AN ENTHUSIASTIC POLITICAL MEETING

Large Crowd to Hear the Leader of the Opposition Speak

TRIUMPHANT MEETING

A largely attended meeting was held in the Opera House on Monday night, when Mr. A. B. Copp, the leader of the opposition, announced the platform of the Liberal party for the approaching elections.

Mr. A. T. LeBlanc occupied the chair, and was supported by James Reid, M. P., Hon. C. H. LaBillois, A. E. G. McKeuzie, J. S. Bassett, John Kerr, P. J. Veniot, Dr. L. G. Pinsuit, Geo. Vermette and others. Mr. LeBlanc, in a brief speech, stated the objects of the meeting, and said that the Liberals had made a good choice in their candidates, and introduced Mr. A. E. G. McKeuzie, one of the candidates.

Mr. McKeuzie early caught his audience and in a happy speech made a plea for the young man's ticket. He very briefly outlined the lines of the Liberal party's programme and prophesied the defeat of the government by the fact of their misdeeds towards the town of Campbellton, and the County of Restigouche.

Hon. C. H. LaBillois was the next speaker and said that he wished to be brief, to give time to Mr. Copp, who would be expounding his platform. He paid a high compliment to Mr. James Reid, for his work towards Campbellton and the County. He said that in thirty years he had made mistakes, but with it all could say that he always stood on the side of progress. He refuted the charges made by the Hon. John Morrissey, for his squandering the public money. Mr. LaBillois claimed that in every department the government had been throwing away their chances of doing good, and the people of the Province now desire a change.

Mr. A. B. Copp, who was received with applause, early put his audience in good humor and in telling language laid his program before the electors with plain open facts. He complimented the town of Campbellton on its progress and recognized that Campbellton was a town with a future.

In his speech of one and one half hours' duration, he dealt with the platform which the Flemming government placed before the people in 1908, showing that the promises made to the people at that time were never intended to be carried out. Mr. Copp told a little story of a lady that was travelling from Halifax to Montreal and insisted on standing on the platform. The conductor in a quiet way, told her to take her seat in the car, but all to no purpose. Latterly, he insisted on the lady leaving the platform, which made her very angry, and so demanded to know what the platform was for, was it not to stand on? "No, Madam," replied the conductor, "the platform is to get in on, not to stand on." This has been the idea of the Fleming government as far as their platform of 1908 was concerned. Mr. Copp then dealt with acts of the government in the collection of stumpage, the territorial revenue, and the audit act, and scored the government for the policy pursued in the expenditure at public works. One point that was very welcome to the Liberals of Restigouche, was the fact that when the late Liberal government subsidised the I. N. R. to the extent of \$8,000.00 per mile, the Tories held up their hands in holy horror, but these same Tories considered that the small sum of \$2,500.00 per mile for the Valley Road was right and just. The average person can work that out for himself. Mr. Copp announced that if returned to power, he would pledge himself that all public works would be done by public tender, and the lowest tender would receive the work, even if the "Fredericton Gleaner" was cheapest for public printing." SHORT MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

Protest Against Councillor Sansom is Withdrawn and the Matter Dropped.

LITTLE BUSINESS

The Town Council met on Tuesday evening, His Worship Mayor Murray in the chair. There were present at opening of session councillors Miller, Alexander, Pinault, Stewart and White.

Minutes of previous meeting read and confirmed. Councillors Lunam and Sansom then entered the meeting.

Communication read from Secretary of Union of New Brunswick municipalities extending an invitation to the convention which would be held in St. Stephen in September. Letter filed.

The reports of the following committees recommending payments of accounts were received and adopted: Councillor Pinault Public Property and Street \$9.76.

Councillor Stewart, Electric Light \$1863.03.

Councillor Miller Finance, \$243.96.

Councillor Alexander Water and Sewerage, \$54.35.

Councillor Sansom Public Charities, \$28.00.

Councillor Lunam Police and License, \$15.00.

