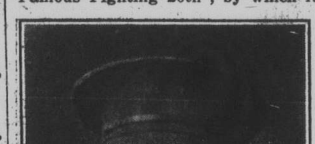
## NEW RICHMOND BOY IN CRATER FIGHT

Member of Famous Fighting 26th Battalion—Was Severely Wounded in Hip

The following account of the famous Crater fight of October 13th last, given in the St. John Daily Telegraph by Major Brown on his return from the front, recently came to the notice of Private Earle Robertson of New Richmond, at the Hillington House, Uxbridge, Eng., where he is convalescing from the wounds received in the crater fight.

Private Robertson forwarded this account of the fight to his mother, Mrs. Jas. Robertson, New Richmond, enclosing a letter in which he says he considers this the best description of the fight he has yet seen.

Private Earle Robertson is the second son of Mr. and Mrs. Jas. Robertson of New Richmond, and was one of the first to answer the call, being the third of the large number of New Richmond boys that have joined the colors. He enlisted under Capt. McKenzie of Campbellton in the 26th Battalion, and did his share to help that Battalion to earn the title of the "Famous Fighting 26th", by which it

Wounded October 13th, 1915. is known all along the line.

Private Robertson was wounded in the hip at the crater fight of Oct. 13th, and after lying unconscious for days at the field hospital, he was removed to Baginbry Hospital, Nottingham, England, where he remained until about a month ago when he was removed to Hillington House, Uxbridge, England, where he will likely remain until he is fit to return to the trenches.

Dear Mother:  
I am enclosing you a clipping I cut out of the St. John Daily Telegraph describing the fight in which I was wounded and it is the truest description I have yet seen.

I was lying beside Major Brown, he wrote this, when I was wounded. Major Brown himself was hit a moment afterwards.

I went over the parapet just ahead of Sergt. Ryer, who won the D. C. M., as mentioned in Major Brown's account.

You asked me in Weston's letter who the two Canadians are that are in the snap shot with me. The lad with the legs amputated is Corporal Waddell from Hamilton and the other chap is Driver Lewis from Kingston, Ont. The latter is wounded in the arm.

My wound is doing very nicely. The Sister told me this morning that there was a piece taken out of my thigh half the size of a teacup, being hit either by an explosive bullet or a (Dumdum) as an ordinary steel bullet would only make a little round hole. She also told me that if it had been an inch lower I would of probably lost my leg, so I am quite satisfied.

Well, I guess I will ring off for this time. Don't worry about me if you don't hear from me regular, as mail often goes astray. With kindest regards to all. I remain

## LATE C. R. SCOLES FUNERAL FRIDAY

Body Expected at Matapedia Tonight—Special Train to New Carlisle

Unless unforeseen circumstances prevent, the body of the late Chas. R. Scoles, will arrive at Matapedia on the Maritime express tonight, and a special train will leave there at 3.30 a. m. for New Carlisle, where the funeral will take place on Friday.

The late Chas. R. Scoles was born at Grantham, England, August 27th, 1856. He was educated at Bedford College, Bedford, England.

Among the various railway enterprises with which he was connected were the building of the Caranquet Railway, the Central Railway of New Brunswick, the Atlantic & Lake Superior Railway and several other railways, including the finishing of construction of the Atlantic Quebec & Western Railway to Gaspe.

In 1890 he was appointed manager of the Salisbury & Harvey Railway. In 1900 manager of the Atlantic & Lake Superior Railway and in 1911, manager of the Quebec Oriental and Atlantic, Quebec and Western Railways.

He was a member of the Anglican church. As such he was one of the leading members of St. Andrew's Church, New Carlisle, and his generosity and help towards that Church is known to all. All societies in connection therewith found in him a willing and earnest helper.

Amongst his many presentations to St. Andrew's Church is the brass lectern given a few years ago.

Being a member of the Anglican Church did not deter him, however, from helping out the other denominations, as he was a man without religious or racial prejudice, and contributed regularly to the Presbyterian and Catholic Churches; also to the Salvation Army, St. John, N. B.

He was a very good friend to the poor, and he was never known to turn away a deserving case of charity.

His whole support was always given towards any movement for the betterment of this community, as his life, both morally and socially, was of the best.

