Deferred Articles. From the North of Scotland. LIFE ASSURANCE. THE TEMPERANCE PRINCIPLE.

When the National Temperance Provident Company started in 1811, it proposed to confine its operations exclusively to the adherents of the Temperance cause; and during the six years it so restricted itself, its progress towards occupying a respectable place among life societies was satisfactory,—its capital having increased from £583 to £13,012. In 1847, it was resolved to widen the basis, and to accept of lives without reference to the Temperance consideration; except that the institution should contain two distinct sections, one of which to be confined to persons abstaining from intoxicating drink; the other to be the same as other offices. Since this period the office has made rapid progress, having effected insurances to the amount of more than half a million pounds sterling, while its income from premiums is £17,327. From the report of an eminent Actuary (Mr Peter Hardy) which lies before us, its success is described as 'almost unparalleled.' Its balance sheet, on 20th November last, shows a sufficient surplus, and it is estimated that at the next investigation in 1855, "the directors will be enabled to declare a very handsome bonus."

Let us see, then, the effect of the Temperance element in this office. Its effect is not equally palpable at first sight, as if different scales of annual premiums had been drawn up side by side; the one for those who use, and the other for those who refuse intoxicants. Such tables—had the results—brought out after a reasonable length of time—been satisfactory without further controversy. The annual premiums are the same; but the policies are kept separate, so that if there be a benefit it is felt in the bonus, the principle being, that "the entire surplus reverts to those who have paid it."

The Temperance section, then, has been subjected to calculations with a view to ascertain how many deaths would have occurred according to the usual experience of Life Offices, as founded upon the general averages of mortality. The following, then, is the result:—

Deaths taken from experience of the first London office..... 13 According to the Population return..... 14 According to the Northampton tables..... 21 Actual deaths in the Temperance Department of this "United Kingdom" Institution (including 3 from cholera) 7

Here, then, is proof that Temperance is so beneficial to bodily health, that it actually diminishes deaths by the half.

THREATENING THE PREMIER.—A man named Charles Gill has been arrested in London, charged with having threatened the life of Lord John Russell. The prisoner wrote a letter to the Premier, in which he detailed certain alleged wrongs which he suffered, and threatened to put a bullet in the head of Lord John unless certain requests were granted. The case was placed in the hands of a police officer, and after making inquiries, he ascertained that the prisoner's state of mind was such that it would be unsafe for him to continue at large. He was accordingly arrested and brought before a magistrate and bound over.

PRICES OF ADMISSION TO THE WORLD'S EXHIBITION.—The Commissioners for the Great Exhibition have published their regulations respecting the admission of visitors to this unparalleled spectacle. Tickets of the first class are to be saleable at three guineas for a gentleman's and two for a lady's ticket, and these vouchers will procure admission at all times when the Exhibition is open to the public. On the first day of all, the right of entrance will belong to the holders of these "season tickets" exclusively, no offer of money whatever

being receivable at the doors on this occasion. On the second and third days the price of admission, for the day only, will be £1; and on the fourth day 5s., at which sum the entrance-fee will continue stationary for the space of three weeks. On the 22nd day the price will fall to 1s., so to remain during the period of the exhibition, with the exception of the Fridays and Saturdays in each week, on the former of which days the cost of admission will be always 2s. 6d., and on the latter 5s.

THE CAPE.—The gallant Sir Harry Smith, the hero of Alwal, and now Governor of the Cape of Good Hope, is again coming prominently before the public. An American ship from China, that touched at St. Helena on the 21st of January, brings reports from the Cape that at length open warfare has been declared and has commenced, between the Colonists and the Caffres. Sir Harry who had gone to the Frontier in the hope of settling the difficulties, which were hemmed in at Fort Cox by several thousands of the insurgent natives. He is said to have had with him a force of a thousand men; but to have cut his way through the besiegers, with 250 of the Cape Mounted Riflemen without loss, he himself being disguised as a private soldier. The particulars will be of interest. In the meantime, the measure of forbearance has overflowed, and a war of extermination has been proclaimed. In this matter, the Governor and the Colonists will be more of one mind than they were during the late anti-convict excitement.—New York Albion.