In a further report Councillor Lunam submitted a list of persons who had been granted Billiard, Livery, Stable, and Auctioneers Licenses under the Bye-Laws.

Councillor Alexander in a report from Water and Sewerage department submitted various agreements from Jos. R. Sharpe, Chas. Audet, and Shives Lumber Co., with regard to granting permission for laying of sewerage extensions.

Town Solicitor then read the form of release from liability asked by the Public Works department before commencing the work of dredging. In answer to questions Councillor White stated that in the matter of Wm. Taylor's resignation, nothing had been done beyond the fact that Taylor had withdrawn his resignation and arrangements had been made to prevent a recurrence of friction in the future.

Councillor Stewart brought up the matter of order supplies for all the town departments and moved that all orders on behalf of the town, should be purchased by the town clerk by requisition orders in triplicate. This motion was carried and will apply to all town departments.

Councillor Miller stated in the

of the wasteful policy of the present administration with regard to the crown lands, showing that the re-survey promised by the Fleming government had never been carried out and no provision had been made for re-afforestation for the protection of crown lands which were a great national asset. He stood prepared to take up the risk of providing the farmers and laboring men with all the assistance that they should require, and would be always prepared to show all his records at all times.

He asked their support and said that if he were returned to power he would be ready to do all for the benefit of the farmers and the laboring classes and would stand to be judged on his record.





RESTIGOUCHE IN LINE

The Liberals of the County of Restigouche at a large and representative convention which met in Campbellton on Monday, unanimously nominated Hon. C. H. LaBillico and Mr. A. E. G. McKenzie as their standard bearers for the ensuing local election. In Restigouche a Liberal nomination is equivalent to a victory at the polls. Liberal sentiment is very strong in the county and so far as the opposition nominees are concerned, it will only be a question as to the size of their majority.

Hon. Mr. LaBillico has represented Restigouche for thirty years without a break and his popularity with the people of the county is unimpaired. He was for eighteen years a member of the provincial government, filling successively the portfolios of agriculture and public works. During his long public service he has ever been faithful to the County of Restigouche and its best interests, and no man in public life is more universally esteemed. In Hon. Mr. LaBillico the Acadians of the province have a every reason to be proud.

Mr. A. E. G. McKenzie, who has been nominated as the colleague of the ex-chief commissioner, is one of the most energetic and talented young men in New Brunswick today and he is destined to make his mark in public life. He completed a successful course in the Normal School some years ago and for a time followed the teaching profession. In 1890 he entered the U. N. B. as a senior matriculant and graduated in 1902 with his degree of B. A., taking his M. A. degree two years later. He studied law in St. John and was admitted to the bar six years ago and, ignoring the allurements of the west, he opened an office at Campbellton, where he has practised his profession with great success. Mr. McKenzie is well versed in political affairs and as a platform speaker has few if any superiors in the province. He will prove a valuable acquisition to the legislature of New Brunswick and having the support of the young men of the county will make a good showing at the polls. It is admitted that the Hon. C. H. LaBillico will be returned and A. E. G. McKenzie says he will be so close behind him the people want know which is first, but it will be two liberals at any rate. Campbellton it gratified in Mr. McKenzie being nominated and the liberals of Restigouche are to be heartily congratulated on their splendid choice of Candidates.

PRINCE AS A MILLINER

Parisian Tradesman Claims Descent From Louis XVI.

Lady tourists who have been in the habit of buying their Paris hats in the Magasin de Chapeaux are greatly excited at the discovery that, without knowing it, they have been wearing the creations of a royal prince. Curiously enough the prince himself has evidently never realized what an enormous asset he possesses in his princely birth, for, although in certain circles he has long been known as Prince de Bourbon, his customers have known him only as plain Monsieur Chaigneau.