His memory will be revered by all those who worked under him, and by those who came in contact with him both in business and private life.

The latter part of his life was closely associated with the railway development of this coast, and in the early days, when the difficulties in connection with the operation were almost unmountable, and where a man of less energy and determination, might have failed, he, through his indefatigable efforts, and steadfastness of purpose, brought matters to a successful issue, although on several different occasions, it meant the pledging of his own personal resources.

During the present war, he contributed liberally to the Canadian Patriotic Fund, the Red Cross Society, and Machine Gun Fund; neither did he forget the boys at the front, as he personally remembered each unit from New Carlisle.

WILL PUT IN WATER  
At the last meeting of the directors of the Campbellton Rural Cemetery Co. it was decided to put in water this year. The water will be taken from the private two inch pipe which passes the cemetery. This will be pleasing news to all those holding lots in the cemetery, as the carrying of water has been a great inconvenience. The town will no doubt furnish the cemetery with water free of charge.

## DALHOUSIE BOY SHOWS HIS PLUCK

Mounted Machine Gun on Pet and Blazed Away at Germans

Letters received at Lepreux from Private Ian D. Cameron, machine gun section of infantry in France, state that the Canadians have been subjected to the worst bombardment and the toughest fighting since the battle of Langemarck some time ago. Captain May, of the 26th, stated at St. John, that "the wreckless bravery of our men was wonderful," instancing the fact that during an attack by the Germans on the 26th trenches, he suddenly heard a machine gun firing over his head, and on looking up saw a machine gunner with gun perched on the parapet in full view of the enemy and blazing away merrily at them. Captain May did not say who the men were, but Private Cameron writes that the man at the gun was Lance Corporal Andy Wallace (presumably G. A. Wallace of Dalhousie, N. B.) and his assistant was one Williamson, who afterwards worked the gun when Wallace was hit. There are two Williamsons in the 26th both of St. Andrews. Private Cameron was in the trenches below at the time, passing up ammunition to the two men. Private Cameron since that was shot through the ankle while stringing barbed wire between the trenches and was laid up for twenty days, but is now back to duty.

(The Williamson referred to in the beginning of this article is Fred, better known as Sammy, who was very active in athletics.)

## SWEEP IN QUEBEC ELECTION

Conservatives Elect Only Seven in House of Eighty-one Members

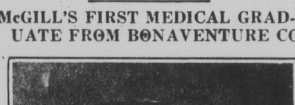
Montreal, May 22.—Elections were held in fifty-three ridings in Quebec province today, forty-nine Liberals and four Conservatives being returned. Twenty-three Liberals were elected by acclamation, and three Conservatives. With eighty-one seats in the legislature the standing of the two parties is as follows:

Liberals, seventy-two; Conservatives, seven. There are two deferred elections, Madeline Island and Gaspe.

## THE CURFEW

The suggestion contained in our last issue that a curfew bell be inaugurated here, has been widely commented and approved of by those interested in the welfare of our boys and girls, but if anything is to come out of the movement it needs more than commendation. It needs to be backed up by the citizens who will bring the matter to the notice of the Town Council. More than all else it needs some person to put the matter in proper shape for presentation to the Council. Who will undertake the work?

## FREE FISHING

In Nova Scotia all rivers and lakes have been made free to the public for rod fishing, subject to certain restrictions and laws.

Here in New Brunswick with some of the finest fishing waters on the continent, it is impossible for a resident, unless he owns a fishing privilege or has a friend who does, to enjoy a day in pursuit of this pleasure.

While we admit that it would be impossible to make all rivers and lakes open to the public, yet we think that the government should reserve certain rivers and lakes for free fishing, so that the poor man, as well as the rich, can enjoy his fishing.

## COLLECTING WASTE PAPER

The article in "Conservation" for March on "Saving Waste Paper" has aroused considerable interest throughout Canada. Many letters have been received asking for information as to methods of collection and disposal.

Waste paper is a commodity of very low value, and collecting and shipping charges reduce very materially the final returns from same. To reduce the expense of gathering to the minimum, the paper should be collected through co-operation of those interested or by local philanthropic or charitable organizations. A headquarters should be established, or collection boxes distributed, where the paper may be left. For shipping, the paper should be put into bales, for which a baling press is necessary. There are many types of press on the market, several at moderate prices.