Protracted Fasting.—Two sheep were recently dug out of a snow bank near Rochester where they had been confined forty-two days! They were rather poor nutton, but soon recovered their spirits after food and drink were given them.

Meeting of Parliament.—The last official Gazette further prorogues Parliament until the 17th April,—not then to meet for the despatch of business. The promise made by the Ministry was that a Session should be held in the month of February, now last past. And some of their organs waxed exceedingly indignant when the opposition press insinuated that Messrs. Lafontaine and Baldwin had no intention of keeping their promise.—Spectator.

Suicide.—The demon of intemperance has been at work again. At Cobourg on last Friday morning a woman named Burns, who lived near the east wharf, literally destroyed herself with a knife while in a state of intoxication. Although surgical aid was afforded instantly, she died in the course of a few hours. Three suicides in less than one year at Cobourg, and from the same cause.—Dash down the Wine Cup!

Farmers' and Mechanics' Institute. On Friday evening, the 7th inst., the Rev. R. Torrance delivered a second lecture on the History of the Physical Sciences, comprising Chemistry and Optics. The lecturer commenced by defining the term CHEMISTRY, and stating the branches into which the science is divided, viz:—Metereological, Geological, Botanical, Agricultural, &c. Chemistry derived its origin from the visionary speculations of the Alchemists, who supposed that they could discover a substance possessing the principle of all matter, which would convert the baser metals into gold and silver, and an elixir which would insure immortality from disease and death.

Geber, an Arabian who flourished in the 8th century, is regarded as the first chemist in the proper sense of the term; but it is only since a comparatively recent date that the discoveries in the science merit record. Basil Valentine, who lived in the 15th century, was the author of a work on Chemistry, entitled "The Triumphal Chariot," in which he gives an account of acetate of lead, butler of antimony, and of a mode of preparing sulphuric acid. Paracelsus is said to have introduced chemical preparations into the practice of medicine. Van Helmont first paid attention to the nature of gaseous bodies, and to the distinction between permanent gases and vapors. Glæuber discovered the salt known by his name,—proved that ammonia could be produced from bones by distillation, and vinegar from wood. George Ernest Stahl introduced a new era in Chemistry. He proposed the theory of phlogiston to account for chemical phenomena, a theory which had many supporters, and maintained its place for many years. According to this system, all compound substances have an inflammable principle—phlogiston—which is dissipated by combustion. Boerhaave is classed among the supporters, and Dr. Hook among the opponents of this theory. The doctrines of the latter were confirmed and illustrated by Mayow, who first explained the nature of chemical affinity, and demonstrated that elements underwent no essential change in combining. Dr. Priestley discovered the constituent parts of the atmosphere, and from his time oxygen assumed the place previously assigned to phlogiston. Dr. Black proposed the theory of latent heat,—of essential service to Watt in the construction and improvement of the Steam Engine,—and discovered that limestone contained carbonic acid, marking an era in the science. Cavendish, highly extolled by Sir H. Davy, conducted a series of interesting experiments, and is still regarded by some as the first that analyzed water, although the merit of the discovery is ascribed to Watt by men of greater eminence. Mention was then

made of the discoveries of Priestly, Scheele, Lavoisier, Bergman, Berthollet, Klaproth, and Wollaston. Sir H. Davy, who died in 1829, gained the highest reputation as a chemist, exploding previous errors, and discovering new truths. From him both Electrical and Agricultural Chemistry derive their origin. The more recent discoveries in the science were traced through Faraday, Sefton, Sefstrom, Berrazoli, and Batard; the lecturer concluding by pointing to discoveries still to be anticipated, and the consequent progressive advancement of personal comfort.

