# CHIEF DECLARES IT IS A FIRETRAP

Condemns Asylum Building as an Unsafe Place For Patients.

Be Torn Down or Made Fireproof.

The fire at the asylum this morning is the latest of a series of big fires

burned up. The loss on buildings alone has reached a considerable sum. No lives have been lost in any of the con flagrations, but the situation on two as for flagrations, but the situation on two locasions might have been serious, had not the staff shown remarkable ability in handling the patients.

The present structure is 47 years old. It is antiquated, and as such is far from being of modern construction, as the safety of 700 patients would deby a mand. Nor could it be made fireproof. One big fire would surely call the attent of officials to the necessity of making alterations such as would make the place much safer than at present.

Schools Made Fireproof.

In the schools of London every pre-

In the schools of London every pre-caution has been taken to make them fireproof, so far as possible. Concrete stairways and other methods of con-struction have been employed to make the schools safe.

The building inspector and building bylaws prevails in other parts of the city, but the building inspector has no authority over the asylum buildings.

Had such authority been vested in the building inspector it is quite probable that improvements would have been made when the previous fire occured. Better construction would have resulted, or at least the responsibility for present conditions would have been brought home to the Government. brought home to the Government.

A Veritable Fire Trap.

"The place is a veritable fire trap," said a man in close touch with he institution to The Advertiser. "It is a wonder that mere accidents have not occurred in recent years. It is time that something was done to improve it."

Fire Chief Altken is outspoken in condemnation of the building, and stat-ed emphatically that there should be in the buildings. in the buildings.

"There should be first of all fire doors and fire walls," he declared.

"The long corridors give the fire a clean sweep through the whole place. It is impossible almost to stop it once it has got started, and there is constant danger of loss of life. The doors would be of great assistance in continuous the

danger of loss of life. The doors would be of great assistance in confining the fire to certain limited areas. Certain walls should be erected throughout the building from bottom to top, to prevent a spread of the flames.

Make Building Fireproof.

"There are several exits, but there should be more fire escapes, and bigger escapes. Those at present in use are not adequate. The building is a fire trap, and I want to tell you that we have been very lucky that there fires have not been much worse. The boys certainly did fine work this morning, and had we not been so successful, conditions would have been much worse. The Government has a chance now to improve matters, and if the wise course is followed, the asylum will be made fireproof." is followed, the asylum will be made fireproof."

Efficient Work of Chief Aitken's Men Alone Responsible For Saving Building-Perfec t Discipline Maintained as the Inmates Leave Building in Early Morning-Roof Is Practically Destroyed, and Attic Is Damaged.

The lives of fifty female patients at the London Hospital for Insane were endangered and damage in the neighborhood of \$10,000 was done by fire which broke out in the attic of the administrative or main building about 3:30 this morning.

Fire penetrated to the floor below, but the remainder of the damage was done by the water which soaked through all the floors to the basement, and running through a tunnel there proved too much for the drains, and threatened at one time to extinguish the boiler fires.

# PEOPLE OF LONDON DEEPLY INTERESTED IN THE GREAT WAR

Big Audience at Patricia To See Fall of Bapaume.

SEE THE TANKS IN ACTION

Germans Driven Out of Their Carefully Prepared Positions Quickly.

Steadily increasing attendances are marking the exhibitions of the "Fail of Bapaume," official British pictures of that world-famous event showing at the Patricia Theatre all this week. Tuesday was no exception, and demonstrates that in spite of reports to the contrary the people of Canada are still deeply interested in the war. Each scene depicting Canadian troops drew forth rounds of applause. Other troops of the Empire received their fair share. That the scenes are not wearying repetitions of those depicted in "The Bat.

That the scenes are not wearying repetitions of those depicted in "The Battle of the Somme" and other official films is strikingly demonstrated by the first reels which are devoted to the first motion pictures of the British navy that have been permitted since the early days of the war. Taken immediately after the Battle of Jutland they depict Admiral Beattly's floor in they depict Admiral Beatty's fleet fighting formation and cast a new ligh fighting formation and cast a new light on methods of modern sea warfare. Even Kipling's gripping accounts of the North Sea fleet fail to bring home the work of the sailors in the manner which the pictures do.

Phases of land warfare which were noticeably absent from previous pictures are those carried out by the cavalry and motor machine gun batteries.

