



The Fifteenth Austrian Division has been entirely captured, including three regimental standards, twenty-three guns, eighteen machine guns, two aeroplanes, 150 officers and more than 12,000 men of the ranks.

As far back as August 22, the centre of the Austrian army was broken and the movement of German reinforcements along the left bank of the Vistula was stopped. The entire Forty-Ffth Austrian regiment was captured.

Our offensive action still continues. The Austrian army retreats daily. Lemberg, the capital of Galicia, is now occupied by our forces, and no fewer

than 240 guns, thirty locomotives, 150 freight cars filled with war material and many thousands of prisoners have fallen into our hands.
