


## THE PATRONAGE SYSTEM ABSOLUTELY ABOLISHED IN **PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT**



DEED DRAWN OVER 180 YEARS AGO Instrument Executed in 1727, Conveyin Land in Dorchester at Court House.

Boston, Nov. 20—One of the oldest deeds ever recorded in Suffolk county was brought to the registry of deeds at the court house yesterday by Charles A. Ufford, of 247 Norfolk street, Dorchester.

The instrument was drawn up Feb. 27, 1727, when George the Second was on the throne in England and this part of the world was known as the Massachusetts Bay Colony. The deed conveys three and one-half acres of woodland in Dorchester from Obadiah and Abaigall Swift to John Robinson. Although it was executed in 1727 it was not acknowledged until six years later, when the following entry was ande upon it:

"The within named Obadiah Swift personally appeared and acknowledged the within written instrument to be his free act and deed, before me, Robert Spurr, Justice Peace."

One of the peculiarities in the wording of the deed is the way in which it starts: "To all Christian people to whom these presents shall come." The present form of wording is: "Know all men by these presents"
