MONS SHALLOON - A fisherman's dispatch of 4th inst., says - Smallpox has broken out at three different places in Gloucester county - at Shippagan, St. Joseph's and Lager. At Shippagan, 65 miles from here, there are ten cases; at St. Joseph's, near Grand Falls, there are four cases all in one house. The health authorities claim that the infection comes from lumber camps, in some instances from Quebec. The provincial authorities and county board of health are using the most stringent measures to stamp the disease out.

Moncton Liberal Meeting. A meeting of the Moncton Liberal Association was held in Victoria Hall Monday evening, J. T. Hawke was unanimously elected president, and all the old officers were re-elected. Resolutions were passed expressing confidence in Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the general policy of the government, and in favor of the present tariff policy. Confidence in Hon. H. R. Campbell, members of the late local house and supporters of the government, were also unanimously adopted. A resolution was passed congratulating Hon. A. G. Municipal Council.

Conn. Watt read the petition of Edward Barry re exemption from taxation which was referred to the committee on petitions.

Conn. Swin - Up to a few years ago the county council appointed all revisors of taxes. Four years ago the local government decided that it should appoint one of their assessors but the county must pay their appointee. Now they have decided to pay their assessor and he would more to a committee be appointed to revise assessor's bills.

Conn. Connor, chairman of the County Accounts Committee, submitted the following report: To the Warden and members of the Municipal Council of the County of Northumberland: Your committee to whom was referred the accounts of the County of Northumberland for the year 1902, has the honor to report that a thorough audit of all the accounts was made and the following is hereby submitted:

The audit of a total of \$2031.31 is contingent account due in part to no returns being received from Rogersville in payment of their portion of road tax and a large default in collections from the parish of Chatham payable to contingent account and smaller accounts due.

The land fund shows a balance of \$905.22 and the balance of the same fund is hereby submitted. The school account shows a balance on hand of \$4391.66 as against \$4002.20 last year.

The accounts passed by your committee for the year are about \$550 less than last year. This is due to the fact that your committee submitted a large number of small accounts for the year which were not included in the total.

When we consider the large expenditure in connection with the local government and the fact that the contingent fund from different parishes, and the amount to be received from the government for the year 1902, the county is in a good financial position.