Shows Full Detail.

The picture shows the full detail of the preparations and the continuous struggle which brought the Germans out of their set positions and fortified trenches, after nearly three years of occupation. It begins with the preparation of the British, made on an unprecedented scale and shows the creprecedented scale, and shows the arrival in France of fresh troops from England, and gives a good suggestion of thousands of men who were sent to the front at the beginning of the offensive

Realism of War.

This picture shows some of the realism of warfare and some of the glory of it, too. It is the most comprehensive attempt to cover the whole western front, the activities behind the lines, the bombardments and aerial flights and the actual infantry fighting, with its inevitable toll of dead and wounded, that the British Government has yet presented, for it shows particularly every famous regiment in the British army at work in the field, as well as troops from the various dominions, including the famous Lancers from India. His firm was always prepared to abide by the bylaw which prohibits the wholesaler or retail dealer from buying until the consumer has had a chance to buy on the market, if the bylaw were enforced.

"Could anybody put their stuff in cold storage?" The speaker replied that anybody could place produce there in as large or as small quantities as desired, and that many families were now ordering their supply of foodstuffs and placing it in cold storage while the placing it in cold storage while the prices were favorable.

Asked whether the plan in use of going out into the country and buying up large quantities of foodstuffs did not raise the price, he replied that somebody would certainly buy the produce, and if so it was to the advantage of the citizens of London to have it stored here rather than in some other place, as it could then be sold from 1 to 5 per cent cheaper here.

If it were not for the good opportunities offered to farmers by the local market to bring their produce here, they would take it somewhere else, and thus make produce scarcer and higher in price here.







# WIDE POWERS GIVEN CONTROLLER OF FOOD

Ottawa, June 20.—The order-in-council defining the duties and powers of the Canadian Food Controller Hon. W. J. Hanna, provides that the food controller shall make necessary investigations into the quanti ties, location, ownership, sources of supply, and prices of any article of

food in Canada; that he shall ascertain domestic requirements and facilitate the export of the surplus to Great Britain and her allies. Subject to the approval of the governor-in-council, the food controller may make regulations governing the prices of any food and the storage, distribution, sale and delivery thereof, providing for its conservation and governing consumption in notels, restaurants, cafes, private houses, clubs.

It is further provided that, subject to the same approval of the cabinet, the food controller may requisition, store, sell and deliver food, and may appoint a necessary staff to carry on the work. Provision is made for (0-operative action with any department of the Canadian Government or of the governments of Great Britain and the Allied countries.

In answer to Mr. Hellmuth, the manager stated that he did not know that eleven carloads of private brand corn flakes had been brought into Canada and sold last week.

"Seconds" for Hospitals.

Mr. McIntosh also explained that what was known as "seconds" were sold to the hospitals at reduced rates. The flakes were of No. 1 quality, but the cartons were damaged. He did not know how his salesmen answered grocers who asked for Kellogg's Krumbles and Toasted Wheat Flakes. He had

### SIMS IN CONTROL OF IRISH WATERS FORCE A POLITICAL STROKE

Washington, June 19.—A brief message from London today brought the navy department its first news of the appointment of Vice-Admiral Sims to command the Allied naval forces in Irish waters during the absence of the commander of that district. The department had no other information as to the new responsibilities placed upon the American officer.

The Washington Government has given Admiral Sims wide powers to enable him to meet any situation that may arise.

The admiral has full authority to act on his own initiative in disposing of the forces at his command so as to secure the greatest co-operation with the French and British navies and also the maximum efficiency in the battle against German submarines.

In some quarters, it was pointed out that the announcement that the American officer had been placed, even temporarily in command of the British forces greatly superior to those under the American flag in those waters might have a political effect in Ireland, where the situation is turbulent with the approach of the Irish convention period. It might tend to show beyond question, it was suggested, that the British and American governments were in perfect accord.

## U. S. OPENS ARMS TO RUSSIAN MISSION

WASHINGTON, June 19.—Washington opened its arms to the Russian diplomatic mission, headed by Ambassador Boris Bakhmetleff, today, with warmth and enthusiasm.

Greeted by Secretary of State Lansing and other officials, and escorted through streets lined with cheering people and honking automobiles, the mission was given a welcome expressive of this country's response to the mighty democratic upheaval in Russia.


