Detroit, March 11.—In the first ice report of the 1920 season for the Great Lakes, issued in Detroit Tuesday, N. B. Conger, marine agent of the United States weather bureau, says:

"Reports from the regular and display stations of the United States weather bureau and the meteorological service of Canada indicate, that the weather bureau and the meteorological service of Canada indicate that the fields of ice in Lake Superior are extensive, heavy and windrowed; over the western portion the fields extend out solid for 47 miles, while over the eastern portion the field has remained stationary since about February 15. The St. Marys River is solid the entire length and is covered with snow.

"In Green Bay the ice is heavy and solid. In Lake Michigan the fields are moving slowly over the northwestern. moving slowly over the northwestern portion, and some open water extends south to Chicago, while over the eastern side the fields extend beyond vision with no open water of consequence

"In Lake Huron the fields are extensive and heavy and extend beyond vision. St. Clair Rover is open for about two miles below the mouth of Lake Huron and heavily packed below this point to Lake St. Clair; the ice in Lake St. Clair is heavy and probably ranges from 22 to 25 inches in thickness; the Detroit River is closed with heavy ice from about Twelfth street to Lake Erie.

"In Lake Erie the fields are solid along the south shore and no open water visible; some open water is reported off Port Stanley. The ice is reported as heavily windrowed.

"In Lake Ontario the ice in the harbors is heavy; the ice fields are reported over the eastern and central portions.
"In comparison with the same period last year there is more ice in all the lakes.

\$5 PER THOUSAND

Vote Stood 199 to 4 For Walkout When Question Put ·On Wednesday Night.

If the employers of the city do not meet the demands made by the Cigar-makers' Union for an increase of \$5 a thousand on all lots of cigars before Friday night, the members of the union will go on strike either Friday even-ing or Saturday morning. This action was decided upon at a meeting of the union held in the Army and Navy Club rooms by a vote of 199 to 4 last

According to H. Wheatcroft, secretary of the union, an offer made by the bosses of an increase of \$3 a thousand on fancy shapes, \$2 on the popular brands, \$1.50 on molds, and an 8 per cent increase to packers, was turned down. He said that the members of the union deemed it useless to accept a small increase at the present time when it meant coming back for a higher wage in the near future. The igarmakers received an increase \$1 a thousand last September.

Circular Letter.

A circular letter has been sent out by the union to all the employers putting forth the reasons why the demands were made. The letter pointed out that a large number of the cigarmakers had been forced to send their wives to work in the footowed. makers had been forced to send their wives to work in the factory, and that they themselves had been forced to take odd jobs at night in order to eke out a living. NAVAL POLICY OF SIR WILFRID VINDICATED BY JELLICOE PLAN

Viscount of Scapa Advises Canadan Navy, With Canadian Naval Minister and Canadian Admiralty, Which Borden Government Threw Out-Several Alternative Proposals Made.

OTTAWA, March 10.-While private members dawdled away the time of the House today, the corridors hummed with comment upon the report of Admiral Viscount Jellicoe of Scapa, who at the invitation of the Government of Canada and of other dominions undertook to investigate and make recommendations as to what part these descriptions. to what part these dominions ought to take in the matter of naval defence and naval contribution

His report was tabled in the House by Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, minister of marine and fisheries, and Liberal-Unionist, this afternoon. The minister made no comment in tabling the report, but later, in answer to a question on the order paper as to what action the Government-intended to take on the recommendations of Admiral Library 1. tions of Admiral Jellicoe, he declared that the House "would be advised as to prospective legislation."

Number of Proposals The report is lengthy, and will stand considerable study. There are a number of alternative proposals, and the adoption of any one of them is left to the discretion of the Government, and of course incidentally to that of Parliament. nothing dictatorial in the document; it is simply the expressed opinion of a "high naval authority," who has been requested to come and give his on the matter. But it may be noted that in all the proposals laid down, definite or alternative, the principle of a Canadian navy is recognized, with a Canadian naval minister responsible to Parliament, and a Canadian admiralty. CANADA ENLISTED IN FIELDS OF WAR

OTTAWA, March 10 .- (By Canadian Press). - Mr. Joseph Demers, St. Johns and Iberville, was informed in the House of Commons today that the grand total recruited in Canada for the Canadian expeditionary force to December 31, 1918, exclusive of those enlisted for naval service, R. A. F., imperial mechanical transport, inland water transport, and exclusive of British and allied reservists, was 591, 492. There were enlisted in England 1,733; in Canada for overseas service other than C. E. F., 21,169; British and allied reservists, 14,590; a total of 628,964. Until all documents have been returned from overseas no final statis-

can be issued.

Canada is among the "first-class" members of the league of nations, according to a statement by Mr. Rowell in the House of Commons this afternoon. In conformity with article 6 of the treaty of peace with Germany, Canada's contribution towards the league is fixed on the basis of the apportionment of the expenses of the international bureau of the Universal Postal Union, but the actual amount which Canada may be called upon to contribute must necessarily depend upon the number and classification of these states which become members of the league of nations.

Canada's contribution for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1920, was fixed year ending March 31, 1920, was fixed at £16,324, which at the current rate of exchange on February 13, the date on which the draft was sent to London, amounted to \$64,043.15.

Working desperately for an agreement, senators on both sides of the chamber confounded the plans of their party leaders and threw the Senate into such a tangle that it tacitly was agreed to delay a vote for several days, in the hope that all elements might be more certain of their ground. in the hope that all elements might be more certain of their ground.

The hopes of the compromise advocates collapsed and were revived hourly as the day's negotiations proceeded in private conferences. The debate on the floor dragged along without apparent interest or effect. Tonight the conference continued, with some senators hopeful and others hopeless of the outcome, but with no one confident of what might happen.



Miss Julia Varley of the Workers' Union, addressing the assembly of mistresses and domestic employers, expressed the opinion that a body somewhat on the lines of an industrial council should be formed for domestic workers. Unless the maids and mistresses came together the misunderstandings which at present existed could not be removed. Her object was to raise the status of domestic service, so that it should be equal to that of any other calling that girls followed. She hoped that it would soon be impossible for little drudges to be taken from the charity schools and employed at



bonate then are mixed in the proportion of two of cream of tartar to one of soda, and a small quantity of cornstarch is added to insure dryness.

Cream of tartar is derived from the argols found adhering to the sides and bottom of wine casks. These are dis-solved in boiling water, filtered through

animal charcoal to remove all coloring matter, and crystallized into cream of tartar as it is sold commercially.

Baking powders which contain cheaper acids or alum, or ammonia, should be avoided. It used to be very common and is still the custom in many