The milliner prince is, or claims to be, a descendant of the famous Naundorf, alias Louis XVII, who is supposed not to have died in the Temple Prison, as recorded history, but who was smuggled away by some devoted Royalists, and a boy closely resembling him put in his place. Naundorf made good his claim to the throne of France, but neither Louis XVII, nor Charles X seemed disposed to abdicate in his favor. Whichever they considered Naundorf an impostor, or were convinced that he was their nephew, is a mystery that will never be solved. The Naundorfism, as their adherents are called, asserts, and not without reason, that it is very strange that Naundorf was never prosecuted as an impostor, although he constantly begged the authorities to give him this opportunity to establish his claim and reply to his detractors. Hundreds of people of the highest standing—statesmen, historians, others have believed, and continue to believe, that Naundorf was really the son of Louis XVI and Marie Antoinette.

It certainly seems curious that, while according to history Louis XVI's little son was supposed to be buried in the churchyard of Sainte Marguerite, Paris, at the age of ten, on Naundorf's grave in the old cemetery in Delft, the following inscription was placed by the King of Holland:

"Here lies Louis the Seventeenth, King of France and Navarre, (Charles Louis, Duke of Normandy). Born in Versailles, March 27, 1785. Died in Delft, August 10, 1845."

The milliner-prince, however, only belongs to the junior branch of the Naundorf family who for some time past have assumed the title of Prince de Bourbon to which they lay claim.

Queen Mary, if she had not been born in the purple, would have been an able typist. She can tap-tap the keys of her typewriter with her Royal fingers as quickly and as well as any professional. King George is also able to manipulate a typewriter, though he doesn't use it to any great extent nowadays.

The Kaiser is well known to be expert on most subjects, typewriting, of course, being included. When in London a few years ago, he paid a surprise visit to a famous firm and selected a machine for his own private use. Most people know how deeply interested Princess Christian is in all branches of nursing. The enormous amount of work and correspondence this entails keeps several typists constantly employed. Princess Christian herself types many of her own letters, as also a great part of her husband's correspondence to Germany. Her typewriter is a very fine machine, silver-plated and fitted with ivory keys. It has a set German characters in addition to the usual English ones.

To the King of Greece, tapping the ivory keys is a pastime. Nothing pleases him more than typing his own letters. Many of these letters, though typewritten, are signed in full and are treasured by his subjects who receive them to be handed down to other generations as heirlooms.

Many of our peers have their own machines and frequently type their own letters. Lord Rosslyn, for example, is the envy of many typists, the speed and accuracy with which he can use a typewriter being well above the average. When he was captain during the Boer War and taken to Pretoria, he edited, printed, and published a typewritten newspaper with the machine he had taken out with him.

ANIMALS RECOGNIZE A MORAL LAW

Monogamists of the Brute" Creation are of a Higher Development Than Polygamists Says Naturalist

A fascinating address on "The Natural History of the Ten Commandments" was delivered by the famous naturalist and hunter, Mr. Ernest Thompson Seton, at a gathering of the Pilgrims at the Savoy Hotel, London. Mr. Thompson Seton advanced the theory that the ten Commandments are not arbitrary laws given to man; but fundamental laws for all creation. Ample evidence of the application of the commandments to the animal world could be produced. Animals, he declared, have a recognition of property rights. A squirrel has his tree in which he has a proprietary right, and he will always be ready to fight for that tree and what is on it.

"One of the most remarkable theories in the whole of animal studies," he continued, "is what may be called the evolution of monogamy. It is a remarkable fact that where that system has been adopted the animal which has adopted it is always the successful one. If it comes to a clash between a polygamist animal and a monogamist animal, the latter always wins." Mr. Thompson referred to the case of the blue foxes which occupy a certain territory in Alaska. "These foxes," he said, "understand among themselves what their area is, and beyond that they will scarcely go. They also are absolutely monogamist. 'If one fox dies it is extremely hard to get the other to take a mate. So strict have the lines been on which these foxes live that a hunter reported to his company: 'Until we can break the high moral standard of the foxes, our profits will be greatly curtailed.'"