To secure minimum shipping charges it is essential that shipments be made in car lots, as the less than car lot rate is much higher. Usually the paper must be shipped to considerable distances to the mill or dealer and adjoining municipalities might, if necessary, co-operate in making up car lots.

Apart from the monetary return for saving this wasted material, there is the further incentive of assisting to reduce the demand upon the forests of Canada to supply new material for the ever increasing requirements of the paper-making industry.

"A LITTLE CHILD SHALL LEAD THEM."

One evening I was present at a large meeting, and heard a most earnest address on the subject of Temperance. When the speaker had finished, I realized more fully the need for energetic Temperance work in the parish; but I did not at all realise that if I were to go forward in a crusade against intemperance, I must begin by becoming a total abstainer myself.

Almost as soon as the speaker sat down there was a stir in the middle of the room, and a respectable workingman stood up. He seemed a stranger to most of the audience. However, he began very quietly by saying that he would like to tell his story. He thought it would support what the gentleman on the platform had been saying. No objection coming from the platform, he commenced his story somewhat after this fashion:—

"I have been a bad fellow—worse than any of you in this room, I expect. I have been a drunkard; I have associated with evil companions; I have been a leader amongst them in every kind of sin. I have frequently struck my poor wife when drunk, and abused my little children. God forgive me! I have been a wretch. Late one Saturday night I returned to my miserable home mad drunk, and after cursing and swearing and creating a disturbance, I lay down and went to sleep.

"In the morning I awoke raging mad with the awful craving for more drink. I got up and ordered my wife to go out and get some whisky. Afraid of the consequences if she refused, she reluctantly took the bottle, and went out. I sat by the fire waiting.

"While I waited my little girl commenced to sing in her bed. I got up to look at her, for, drunkard as I was, I loved my children. Just as I got to the door of the bedroom I heard the words

I am so glad that Jesus loves me,  
Jesus loves me—even me.

"I paused—waited but she must have heard me, for she called out. I went in, took her up in my arms, and came and sat by the fire. I asked her

where she had learned that hymn. She said: 'We sing it at the Sunday school and Band of Hope.' I asked her to sing it again. She began in a quivering voice, frightened at the strange request—

I am so glad that my Father in heaven Tells of His love in the Book He has given;

Wonderful things in the Bible I see; This is the dearest—that Jesus loves me.

I am so glad that Jesus loves me,  
Jesus loves me—even me.

"I trembled as the words sank into my heart. I felt the tears coming. Very soon I was weeping aloud. My little girl grew frightened, and put her arms round my neck. I said to her: 'Mary, do you think Jesus loves me?' 'O Father, He does love you.'

"The struggle was terrible; but when my wife returned she found me on my knees praying and praising; for I had learned from my little girl that 'Jesus loves me—even me.'

"No more drink for me. The black bottle was flung into the fire with an energy that frightened my poor wife. I was rejoicing in a double salvation—from the hell of drink as well as from the hell of coming judgment—all through the mercy and love of God, all through my little girl."

And with these words he hoisted her up in his arms for us all to see; and as we looked at the child's sweet face there came a few tearless eyes in that great assembly.

Setting her gently down, he brushed his sleeve across his face, and turning round to us at the back, he said, with deep feeling—

"Men! Jesus loves you. Trust Him. Sign the pledge and help to save the poor drunkards."

And then he sat down.

I do not know that man's name. I do not think I ever heard him or saw him again. I only know this, as I walked home, I felt that my ideas about total abstinence had somehow or other been revolutionised. I could hardly explain the process, I think it was the last words that kept ringing in my ears, 'Trust Jesus. Sign the pledge. Save the poor drunkards.'

Yes, I was trusting Jesus and trying to live for Him and to work for Him. But about signing the pledge for the sake of the poor drunkards, that debate ended, thank God, in my becoming a total abstainer.

About five years afterwards I was ordained to the sacred office of the ministry, and was called to work in the parish of Christ Church, Everton, Liverpool.

One day I was summoned in haste to the house of one of our people. There, upon the floor, lay dead, a young man who, in the frenzy and fury of drunkenness, had stabbed himself to the heart. There, with his very life's blood upon them, stood weeping his wife and three children.

