NEWSY BUDGET FROM COUNTY CAPITAL.

There is a great improvement in the weather of late.—The commissioners of streets are still progressing in their work. They are placing curbing along the sidewalks and leveling them up. This gives the streets a more uniform appearance and will certainly be a great improvement.—There has been another failure in our little town, that of S. E. Hue. His liabilities are estimated at about \$11,000. It seems that Webster St. has been failed on this line, particularly the store of which Mr Hue is the occupant. I believe Mr Hue has been very honorable in this failure; no trickery by which his own pocket will be filled as in some of the former failures.—Messrs Chase and Fullerton, of Port Williams have been shipping potatoes extensively of late from our station; 30 cents per bushel still continues to be the price paid.—Messrs Ellis and Bentley, of Sheffield Mills, have been storing apples in cellars for future shipments to England.—Hon. W. H. Owen of Bridgewater, was in town week before last and before his departure made an investment in real estate. He purchased from Mr Melville DeWolfe a field lying south of his house up on the hill, containing about 3 acres for \$1260. No one seems to know what he contemplates doing with it. Evidently he is a speculator and sees money in it. This property has been in the market for some time and no buyers found. A stranger comes in and invests. There is a lesson here. Push should be the word with us. "We are not all dead but asleep."—But, Messrs Editors, there are times when we do not sleep. The town on last Monday evening was thoroughly alive. The Kentville firemen had a torch light procession, the occasion being the taking possession of the new hall. This was a creditable affair certainly. The procession was composed of the band leading, discarding sweet music, then followed by the 2-wheeled hose cart, after which came the new hose wagon, made by Mr Parkman, of Windsor, respectively drawn by the firemen of the town. They were similarly uniformed. We observed among the firemen some of the leading and rising men of the town, councillors, merchants, government officials, hotel keepers, newspaper men and other gentlemen all doing their level best to make this their first effort of the kind a success, and a great success it was. The march was through the principal streets and one can hardly tell from where all the sympathizing and cheering crowd came. The estimate made by some was that between 2000 and 3000 were on the streets taking in the affair to their great satisfaction. After the march the firemen took formal possession of their new quarters near the hay scales in a new building just built by J. P. Chipman, Esq. After which cheers were given to the firemen, band, Mayor and Recorder. Mr King, our Mayor, made a happy reply which was to the point and highly appreciated. Then Mr Chipman, the Recorder, addressed the firemen and presented them on behalf of some of the citizens of the town an envelope containing \$52. This gift, so unexpectedly, was more than appreciated. I suppose I could expatiate more fully upon the appearance of the procession, but I think this will suffice this time.
