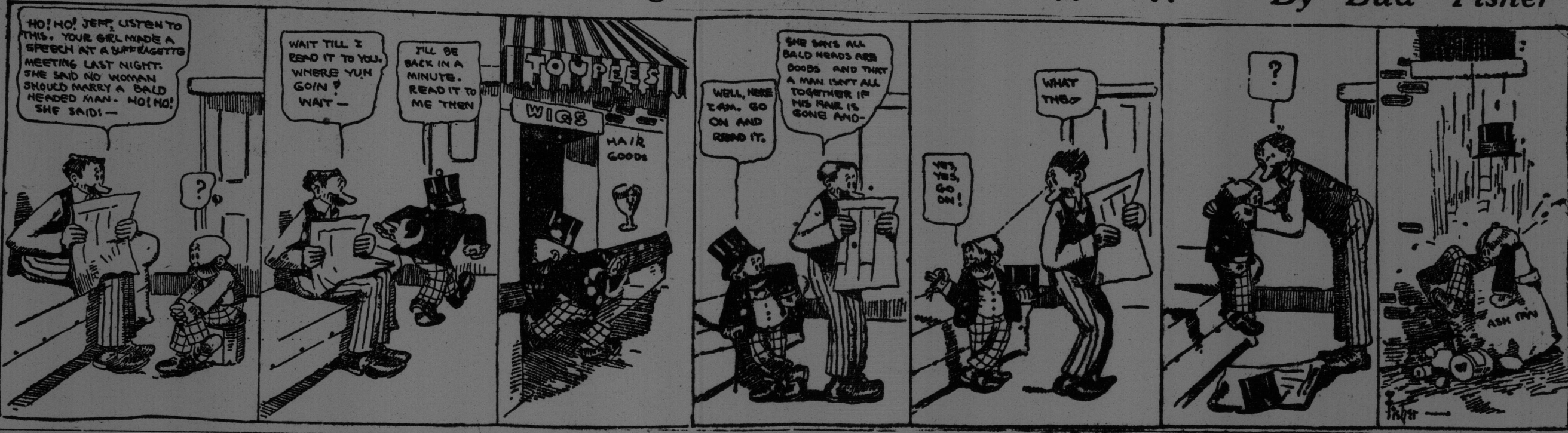

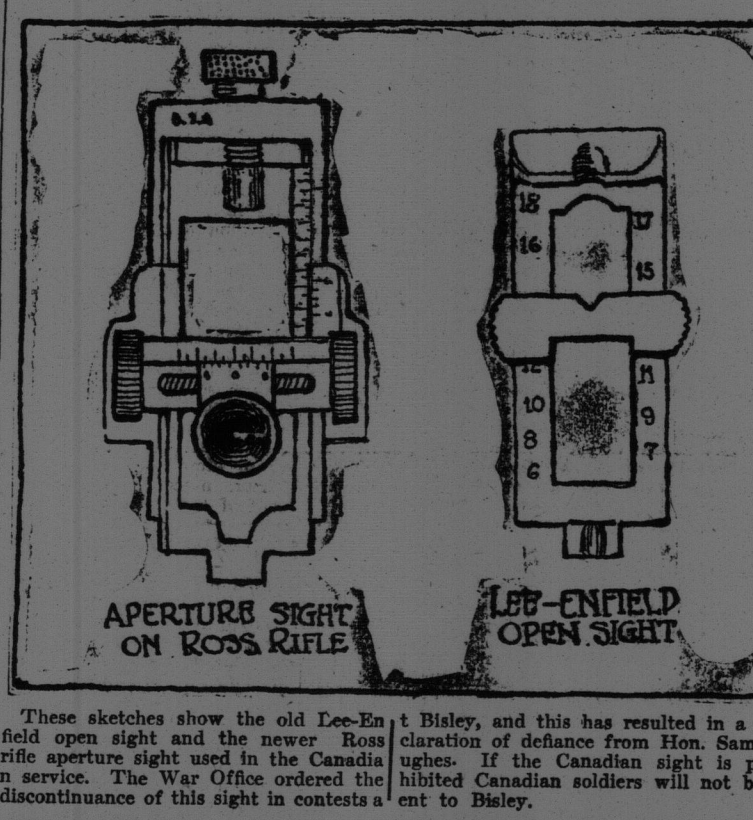

World's Series Arranged. In a four or fifth game, the arena gate is thirty per cent, while the balance is divided evenly between the competing clubs, but not among the players.

DECISION TODAY IN AMBERG CASE

Some Comment on Cases of Liquor Stealing at This Port

Joseph Amberg, charged with stealing a case of liquor from the C. P. R. while in the company's employ, pleaded nolo in the police court this morning and the preliminary hearing was concluded. E. S. Ritchie, counsel for the prisoner, said that while he thought the evidence sufficient to have his client sent up for trial, the crown witnesses were also guilty and he did not see why Amberg should be made an example of and the others go free. He stated that if Amberg be sent up for trial he is admitted to bail as he was a married man and had eight children to support.

E. C. Weyman, representing the C. P. R., said he had nothing to say except to remind the magistrate that Mr. Ritchie for the prisoner had admitted that the evidence was sufficient to have Amberg committed for trial. The magistrate reviewed the evidence which showed that the men had been drinking before it occurred to them to tamper with the liquor being shipped. He remarked upon liquor cases which had come before him in which longshoremen were involved and said that it was in the interests of their association that the drinking of liquor should not be allowed upon the premises where they were employed and that the men themselves should see that this was enforced. If the longshoremen wished it, he would be only too glad to address them and point out how they could benefit by keeping sober on the work. He also remarked that they would be giving the port a bad name by their actions as well as hurting their own reputations. In this case he was acting ministerially and not judicially and he could only commit the prisoner for trial or dismiss him according to the evidence. "When I speak of acting judicially at some times and ministerially at others," said the magistrate, "there are many persons outside the rail who will not understand what I mean, there are those inside who will not understand, lawyers sometimes do not know the difference and there are even judges who do not understand the distinction."

As another case was coming on, decision was reserved until this afternoon.

The assets are said to be about \$800 and the liabilities about \$8,000.

Mr. Fox came from County Tyrone, Ireland, to St. John in 1844 and resided here, chiefly on the west side, for two years ago when he went to his daughter's home in Fair Vale. He leaves one son, Samuel Fox, of West St. John, and one daughter, Mrs. Anthony Dobbin, of Fair Vale. The funeral will take place from his son's residence, 109 Rodney street, at 8:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

HEWSON MILLS START AGAIN

Amherst News.—The Hewson Woolen Mills resumed operations yesterday and will probably be kept running until after the committee submit their report. The committee appointed to investigate into the financial history of the Hewson Pure Wool Textile Company since the reorganization of the concern two years ago began its sitting at the offices of the company yesterday afternoon, they were again in session last evening and resumed their sittings this morning. It is understood that R. Carter was examined and that the books of the concern were up for investigation but as yet no statement has been given to the public.

DEATH OF YOUNG MAN

The death of Percy F., eldest son of Albert and Catherine Ellingwood, took place at his parents' residence, 18 Camden street, this morning. He was in his eighteenth year and had been employed for some time in the McCredy Vinegar Works. He had many friends who will regret to hear of his death. He had been in failing health for about two months. Mr. Ellingwood is survived by his father, who is an engineer with the Maritime Dredging Company, his mother, five brothers and one sister. The brothers are Joseph, LeRoy, George, Merrill and Charles and the sister is Miss Gladys, all at home. The funeral will take place on Sunday afternoon.