Optics was described as the science which treats of vision, and of the changes light undergoes in its reflection and refraction by certain bodies. The theories of light proposed by Newton and Huygens were stated and explained, Pythagoras taught that vision was produced by the transmission to the eye of particles from the luminous body; while Empedocles, followed by the Platonic school, maintained that it was effected by particles proceeding from the eye to the object. By the latter, the discovery was made that rays of light always proceed in straight lines, and that the angle of incidence is equal to that of reflection. Archimedes is reported to have destroyed a Roman fleet by means of mirrors. The practicality of this almost incredible feat was demonstrated by experiments made by Buffon. From Euclid, the first writer on optics, the history of the science was followed in the line of Seneca, Ptolemy, and Alhazen. The invention of spectacles was next noticed, and the discovery and construction of the camera obscura, camera lucida, microscope, and telescope, were severally stated and investigated, the phenomena of the rainbow and the polarization of light explained, and the history of the science traced in its developments to the present day. On the motion of Mr. Savage, seconded by Mr. Pirie, the cordial thanks of the assembly were voted to the Rev. lecturer.

From Sketches of Pen and Pencil. BATHING IN THE DOURO. It is an amusing sight and enlivened withal, to look at the rows of white tents, the beautiful girls and their elegant dresses, the crowds of spectators, each sheltered by a bright-colored umbrella, and some thirty or forty ladies and gentlemen, fat and thin, tall and short, old and young, in the water together, dipping and spluttering, shouting and shrieking, as the white-crowned waves roll toward them—some attempting to swim, clinging to their attendants' arms, and endeavoring to make their escape to terra firma. Here an old woman bearing aloft a little cherub, independent of any bath, and some ladies who are content with a costume, to dip it in the water, and to make him venture into the water, after he has received his first lesson on the feeling of the contents of a basin, to prevent his feeling the effect of the water to his feet. Sometimes three or four young ladies will go in together, or a gentleman may be seen leading gallantly some fair one of his acquaintance; but everything is conducted with the strictest propriety and decorum; so that, how ever extravagant the style may appear at first to the stranger, he soon becomes accustomed to it.

The most amusing scenes have passed, never to recur, when the fairs came down to bath. Some years ago there was an enormously fat friar, who was ordered to take a certain number of baths in a certain hour in the morning, and the general amusement to go down and see him perform the ceremony. He had ten persons to attend him, six men who stood on the shore holding ropes attached to his waist (for he had a habit of his own floating qualities, a most conspicuous one being his abominable fatness.) and four women who accompanied him into the water. When they got him there, with a proper solicitude for his health, they took good care to make him perform his abutions abundantly. While the men slackened the rope, they used to dip him and duck him most unmercifully, pressing his head down with their hands, like the merry wivvies of the Windsor packing Sir John Falstaff into the water. He dared not resist, for fear they should leave him to his fate, and they would not let him out till he had taken the prescribed number of dips—tho' spluttering, and crying, and praying, and swearing all the time. Now and then a tough soldier, the same scene is enacted with a stout artisan, or a country farmer.

