Dr. Greene-I have no doubt but that there are many people at this season suffer-ing from influenza, and who imagine they have got the horse disease. Well, at any other time these people would treat their affliction as they have often done before, but now as the influenza has become epi-demic among the horses, they are alarmed and fear that serious results will ensue This is absurd. There is not the slightest reason why we should be disturbed or be-come excited if it becomes our turn to have at influenza epidemic; we have often have the disease among us, and I do not see why we should be any more alarmed at having it in company with our horses than if these faithful servants were free from it.