Then the lecturer turned to stealing. "If a rook," he said, "finds a stick in the woods, that stick is his own and he carries it to his nest. If another rook attempts to take that stick from him, he will fight for his property, and the question of the ownership of the stick has been known to disturb the harmony of a whole flock." In conclusion, Mr. Thompson Seton declared that in the animal nature a deep-laid instinct, strong in proportion as the animal is high in the scale, which prompts it when in the extreme to resist itself on the mercy of some other power. "I do not say that it is so, but it may be that in this instinct we shall find the foundations and the basis on which is afterwards built something else which finds its higher development in man."

SLEPT FOR A YEAR

Russian Prisoner May Recover After a Long Death-like Trance

A remarkable case of lethargy is reported from one of the towns in South Russia. A man named Moiseyenko was put on trial over a year ago on the charge of having committed an armed robbery, but in the midst of the proceedings he dropped to the floor in what was supposed at the time to be a fainting fit, but which afterwards proved a lethargic sleep. In this condition the prisoner has lain over a year, until a few days ago. He has evidently been all the time in complete possession of his wits, but was unable to move a limb, open his eyes or take food. When his eyelids were raised the pupils could not be seen, and he was all the time fed by artificial means.

During his sleep he has lost some weight, but has kept throughout the external appearance of a man in normal and healthy surroundings. When he regained control of his members recently his first words, characteristic enough in a Russian prisoner, were: "They gave me a good beating in the prison, and now I am spitting blood." As a matter of fact, a medical examination has revealed that his lungs have been damaged by mistreatment in prison, and that he is in consequence suffering from tuberculosis. He is now being carefully watched, but there is every reason to believe that he will ultimately recover—perhaps only to pass in the hands of the hangman.

A BOGUS PRIEST

Interloper Created a Parish for Himself and Pleased the People

Nantes reports a curious case of an illeged interloper priest. A few months ago a certain M. Baton, about the age of good appearance, arrived at Nantes and took a room in an inn. The innkeeper was astonished when the traveller stated that his present was that of a priest. The newcomer immediately hired a hall, and as there was no vacancy for a cure, he created one. He set aside for himself the parsonage of Saint Clair, which he placed under the patronage of St. Gregory. His parish thereafter was to be called after that of the saint.

The man is described as having been a little awkward at first, but soon he gave the benediction, and performed the other ceremonies with great ease and ability. His Masses were very short, and it seems that his way of receiving the confession of people was admirable. His faithful flock soon increased and he solemnized marriages, baptisms, and confessions from morning till night. The cure of Saint Clair brought in the matter of the attention of the bishop, and an announcement has now been read from the pulpit of the regularly appointed cure, in which the bishop denounces the intruder as a schismatic and a heretic.



SUFFRAGETTES AT ODDS.

London, May 13—The two branches of the Suffragettes—militant and nonmilitant—are at odds again. Recently some members of Parliament angered by the acts of the militants, renounced their pledges to favor votes for women. Now the offices of the National Union of Women's Suffrage Societies are trying to counteract the efforts of what they term the "hooligan" campaign conducted under the leadership of the Pankhursts and the Lawrences by the militants known as the women's Political and Social Union.

"I have been filled with sorrow," said Mrs. Pankhurst, president of the National Union yesterday, "at the conduct of these misguided women. Our organization has always disapproved of the use of physical

force as a means of political propaganda. But the justice and expediency of any cause is not affected by the unwisdom of its advocates. The steady argumentative agitation of forty years should not now be ignored because in the disappointment of long deferred hope methods of anger and impatience and even violence have been resorted to.

"The newspapers are full of incitement to the authorities to use uncommon punishment in dealing with the unhappy women who have committed these actions. They may be necessary—but is only a necessary evil. It is no remedy. It deals with the symptoms and not with the cause. We are still hoping and working to the end that our statesmen will see the necessity of getting at the real cause of the unrest."