THE OLDEST WOMAN IN THE WORLD. We have recently (says the Gateshead Observer) received a lock of a lady's hair. Gentle reader, black it is now snow white—bleached by one hundred and nineteen winters. Mary Benton, from whose tresses it was shorn, was born at Keyserston, near Raby Castle, in the county of Durham, on the 12th of February, 1731; and on the 2d of December, 1849, she sent her old friend, Mr John Hinchliffe, the respected parish clerk of Cockfield, where she was christened, a lock of her lily hair, in tender remembrance and regard. Mr Hinchliffe, on presenting a portion of the keepsake to a friend, raised himself up to his full height, and said, "She is as fresh as I am (his own age is 72)—walks right up on one—feels her hair and chickens—wears spectacles—can hear well—and was helping at haymaking at Elton in 1843." He might have added, "and gleaming in the autumn of the following year." What follows we derive from the information of a lady who lately visited Mary Benton, and found her engaged in washing her own clothes. Her father's name was Ralph Lodge, who lived to the venerable age of 105, and her mother died an "old woman." Mary began life as a shepherdess, "tending her father's flock." She afterwards became "the maid of the inn," kept by her grandmother at Piersland, where she well remembers soldiers being quartered in the rebellion of '45. Five or six years lived in service at various places; among the rest, Raby Castle, to which the noble owner, the Duke of Cleveland invited her—an honor she proudly declined. The Duke of Northumberland has also been to see her. When young she had "lovers plenty," and "took the worst at last." "As," said she to her informant, "some-times happens." On being asked if she enjoyed the unvarying health, she replied, "I never had the doctor but once, when I was so frightened that I swooned away when he came into the room." Amusing enough, to hear of the nerves that had stood the rebels, giving way before the doctor! In the course of last year, Mr Bewick published a striking likeness of the venerable matron—if we may use such a word—who at present resides with a grandson at Elton. Should she live to be included in the approaching census, and be entered as 129 years of age, she will doubtless be the oldest person in that record, if she be not, as we have supposed, the oldest woman in the world.

FURTHER ITEMS BY THE PACIFIC.

THE BUDGET. Sir Charles Wood, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, made his financial statement to the House on Monday, 17th February. Last year he estimated the income up to April next at £23,285,000; the actual income for the year ending in January last had been £23,810,000; he did not anticipate that the revenue for the year ending next April would exceed £22,656,000. He calculated that the actual expenditure for the year ending April 5, would be £20,134,900. In the ensuing year he estimated the income as follows: Customs, £20,400,000; Excise, £14,000,000; Stamps, £5,310,000; Assessed Taxes, £4,348,000; Property Tax, £5,380,000; Post Office, £230,000; Crown Lands, £160,000; Miscellaneous, £252,000; Old Stores, £150,000. He estimated the total income for the ensuing year at £23,140,000. The interest of the National Debt would be £28,092,000, charges on consolidated fund £2,600,000. For the army £6,593,945, the navy £5,337,055, and the ordnance £2,424,172. He stated that he should require a vote to no large amount, for completing the state of fortifications and arsenals, in consequence of the troubled state of Europe. Since last year, a saving had been made in the war establishment, of £246,000. Taking the miscellaneous estimates at £4,000,000, he calculated the entire expenditure of the ensuing year at £20,247,176, which would leave a surplus in April, 1852, of £1,891,824. As regarded the income tax, he told the House that the renewal was refused, the deficiency in the revenue would amount to £3,600,000. He notified the intention of paying off two millions of the national debt. He then alluded to the widow tax. This tax brings in £1,856,000; it was therefore impossible to repeal it in toto. What he proposed, was a house tax instead, not upon the size, but upon the value of the house. All existing houses, not of the value of £20 per annum, to be exempted. All houses of £20 per annum, to pay as house tax two-thirds of what they now pay as widow tax. The reduction would be £700,000. He proposed a reduction on the coffee duty, the duty on foreign and colonial coffee to be equalized, and reduced to 3d. He proposed to reduce the duty on foreign timber to half its present amount. He proposed to reduce the only tax which, he said, was unfairly borne by the agriculturists, that on seeds, of which clover and grass seeds paid nearly the whole. The duty, at present, was 8s. the cwt. on foreign seeds, and 2s. 6d. on colonial seeds. He intended to impose a uniform duty of 1s. on foreign seeds. His intended reductions, together with that which, by the present law, would be made in the sugar duties, £1,522,000, would amount to £1,522,000; the increase in the customs would partly make it up; he estimated the total loss to the revenue by these reductions, at £1,280,000. He declined to refer to any further extent the owners and occupiers of land, and moved a continuation of the stamp duties in Ireland. Mr Home alluded to the statement, and after a desultory discussion, the House reported progress.

