RUSSIA ENLARGES SPHERE IN CHINA

Demands Independence for Mongolia Believed She Has Support of Britain and Japan in Ultimatum

Open Hostilities Renewed and Sharp Fighting Looked For—China Unable to Resist Russian Support of Separation of Outer Mongolia—Britain May Have Eye on Thibet.

Peking, Jan. 8.—Two important developments today intensified the interest in the situation in China. These were a renewal of hostilities and the demand of the Russian government that China recognize the independence of Outer Mongolia.

Will Protest. Undoubtedly a strong protest will be made by the Chinese government against the action of Russia, but China is unable to defend herself now or in the future with reference to Mongolia.

A Deadlock. The armistice between the opposing imperialist and revolutionary forces has not been renewed, and negotiations between the leaders have reached a deadlock.

Nanking, China, Jan. 8.—The republican assembly which is now in session here voted today the introduction of a gold standard modelled on that of Japan.

Wang Chung Wei, who is a graduate of Yale, London, Paris and Berlin, at all of which universities he took honors, has accepted definitely the portfolio of foreign affairs in President Sun Yat Sen's cabinet.

Steel Corporation today made known the terms and conditions under which officers and employees of the corporation and its subsidiaries may subscribe for additional preferred and common shares for the current year.

ENGLISH BIRDMAN RESCUED FROM SEA

F. B. Fowler Failed in Flight and Was Picked Up While Floating on Surface of Water Near Isle of Wight.

London, Jan. 8.—The English aviator, F. B. Fowler, was rescued from the sea in the vicinity of the Isle of Wight today in an exhausted condition after a hazardous flight. He started early in the day to fly from Bournemouth, in the county of Hampshire, to Eastbourne, on the southeast coast.

Put it in churn and add about one-fourth good buttermilk if you have it. Churn the milk until it is entirely broken up, and it will pass as superior buttermilk.

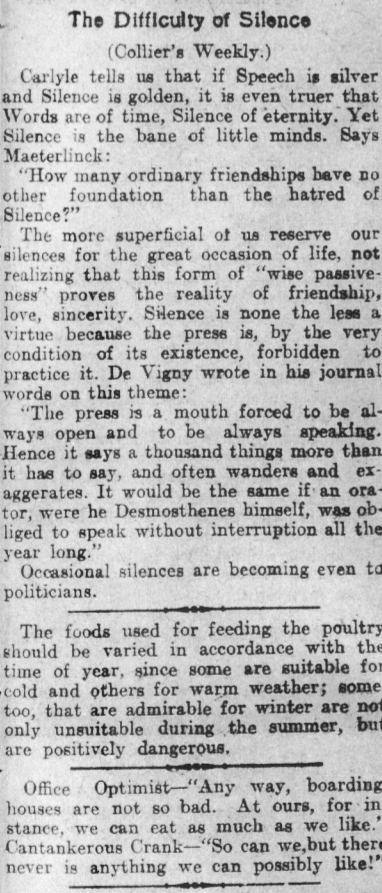
HARCOURT

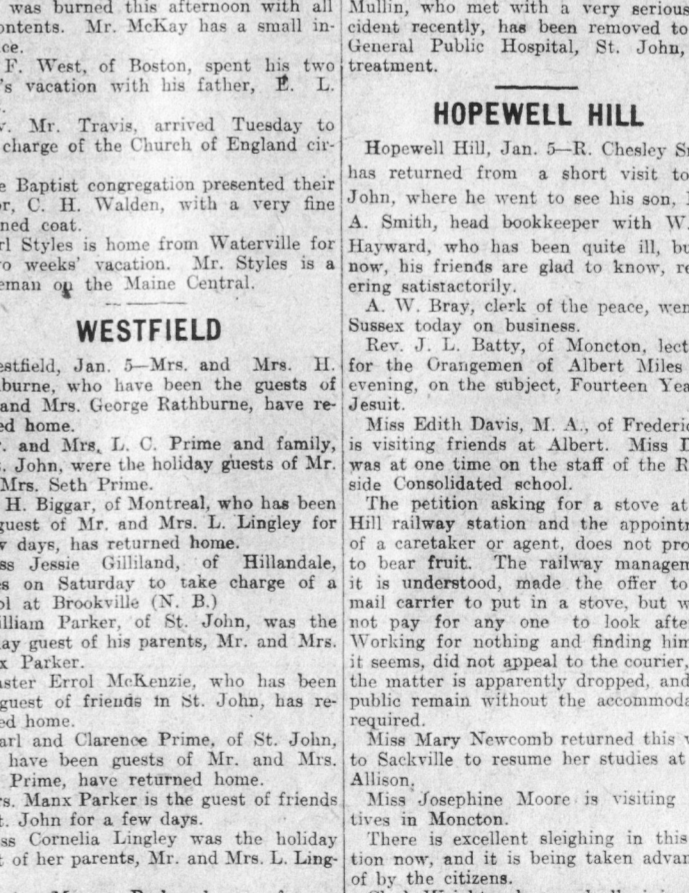
RICHIBUCTO