KING'S COUNTY BRIDGE FALLS DOWN

A few days ago the bridge known as the "Sproule Bridge" near Portage Vale, King's Co., went down with a number of cows owned by Henry Jonah. Mr. Jonah was on the bridge when it started to go and had a very close shave, as one of the pieces of the frame work struck him. Some of his cows were badly hurt and had it not been for the stream drivers who were working near by, when the crash came a larger amount of damage would have been done. The cattle were taken out of the water before they had time to drown.

SAFETY AT SEA

Mr. Sydney Buxton, President of the British Board of Trade, in reply to questions in the House of Commons, stated that steamship companies speaking for 95 per cent of the number of passenger vessels of 10,000 tons and upwards have undertaken to provide boats and rafts sufficient to accommodate all persons on board (passengers and crew,) so soon as the necessary boats are available. The names of the companies who have given this undertaking to Mr. Buxton are as follows: The Allen, America, Anchor Line, Atlantic Transport, British India, Bucknalls, Canadian Pacific Cunard, Dominion, Federal Steam Navigation Company, Lambert and Holt, Leyland, New Zealand Shipping Company, P. and O. Pacific Steam Navigation Company, Orient, Red Star, Royal Mail, Royal Line, Shaw, Savill, and Albion, Thompson's Aberdeen Line, Union-Castle, and White Star. It should be added that some of these lines already provide accommodation for all on board.

During the ten years ending December 31 1911, the total number of passengers of all classes and nationalities carried outward and inward on board British and Foreign ships between the United Kingdom and the United States and Canada (including Newfoundland), was 6,053,382, of which the greater proportion were carried in British ships. The number of passengers reported to the Board of Trade as having lost their lives by casualties on voyages between the United Kingdom and the United States and Canada during the period named was nine. This is a splendid record, and ought fairly to be borne in mind, even whilst we are in the shadows of the great loss of life on the Titanic. The inquiry now being conducted by Lord Mersey ought to be effective in providing still further safeguards towards safety at sea.

FRIENDLY TO PAPERS

The German Emperor and His Advisers Beginning to Trust Reporters

The social position of the foreign newspaper correspondent in Berlin is slowly improving and, while a comparatively few years ago he, as well as his native colleague, the German journalist, was rather a social outcast, he is now received with open arms almost everywhere, though he is still far from being considered entitled to be admitted to court functions. At the same time it is the Kaiser himself, who has given the signal to relieve the newspaper correspondent of the social stigma, by treating the journalists with increasing friendliness. The fact is that the Kaiser as well as the upper classes have begun to realize the enormous power of the press for good or evil, and the result is that statesmen find it a better plan to initiate responsible journalists into their plans, trusting them to keep secret what must be kept secret, when asked to do so, than to allow them to let their imagination run wild with nothing but unreliable rumors to work on.

Never has the change been more evident than at the recent reception of the Association of Foreign Newspaper Correspondents at the Hotel Esplanade, which was a social event of the first magnitude. From the very day when the invitations were sent out, the social committee was besieged by prominent people clamoring for invitations, and on the day itself every high German state official from the Imperial Chancellor down, as well as practically the whole corps diplomatique, accompanied by their ladies, were present.

GOOD COOK BETTER THAN DOZEN DOCTORS

The Secret of Health, Wealth and Happiness is Concealed in the Pots and Pans of the Kitchen.

"The secret of health, wealth, and happiness is concealed in the pots and pans and kitchen ranges of the humblest flat. One poor cook makes one bad stomach; one bad stomach makes one cranky husband; one cranky husband makes the family sick; ten poor cooks make one doctor rich—and, on the other hand, one good cook can do more real good than a dozen doctors." This excerpt from his culinary arithmetic was the climax of the address of Charles Laparques, imported chef, before the Chicago School of Domestic Science. "It is easy, ladies," he continued. "Study cooking and practice it and the doctors will go out of business. Don't be frightened by the menus you see in cafes. Make the dishes yourselves; they are all easy."

