ROSSLAND MINES INSTALLING MACHINERY—PROGRESS OF WORK.

LAST WEEK'S ORE SHIPMENTS WERE LARGE—REVIEW OF MINES.

Much interest has attached during the past week to the advances achieved in the construction work under way in the Rossland camp. In respect to mining operations, specifically, good progress has also been made.

The commencement of shipments from the White Bear mine has been delayed by the non-arrival of plant necessary to complete the equipment of the headworks, but the work of installing the plant already in hand has been pushed ahead.

The twenty-drill compressor plant for the White Bear was delivered during the week. It will not be operated until the 350 horse power motor received, and the date of the arrival of the motor is indefinite.

The White Bear compressor when completed will be a replica, on half scale, of the Nickel Plate electrical compressor now supplying air for the Josie mine.

At the Rossland Power company's concentrator good progress has been made with the installation of machinery. The Trent mills being now in place.

Some twelve cars of machinery have been delivered at the works to date, and further consignments of plant are in transit.

At the Le Roi Two concentrator the January test run is proceeding. It is now likely that the test will be extended over February, owing to the unavoidable interruptions occurring during the early part of the run.

How the Presents Dumps Could Be Made to Yield Profits.

The attitude of the Le Roi company in respect to concentration is not divulged as yet, but it is stated that the matter is under advisement.

The tonnage of such ores now available at the Le Roi is great. On the No. 1 dump approximately 50,000 tons of ore remain, and the average value per ton is probably not less than \$5 per ton.

Further reducing the figures given before no record has been kept of the quality of these sortings, hence it is difficult to arrive at an adequate idea of the exact amount of ore.

The ore contained in the No. 1 dump is probably conservative. This dump, therefore, represents a profit to the company of \$200,000 on the basis stated.

Further reducing the figures given and allowing a large sum for the construction of the mill works, it is apparent that the adoption of concentration in the meantime would yield a profit of a quarter of a million dollars on material which is now regarded as waste.

With a 300-ton concentrator the present tonnage of milling ore available for immediate treatment would keep the mill in operation for three years, at the end of which time the company would have reaped the profits specified, and probably half as much again.

The foregoing refers, of course, to dump ore only. On this class of ore the costs of mining have been charged to profit and loss account, and do not figure as charges against the value of the ore.

There seems to be no apparent reason, however, why concentration should not be resorted to on the Blue Jay, located in Skylark camp, between Phoenix and Greenwood.

GIANT MAY RESUME

NEGOTIATIONS NOW IN PROGRESS MAY LEAD TO RESUMPTION IN JUNE. LONDON LAWYER HERE TO SETTLE LITIGATION—BRINGS GOOD NEWS.

The outcome of the visit to Rosland of B. A. Wolf, solicitor, of London, may be a settlement of all the trouble of the Giant Mining company, paving the way to a resumption of operations at the mine on a large scale.

Mr. Wolf, who is in the city for the next ten or twelve days at least, thereupon returns to London to report the result of his mission to his principals.

In event of success attending Mr. Wolf's efforts to straighten matters out, the probable date of the resumption of the Giant is placed in June next, following the date of the matter, Mr. Wolf said yesterday.

"The large extent my business in Rosland is of a private nature, which I cannot brood, but it is no breach of confidence to state, however, that I am seeking to settle some little disputes between the Giant company and its principals, the African Ventures Syndicate. It should be a comparatively easy matter to settle the points in issue, but it is those details that I am not at liberty to discuss for public consumption."

"In reply to your query I may say that in my opinion the settlement of the matters in question will have an important effect upon the future program for the Giant mine. I should say that if the issues are straightened out to my satisfaction, and I can so report to my principals in London, operations will certainly be resumed at the Giant mine on a substantial scale. The date of such resumption would probably be in June next, but the resumption, so far as my principals are concerned, hinges around the settlement I have referred to. Prior to my departure from Rosland I may be able to say whether or not I have accomplished the desired object."

"I have no idea, not being a mining man, what part the suggested reduction works play in the plans for development and equipment of the Giant mine."

Governor Mackintosh states that Ferdinand Detlach, consulting engineer for the Giant company, will be in Rosland at a comparatively early date for the purpose of making a detailed local situation, examining the mine and forwarding the company's plans for the construction of reduction works that will save the time and molybdenum contents of the ore.

It is understood that the difference between the Giant company and the African Ventures Syndicate is about the status of the latter concern as holders of debentures issued by the Giant company. The African Ventures Syndicate is said to desire that the debentures shall stand as a charge against the mining company's assets, and that this point is in dispute.

When council opened Alderman Roll rose to a point of privilege. He drew attention to the fact that the last session of council was adjourned without a vote on a motion to adjourn, and he was denied the right to debate this resolution by a ruling from the chair. At the time he bowed to the motion, but since then he had looked into the matter and ascertained that almost everywhere else a motion to adjourn was debatable. The motion under discussion was unreasonable and tyrannical. It was the duty of the Mayor to see that the city was not in the hands of a few men, and he believed his ruling was parliamentary, but he had had doubts on the subject.

