Our Maritime Provinces, The North West, and Indian Work, The Grand Ligne Mission.

Behold the fields! "They are white already to harvest." To help work these fields, we, women of the W. B. M. U. have pledged ourselves to raise the sum of \$1,500 this year. The year ending, as we all know July 31st.

One of our missionaries in the first of these fields writes, "The time has now come to decide whether the missionary can be kept on this field next year or not. In each of our three provinces the calls are loud.

# Indian Work in Manitoba.

This is a new field for our W. M. B. U. and last August we promised towards it \$100.

Mrs Mellich writes this week. "Some of our

work will have to be given up unless help comes. "We have on St. Peter's Reserve a neat Chapel with about twenty-five saved Indians formed into a church. If you could see that church and hear them testifying to the love of Jesus in their hearts you would have some idea of how they appreciate their Salvation. These need tender care and shepherding. St. Peters is situated on the Red river near Lake

Winnipeg, and the Indians come by boat from Reserves far North, and pass through St. Peters on their way to buy and sell in Winnipeg.

God has wonderfully blessed our Indian missionary Henry Prince as he has gone among his own

people winning them to Christ.

Once a year Henry Prince goes on a trip to visit these Pagan tribes. He must go by dog train and take an assistant. The dogs are hired, and they require fish for food which must be taken as well as provisions for the men. Qur missionary has just returned from one of these trips in which he suffered much hardship; but we hope much good has been accomplished for Christ and perishing souls.".

Each of these trips cost about \$100.00

# Grand Ligne.

On this mission we need say but little. Mr. Bosworth's letter having been before our sisters so recently, and the imperative need there is that we give the free religion of Christ to the French Canadians, must be seen by every christian who reads our papers.
