Manufacturers Are Not All Using It. Merit, Too, Must Count.

A GOOD ONE.

Canadian Manufacturers' Association, at the closing session today of a convention which the members are unanimous in regarding as one of the most successful in the history of the organization, decided to embark upon a 'Made in Canada' campaign.

The plan suggested by the Commercial-Intelligence-Committee, which has been under consideration for some time, is to have 'Made in Canada' principles taught in the schools by means of object lessons drawn from typical Canadian industries.

There were objections. The proposed propaganda did not find favor with some of the members, objection being taken to it on the ground that it was an attempt to introduce sentiment into business, and would prove not only expensive but futile. It was contended that the successful marketing of Canadian-made goods must depend upon the quality of the goods and the technical education of the manufacturer.


