

The clargyman paid him another visit at 9.30 and administered to him the rights of the church.



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

PERU AND BOLIVIA NOW IN LIMELIGHT; MAY FIGHT

Some Idea That Bolivia Seeks Pretence to Engage in Hostilities---Attitude of Congress on Argentine Award Means Much.

Washington, Aug. 9.-Is Bolivia seeking! 



2. Each country shall take one-half of the gross gate taken at all the Test matches in which it takes part. The net proceeds of the stand money to be pooled for the benefit of the ground on which the match is played and the counties.

3. Each visiting team shall, in addition to the test matches, play, if possible, at least one match with each first-class county and with the M. C. C.

4. The board of control shall fix the dates of the test matches before July 31, 1911, to eanable the county secretaries to make their programmes without undue inconvenience.


