

DEATH FROM A CAT'S BITE.

A Farmer Expires in Great Agony, and His Wife is Not Expected to Live.

MONROE, Ga., Feb. 11.—The news of the terrible death of Henry Womac, a young farmer, who lived six miles below Monroe, from a cat's bite, is now followed by the statement that his wife is dying from the same cause. Saturday, a week ago, Mr. Womac was sitting by the fire with one hand hanging down, when suddenly one of the house cats sprang upon his hand and fastened her teeth in one of his fingers. He swung her loose, and seeing a shovel, killed her immediately. The wound in his finger soon healed. Last Saturday morning, just one week later, the other cat suddenly showed signs of fight, and with its teeth in his hand, he was thrown to the floor. Mr. Womac was lying when she got up and he saw her in the door, the cat bit her on the neck. Her husband, hearing her screams rushed in, choked the cat and she killed it. About noon his finger began to swell and pain him, and at night he was attacked by spasms, which continued until he became so wild that his friends were compelled to fasten him up in a room by himself, where he died a most terrible death. His wife, who had pronounced her husband's death, was also attacked by spasms. Mrs. Womac's foot is swollen to such a degree that it is not expected to live until morning.