I came three days later and knelt by the man's coffin, side by side with the widow and the orphans, and I vowed before God that as long as He spared me I would "fight the drink."

I have seen no reason to take back a jot or tittle of that vow made before God. Yeal rather I have had too many terrible cases of vice and crime and sin caused by intemperance in my parish to remind me of my solemn covenant.—By the late Archdeacon Madden.

I would like to get my pass so I could go up to see mother, but doubt if I ever will get it they are going so slowly. I saw Dan Lund, Harold Milton and Earl Estabrooks; they getting along well. The Germans look played out. We had a bunch of them here, and the boys stole their hats from them."

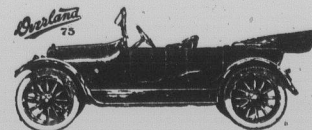

Sir—  
Would you kindly grant me space for a few remarks, regarding an enactment passed by our County Council at their last meeting in Dalhousie, Jan. 18. The enactment referred to runs as follows:—"That the Public Law preventing cattle from running at large on the public highway be put in force in the Parishes of Addington, Colborne and Durham on May 1st." My interest in the matter was newly awakened by the recent arrival in our district of a consignment of "Blue Books", containing the business transactions of the Council during its meeting. I presume that all districts of this and the other Parishes concerned, have been favored in a similar manner. Such thoughtfulness on the part of our local law-makers is unusual, as the majority of ratepayers have heretofore been obliged to depend on the columns of your esteemed paper for an account of the Council's doings while in session. It would seem that the Councillors wish to impress the information of the above mentioned resolution on the minds of the rural population before the time comes for putting it in force. Now, Mr. Editor, as a farmer, and one vitally interested in the matter, I wish to enter a strong protest against the enforcement of this most unjust law. That the measure is unpopular with the majority of ratepayers in this Parish of Addington, is proved by the numerous signatures attached to the petition presented to the Council at its last meeting, and praying that the cattle of the Parish be allowed to run at large. According to report, the signatures attached to the counter petition asking that the cattle be restricted were scanty in comparison. The agitation for enforcement of the law, has largely been the work of a few individuals, whose talent for creating mischief and discord might well be employed in a worthier cause, and whose distorted view of the situation should not be accepted as representing the sentiments of the community at large. I would ask in the first place, why this insistence on the removal of the cattle from the public highway? For the past fifty or sixty years, cattle have been allowed to graze freely on the roads of this Parish, and I challenge anyone to point out in the columns of this paper, what damage the roadway has sustained. The motor traffic of the past three years has done infinitely more harm to our highways, than any damage caused by the cattle for the past three generations. Yet if report is true, these same motorists, who practically monopolize our roads during the summer months, are endeavoring through their tools, to deprive the farmer of one of his few remaining privileges. A favorite argument of the latter class is "Why don't you keep your cattle up anyway? It helps your farm, and improves your land." Thank you for nothing! There is no need to tell the farmer what he knows already. Stern necessity, and not choice, dictates his action in this matter. When some of those officious wisecracks can enlighten us as to how to solve the problem of pasturing five or six cows on twenty-five or thirty acres of land during the summer months and at the same time to raise fodder enough on the same thirty acres to feed those cows, (I make no mention of horses or sheep) during our prolonged winter season, they will have rendered us a service for which we will be forever thankful. A few among us have inherited or purchased large and well-cleared farms, others are in a position to make a comfortable living without depending entirely on their stock for support, yet with a few honorable exceptions, these are the very men who are endeavoring to impose an impossible condition on their less fortunate neighbors. The average farmer in this Parish is the man who is absolutely dependent on the highway, and the waste lands to which he gives access, for sustenance for his cattle during the summer months. If the regulation is enforced, nothing remains for many of the farmers in this district but to sell their stock and betake themselves to other occupations. How the law will affect the other Parishes named in the resolution I do not know. They must speak for themselves. As far as the farming population is concerned, they will probably find themselves in a similar predicament. That many who have by years of labor succeeded in building up a fairly successful dairy business, will be compelled to abandon it altogether, or continue on a much reduced scale. And why? That a measure of petty spite may be gratified, that some of our lordly motorists may be able to continue their headlong career on our country roads without halting to slacken speed when some offending cow crosses their path. The deliberate oppression of any part of a community is a dangerous thing, as many petty rulers have found

