



BABY SCREAM

Infants Are Better for a Good Lusty Yell, According to an Expert.

London, Oct. 31.-The annual presidential address at the Salt Schools Shipley, was delivered last week by Sir James Crichton Browne, M. D., LL.B. F. R. S., who took as his subject "Some Aspects of Physical Education," After an introductory reference to the con dition and work of the schools them selves, and to some of the eminent persons who preceded him in the presidential chair, Sir James said that he proposed to limit his observations mainly to the educational influence o muscular movements of various kinds In relation to these, he said, something which may be called physical education is commenced at a very early age, by the handling, dandling, tossing and caressing of the baby by its mother. These movements not only aid digestion, but | stimulate the skin, the circulation, and the nerve centers, and provoke sponsive movements, which gradually become more and more definite. which seem to be essential to the welfare of the infant. It has been observed in foundling hospitals that children left in their






