WAITING FOR HARMONY.

JOHN BRIGHT DECLINES TO ATTEND A LIBERAL DINNER.

The Very Plucky Liberal for His Country—Mr. Bright Declines to Attend a Liberal Dinner.

LONDON, Oct. 20.—John Bright, who was invited to attend a presentation to Mr. Schindler at Birmingham, writes that he greatly approves the services of Mr. Schindler and the manner of marking them, but the ceremony because, as he would be expected to speak, he does not wish to cast blame upon former friends, and therefore thinks it best to remain silent until the former harmony of the Liberal party has been restored.

A TRIPLE AGREEMENT.

Austria, Russia and Germany in Accord on the Bulgarian Question.

BUDAPEST, Oct. 20.—Gadban Effendi, the Turkish representative, has informed the Bulgarian Ministry that he has been instructed to act in concert with the Russian and German representatives. He strongly advises the Bulgarians to concede the Russian demand and postpone the meeting of the great Balkan conference to a later date.

It is reported in Zankoff (pro-Russian) circles that Gadban Effendi has confidentially stated that the Czar has made an arrangement with the Porte, the Czar guaranteeing integrity of the Sultan's dominions, reducing the Turkish indemnity and obtaining from the Czar a guarantee to fortify the Dardanelles and to occupy Bulgaria with Russian and Roumanian troops.

Alarm is felt at Sofia over the message of Turkish troops, which has been received from the Bulgarian frontier. The message has been published in Constantinople and the Sultan on Oct. 17. All the foreign consuls attending the Bulgarian representative will attend the opening.

A Triple Agreement.

PARIS, Oct. 20.—The Journal des Debats says that the three empires have come to an understanding on the Bulgarian question on the following terms: Austria and Germany will not occupy Bulgaria, and Austria and Germany will not recognize either the regency or the prince elected by the Bulgarians without the assent of Russia.

ENGLAND'S IMPROVED ARMY.

A Letter of Alarm from the Commander-in-Chief.

LONDON, Oct. 20.—Lord Wolcott, Adjutant General, has issued a circular to the officers of the English army intimating that the Duke of Cambridge, who has been appointed to command the army, is dissatisfied over the small progress made in their military training during the recent inspection. He intimates that he has observed that many officers are unacquainted with the duties of their office, and he strongly intimates that the officers shall devote more time to their military duties in the future.

James Garfield says: "The Duke of Cambridge in the freedom of private conversation expressed the opinion that the officers in the British army are not worth their pay." The Duke of Cambridge, who is now in the United States, has issued a circular which would alarm the whole army and alarm the country.

LONDON, Oct. 20.—Severe and prolonged shocks of earthquakes occurred in Surinam, Cashmere, this morning. There were frequent tremors during the night, lasting till sunrise. The shocks ceased at 10 o'clock.