THE USES OF DRIPPING

With the price of butter continuing to soar, it surely behooves the household economist to inquire into the possibilities of substitutes. For making cookies, Johnny cake or almost anything but cake you may use one-quarter of the butter your recipe calls for and the other three-quarters pork dripping, or, if it has been kept in very good condition, beef dripping. For frying croquettes, doughnuts or anything else that requires deep fat use one-half lard and one-half dripping. Keep a tin especially for this mixture, which can be poured back into it, through a cheesecloth, after each use. For potatoes and other foods fried on a griddle dripping is just as good as butter. Bacon fat is excellent for frying fish or veal. All dripping should be strained through cheesecloth and kept in a warm place. Do not on any account let it get chilled. This is particularly important with beef dripping, which very easily becomes tallowy and rancid. Pork dripping keeps very well and is the best of all. Lamb dripping is good for nothing but soap. In fact the fat from soups or from any other cooking may be saved for this purpose and the soap recipes accompanying packages of the best brands of lye will be found quite satisfactory. If you have butter which has become strong work soda into it half teaspoonful to a pound, and used with an equal quantity of lard. It is excellent for pie crust. When making baked or boiled custard, the milk to be used should be scalded and set aside to cool. Then make the custard in the ordinary way, and it will be perfectly smooth. If one cupful of vinegar is put with the water in which colored table cloths are washed, it will prevent the color from running. Iron when still damp, and they will look equal to new.

Continued from page one meeting that he would like the Council to deal with the matter of insurance on all town property, instancing the fact that there was no insurance on the Electric Light plant, or equipment. In the discussion which followed the cost of the Electric Light system was gone into, the total amount sunk, being close on \$75,000.00, this includes lands \$10,000.00, Poles and Lines \$14,000.00, Wharf and Building \$15,000.00, Meters over \$6,000.00; the contract price of the Engines being \$25,377, with extra equipment being purchased amounting to \$2,500.00.

The Finance and Electric Light committee were empowered to go into the matter of insurance and arrange the amounts necessary to cover loss. A letter was then read from Dr. A. Martin withdrawing his protest against Councillor Sanson, in which he stated that he had been misinformed. After hearing the Town Solicitor upon the matter, the letter was ordered to be placed on file, showing that the protest is finished with. Councillor Alexander asked leave to recommend a bill for payment of \$70.00 for a Typewriter for the department. Councillor White stated with regard to a laundry on Lansdowne street that Mr. Robins was in the Council Chamber and would like something done regarding this matter. Mr. Robins stated that he had asked for a permit to build a laundry, and the extension of sewerage, but so far had not received any answer to either of these requests. The matter had been referred to the fire committee, but in reality should have been to the Water and Sewerage department, and after a short discussion it was referred to the Water and Sewerage department for report. Council adjourned.

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
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ASH-SIFTING SHOVEL

Series of Wheels Revolve and Chop the Cinders up.

An ingenious implement for sifting ashes is the ash-sifting shovel designed by a New York man and shown in the illustration. As will be understood by the name, it performs two operations practically simultaneously. The scoop of the shovel, which is unusually capacious, is meshed and bound in iron strips. In the back is a series of sharp-toothed wheels, projecting slightly through slots in the bottom of the scoop, so that when the



latter is passed over a supporting surface the wheels revolve and cut the larger cinders into pieces small enough to fall through the mesh. Good coal will be too hard to break up in this way. Therefore, as a man takes a shovelful of ashes from the hearth he need only turn to an box with a strip on top on which to operate the wheels, and pass the shovel across this once or twice. This operation is not productive of dust as the old-fashioned sieve, either.

Danish Bacon Factory in England Danish methods throughout are to be used in a new bacon factory about to be opened by Suffolk farmers at Elmwell, near Bury St. Edmunds. The machinery is of Danish origin, having been erected by Danish mechanics, and the manager of the factory is a Dane who will employ a certain number of men accustomed to similar work in Denmark.