Alderman McDonald was at a loss to understand why the point had been raised, or why the solicitor was asked to pass on the question. In his opinion a motion to adjourn was always in order.

It was pointed out that the question was not as to whether a motion to adjourn was debatable. The solicitor decided that such motions were debatable, producing Reed's handbook on con-

cessional procedure to substantiate his opinion. Alderman Roll remarked across the table to Alderman Roll that he didn't see what difference it made, in any way, inasmuch as the majority had supported the resolution to adjourn.

TO PROTECT LIFE

Alderman Roll introduced under the head of inquiries the matter of protection for persons attending entertainments of any description, asking that the terms of the bylaws requiring inspection of buildings used for this purpose had been enforced. He remarked that in view of the terrible Chicago theatre disaster everything should be done to safeguard life here.

Mayor Clute said the bylaw relating to Trades Licenses imposed such heavy fees on such premises that the terms were unworkable, and that for this reason the bylaw had not been enforced, so far as he knew. An amendment was introduced to the effect that reasonable fees be levied on such premises, and the bylaw would be workable.

Alderman Roll insisted upon an immediate assurance that the bylaw would be enforced and at once and that the fees should be referred to the city solicitor for a report. The council was apparently in a hurry to get the matter in the evening it developed that the fees chargeable for entertainments were \$5 for every such attraction and \$25 per month for the subject of the bylaw, that is enough for an entertainment and \$10 per annum sufficient instead of \$25 per month.

MISCELLANEOUS

Frank Thompson & Co. of Montreal wrote to the city solicitor regarding the purchase of Rosland debentures, and asked for information about the city's financial position and prospects. The requested information will be forwarded.

Alderman Lookhart moved that \$100 be granted the Winter Carnival, with permission to connect all jumps and toboggan slides. This was carried.

It was resolved that the preparation of the assessment roll for the current year should be commenced on February 1, finished on April 1 and returned to council on April 30.

The school board's estimates of expenditure were received and referred to the whole council.

The city solicitor reported that Blue and Deschamps' title to ground they proposed selling to the city in connection with the flume right of way was good, and recommended the payment of the purchase price. He also recommended a refund of \$20 water rates to John Boulton.

Leave was given to introduce at next council meeting a bylaw to authorize the borrowing of money for current expenses.

Alderman McDonald and Petch moved that the resolutions passed by the previous council on January 30, 1903, in relation to the city's water works be rescinded. This resolution referred to month's notice being required on other proposals between the city and its employees. The motion was carried.

A large number of spectators gathered in the hall, but the proceedings did not evolve any fireworks.

THE BUSY DOMINION

L. A. CAMPBELL COMPARES INDUSTRIAL CONDITIONS WITH SAID EASTERNERS HAVE CHANGED EYES RESPECTING BRITISH COLUMBIA.

"One of the features that impressed me strongly in the course of my visit to the east was the comparison between conditions industrial in Canada and the United States. At the various American factories I visited the crews had been reduced about fifty per cent, while in Canada the factories are running practically at full capacity. The explanation of the slackness of trade south of the international boundary line was the approach of the presidential elections, but regardless of this the prosperity on our side of the line was most gratifying."

This is from Lorne A. Campbell, general manager of the West Kootenay Power & Light company, who has just returned from a month's visit to the east, in the course of which he visited the principal Canadian manufacturing centers as far east as Montreal, and has been returning to the west with a number of interesting observations. The sentiment in the foregoing gives a local corroboration of the facts set forth in recent financial publications.

Mr. Campbell was also impressed with the vigor of the present winter in Ontario and Quebec. At Toronto he encountered weather cold enough to bring the mercury fifteen degrees below zero, at Kingston there was a low temperature of twenty below, while in Montreal, when the thermometer registered twenty-five degrees below zero. In the course of the recent cold snap here the thermometer registered almost at zero for a few hours, and this is the record for Rosland during the present winter.

Throughout the east Mr. Campbell found people pleased to hear news at first hand about the mining industry of Rosland and British Columbia. He testifies to a much better feeling in respect to mining securities as investments, and attributes this change of heart to the fact that easterners have heard three times as much in their own industrial circles and associated with them in the mining industry of British Columbia enterprises were not because of any shortcoming in the country itself, but owing to injudicious selection of securities and marketing. The mining country is no longer blamed, and this is a decided step in the right direction, although the reason has been expensive for the easterners.

Touching on local matters, Mr. Campbell states that there has been no change in his company's output, but that it is expected to be increased to postpone extensions to its output next year. The outlook, he says, is bright today rather than foggy, and of electrical power than at any time in the history of the camp, and it is practically assured that early in the present year the company's output will be enhanced by the addition of horsepower.
