A Portion of Crown Prince Constantine's Staff Recalled.

London, April 27 .- In the House of Commons, the Liberal leader, Sir Wm. Vernon Harcourt, asked Right Hon. A. J. Balfour whether the Government would make a statement in relation to the Turkish-Greek war, and the policy of the Government in relation thereto, and whether a British force was still

engaged in the blockade of the Island of Crete.
Mr. Balfour replied that her Majesty's Government, like the Governments of the rest of the powers, had agreed upon an attitude of neutrality. Of course, he added, the Government was desirous, so soon as a favorable opportunity presented itself, offices as a mediator. Referring to war is to be continued and the Crete, Mr. Balfour said the powers, Prince retained in command. having assumed the occupation of Crete before the war, had determined that the island should be considered neutral, and the blockade maintained in order to prevent opposition to their authority. GREAT EXPLOSION IN OLD LON-DON. 

We ordinarly sell to nem goods to the value of from \$10,-000.000 to \$20,000,000 a year more than buy off them-that is, the balance of trade is almost always and largely in our favor. Our sales of goods in Canada are, ordinarily, larger than our entire sales in South and Central America, and this is made up chiefly of manufactured goods. Thus, we export there in large quantities, books, maps and engravings, manufactures of cotton, wearing apparel, leather and boots and shoes, builders' hardware, nachinery, naval stores, the product of petroleum, preserved meats, cheese and dairy products, manufactured to bacco, manufactured wood, and manufactures of wool, to say nothing o fruit, coal, and other similar crude mmodities. In order to prevent the Canadian goods in the United States, Congress is proposing, by its action, to lose a much larger market for the sale of our own products, which, as these are often surplus products, will not find an easy market within our own unused presence here, an embarrassment of business. 



Rev. John Jacobs, the Missionary to the Indians on Walpole Island.

Rev. John Jacobs died at his resilence on Vidal street, Sarnia, on Monday morning, at the age of 52 years. Mr. Jacobs was born at Cape Crocker, n the Hudson Bay district, removing with his father to Ontario when quite young. His father was a clergyman of the Methodist Church, and the son chose the same calling, but decided to enter the Episcopal Church. He was educated at Huron College, London, Ont., and was ordained by Bishop Cronyn on July 18, 1869. He was first appointed missionary to the Sarnia and Kettle Point Indians, building a brick church on the former reservation, and a frame one on the latter. He worked most faithfully and successfully amongst these charges for nearly seventeen years, when, upon the death of the Rev. Mr. Jamieson, he was appointed missionary to Walpole Island in 1886. There he has carried on a highly successful work, and was greatly beloved by all his people. He collected nearly \$1,500, with which a handsome parish church was erected about three years ago, and he was contemplating the erection of another church on the island, but his health began to fail him about a year ago, and he was obliged to give up active work in December last, since which time he has been confined almost entirely to the house. Mr. Jacobs trans-lated and published a Church of England hymnal in the Ojibway language which is used extensively throughou Ontario, Minnesota and the North-west. He was beloved and respected by all who knew him, and his demise will be a severe loss to all, and especially to the Walpole Island mission He leaves a widow and two children a son and a daughter, to mourn his


