St. Paul. Minn. Jan. 4.-The heavest snowstorm since 1893 prevailed in the northwest for hours yesterday. Snow to the depth of 18 inches fell here, and the street railway system was practically put out of business.

### The Terrible Experience of Shipwrecked French Sallors.

Paris, Jan. 4. - A French destroyer has brought into Bizerta the sole survivor of the steamer Albula, which foundered off Cape Bon. The crew of eighteen left the sinking vessel in a Dispatch From Santo Domingo dinghy and a lifeboat, but the former was immediately swamped, and the lifeboat soon capsized, only three men escaping by clinging to the upturned

One of the men had been wounded. and was bleeding freely. The blood attracted a number of sharks, and he was soon dragged under. The two survivors Eriksen and Liset, clambered on to the lifeboat, and during three days subsisted on a single biscuit. They were surrounded by sharks the

John C. Kaine Sworn Into Cabinet of Quebec Province.

Quebec, Jan. 4 .- Mr. John C. Kaine, M.P.P., was sworn in as a member of the Quebec Government yesterday by Legislature and the House of Commons the Lieutenant-Governor, Sir Louis meeting at the same time, so that if Unseated Montreal Member Could Jette, and afterwards took his seat as necessary concurrent action could be a member of the Gouin cabinet, as minister without portfolio, to represent the Irish Catholic population of the province. The appointment is unquestionably a popular one, inasmuch as he is the son of the staunch Liberal, the late Ald. John Kaine, and personally he has fought the battles of the party since his youth. [From the Chicago Record-Herald.] The Record-Herald of yesterday contained a remarkably interesting symposium on Mr. Wellman's plans from distinguished scientists and explorers. Though some of the opinions that were expressed were as pessimistic as could be, and though the great hazards of the enterprise were generally recognized, by far the most significant fea-Uncle Ezra—Dorothy, I hope you'll tures in the comment were the incease telling your mother every time dorsement of the programme as a practical one. We will quote here just what was said by some of the men

whose hearts were in the project: Professor Willis L. Moore, chief of the national weather bureau-I say the scheme is practical for this reason: Mr. Wellman may require about two days to make the flight to the pole. He may be able to run between storms and reach his goal without encountering destructive winds.

Professor Alja R. Crook, of Northwestern University-When the north pole is reached finally, I firmly believe that it will be by means of some kind of an airship, whether Mr. Wellman's or another. There is, to my mind, nothing impossible about Mr. Wellman's plan, provided he is favored by the elements and fortune generally is with him. The chances for success, of course, are not as great as the chance of failure, but Mr. Wellman may reach the pole by his plan. I think he ought to be able to keep in wireless com-

munication. Dr. Otto Nordenskjold, Swedish explorer-It is a scheme inspiring in its vastness and its daring, and as such worthy of a great nation. I am perfectly satisfied that if Santos-Dumont can build an airship such as is contemplated, barring accidents that cannot be foreseen and provided against, but which are likely to happen on a journey of such an extraordinary nature, the dream of the Arctic explorer will be realized.

Dr. Nordenskjold agreed with Professor Crook that the greatest chance for the discovery of the pole lay in the perfection of aerial navigation, and certain favorable conditions for the use of balloons in the Arctic were noted by Lieutenant Charles M. Watson, who was one of the British delegates to the sixth international geographical congress. He said that a balloon could be kept in good working order there, that the slight variations in temperature were an advantage, that there was another advantage in the continuous day of the Arctic summer.

Of course, the dangers are uppermost in the minds of others, and they are skeptical of the means employed, because aerial navigation is still in the experimental stage. Scientists differ temperamentally like the rest of us. But it is plain that there is something practical to go on, an that the enterprise is visionary only as all great enterprises are. ### The Canadian Packing Co. LONDON JUNCTION.

London, Thursday, Jan. 4. The feature of today's market was the large supply of dressed hogs. There was not a great deal of other products of the farm offered. Sales were brisk. and prices were firm, excepting for dressed hogs.

Grain-Oats were in good demand, only a few loads being marketed; prices ranged at \$1 05 to \$1 07 per cwt. Hay and Straw-Hay was in light supply, as there was only eight loads offered; prices were higher, at \$8 to \$9 per ton. There should be a demand for at least 30 or 40 loads at Friday market. No straw offered.

Butter and Eggs-There was not a great deal of butter on sale; prices were steady at 23c and 24c for pound rolls; for butter in crocks, 22c was most frequently paid. Eggs were a shade easier, at 27e and 28c per dozen for fresh-laid, and 23 to 25c for

What poultry was offered was held by the hucksters. There was not much change in prices.

Dressed Hogs-The largest number on sale on any one day so far this winter. Prices dropped about 50 per cwt. Most of the sales were made at \$8 75 per cwt. The farmers did not relish the idea of taking lower prices, as they would not sell at less than \$9 25 per cwt, but were compelled to take less when there were so many
