

In connection with the strength of Reading it was rumored that the Lake Shore had disposed of its holdings to certain banking interests which already exert virtual control of the property. Routine news was favorable. The sustained strength of the steel shares was favorably commented upon. In short there has been a distinct revulsion of sentiment as a result of recent market events and a gradual increase of inside inquiry. At present the only adverse influence is the possibility of an unfavorable tobacco decision, but the impression is growing that this will not be handed down for some time to come.