to their cost. In the case of the particular bit of legislation under discussion, we can only repeat the grim jest of a famous diplomat: "It is worse than a crime, it is a blunder." Since the beginning of the war our leading newspapers have not ceased to proclaim to the Canadian Farmer the oft repeated fact that he is the backbone of the country, and that on his shoulders rests the future of Canada depends. The farmers of Restigouche may represent a very small fraction of their class throughout the Dominion, but the placing of this handicap on their shoulders at a period when the resources require exploitation to their fullest extent, is a blunder which the authors of this bungling piece of legislation will sooner or later regret.



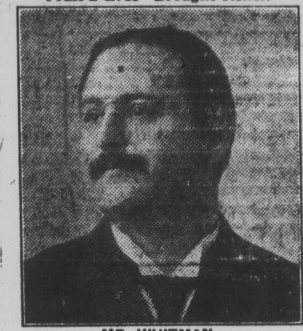

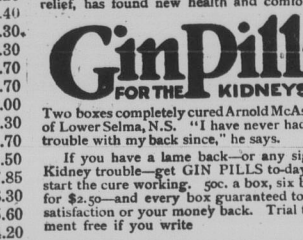

## BEEF CATTLE AND ECONOMY

"Big Falling Off in Beef Cattle" is a significant heading on page 108 of The Agricultural War Book for 1916. On page 91 there is this paragraph of equal significance:

"It is in the interests of the Empire that everything possible should be done to Foster the Canadian Live stock industry. In Canada, the number of cattle is about 6,000,000, besides 2,000,000 sheep—a total which, having regard to the population of the Dominion, does not at present leave a very large margin for export. With the probability of preferential trade in food within the Empire there are great possibilities in the expansion of Canadian live stock production."

There was once an English Bishop who, being called upon to preach a sermon in aid of an orphan asylum for boys and girls, pointed to the children arranged in full sight of the congregation, and saying "They're there", left the pulpit. The quotation of the two foregoing paragraphs should in like manner almost be sufficient to indicate to Canadians the opportunity and duty that lie before them. There is, however, so much matter of similar import, and pointing in the same direction, in the book, that it is well worth while to look further into it. As to the falling off, the statistics show that the decrease of beef cattle during the years extending from 1910 to 1914, totalled 992,662, or 7,338 fewer than a million, or upwards of 23 per cent. Meantime the population increased and people went on eating as much beef as ever. The decline in numbers of cattle by provinces was: Nova Scotia 31,920; New Brunswick 11,133; Ontario 658,919; Manitoba 62,999; Alberta 293,905; and British Columbia 6,139. Against these decreases there has to be reckoned an increase of 25,681 in Quebec, of 43,272 in Saskatchewan and of 3,400 in Prince Edward Island. It will be noticed that the decline was in those provinces nearest to the United States and where packers are most in evidence.

Two months are to be gathered from the foregoing figures considered in conjunction with existing conditions. One is that we must produce more, and the other, that we must eat less beef, that is if we have any desire to take rank as overseas exporters of live stock or live stock products of any importance. To accomplish the one farmers will need to pay additional attention to their breeding cows and to prize them to a greater extent than official returns would imply they have been doing. In connection with the other, it will be necessary for the people to cultivate and eat more field and garden produce, as well as to be more thrifty in their treatment of scraps and seemingly waste pieces, such as bones, skin and fat. They will need, so the War Book suggests, to produce all they can to buy as little as possible; to replace meat by milk, cheese, peas, beans and lentils; to use more vegetables and to eat more fruit.

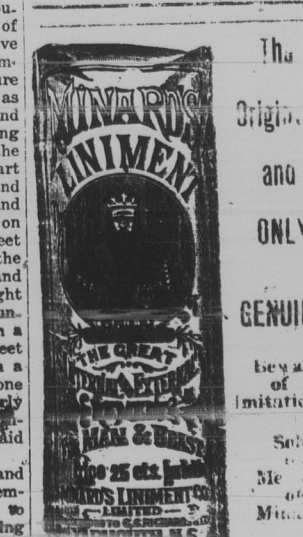
