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

But a derelict is rarely, if ever, destroyed by this means, and for the good reason that when a wooden sailing vessel which is the type of craft that the majority of derelicts are made of, reaches a condition when its crew finds it imperative to abandon it, the hull, as a rule, has become water-logged, and therefore efforts to destroy it by fire are almost always unsuccessful. Such fires as are kindled to little else except to burn away the

do little else except to burn away the upper works, therefore leaving the wreck still more invisible.

The only way to remove the menace is to search for it by a vessel specially fitted out for the purpose, and then to destroy it by disintegrating it with explosives.






