I have never SIXTY - SIX known a first rate milker, of any breed, not thus proportioned; so imal I have recommended to me, I do not care to look at her more, unless I want a breeder for some other purpose than the dairy. For breeding oxen I should want a cow of reverse proportions, i. e., larger girth forward. I next feel the sides of the "milk veins," and trace them to their enterance into the chest, which, in superior cows, are large, admitting the hell of the largest figure.