The debate upon the main features of the Budget was to have taken place on the evening of the 21st, but Lord John Russell begged, amid the profound silence of the House, to have it postponed till Monday next; this motion was agreed to. This morning however, the North of England has been taken by surprise, by telegraph, from unquestionable authority:—"The Budget—it is reported confidently about the House of Parliament that the Chancellor of the Exchequer has resigned; that Lord John Russell has not stood, and has tendered his resignation; and that Sir James Graham, at the Premier's suggestion, has been sent for. The greatest possible excitement prevails; and rumor, with hundreds of tongues, announces all kinds of signal defeat, from which it is clear they have not yet recovered.

From the Morning Advertiser. Ministerial troubles, any more than those which are individual, do not, it seems, come singly. The Whig cabinet had, last night, a painful experience of this truth. With the prospect of a double discomfiture before them, on the Budget and the Paper Aggression Bill, they were doomed, last night, to sustain a signal defeat on Mr Locke King's motion for extending the £10 franchise in boroughs to counties. It will be seen that, notwithstanding the strenuous opposition of government, headed by the Premier himself, the motion of Mr Locke King was carried by a majority of 100 to 52. This, we repeat, is a certain defeat of the Whig government. The question is one of great importance, and the majority, considering the number present, is large. We know not what course ministers will adopt when they ought to do. If they have still the slightest particle of respect remaining, they will resign at once, especially considering the public position in which they are placed with regard both to the Paper question and the Budget.

RESIGNATION OF THE MINISTRY. From Postscript to Wilmor & Smith's "European Times," dated Feb. 22nd, 11 o'clock, A. M.

By ELECTRIC TELEGRAPH. In another column, which was in type before the House of Commons assembled yesterday, we stated that the days of the Whig Government were numbered, and that an immediate dissolution might be expected. That event has taken place, and the dissolution will be greeted by a few people in the country, and perhaps, less by the colonists. The following has just reached us by electric telegraph:—

A Cabinet Council was held yesterday afternoon at the Foreign Office. The Council sat three quarters of an hour. After the Council the Lord J. Russell went to Buckingham Palace to have an audience with Her Majesty.

ARRIVAL OF THE STEAMSHIP ASIA.

Last night's news by telegraph gives strong reason for believing that Lord John Russell will again return to power.

The telegraph yesterday from New York says that the Asia, with Liverpool dates to the 29th inst. had arrived.

No new ministry has yet been formed. There was talk of placing the Duke of Wellington at the head of the government.

The London Standard (High Tory), of the 28th, says the country will be sorry to hear that Lord Stanley has failed in forming a ministry, and has in consequence returned to her Majesty the commission which she had graciously entrusted to him.

Shortly afterwards a royal despatch was forwarded from the palace to Lord John Russell at his private residence, in Chesham-place.

The Bank of England has reduced the rate of interest on stock to 2 1/2 per cent., while the minimum rate on commerce securities remains at 3 per cent.

Cotton had advanced 1/4; sale 40,000 bales.—Bread-stuffs were dull, and sales confined to the wants of the trade.

At Vienna, rumours are still prevalent, of an Austrian expedition against Switzerland.

The Turin papers give a rumour that the northern powers have addressed a note to the Piedmontese Government, demanding the expulsion of the Italian emigrants, the suppression of the liberty of the press, and an immediate reconciliation with the Court of Rome.

Prince Schwartzberg's stay at Dresden will be prolonged beyond his original intention.

The ministerial papers state that an understanding has been effected at Dresden between the agents of Prussia and Austria.

The Kingdom of Bavaria has protested against the competency of the Dresden conference to pass resolutions tending to restore the old federal diet.

Very little news from Rome. The Pope has annulled three members of the ex-Roman Constituent Assembly, and others have obtained an intermediate period of provincial liberty.
