Intercollegiate Debate.

Before an audience such as Wolfville has seldom seen Acadia defeated Mount Allison in inter-collegiate debate on Wednesday evening. Acadia won both on argument and delivery. The question discussed was: Resolved that a Legislative Union of the Maritime Provinces on terms alike equitable and agreeable would be advantageous.

Mount Allison had the affirmative, and was represented by J. S. Smiley, '07, (leader) J. N. Ritchey, '09, and I. C. Rand, '09. The Acadia speakers were A. B. Balcou, '07, (leader), Bryce D. Knott, '07, and J. M. Shortliffe, '08. The debate opened at eight o'clock with Professor J. F. Tutts in the chair.

The opening speech was made by J. N. Ritchey, who claimed that there is a general presumption in favor of union, since union is strength. The division of the Provinces, he claimed, was wholly accidental, there was no good reason for it. Union would improve the Bench and Bar, and Government uniformly in commercial law. He also claimed that the new Province

Mr. Balcou in opening for Acadia said that the question was one of results only. Results depend not so much on terms as on natural affinity. That there is a limit to the size of a province is proved by the very fact of its existence. There are interests which are local, and must be dealt with by a Government that thoroughly knows the place. He claimed that each of the Maritime Provinces was a local unit, clearly separated by diversity in interests. In conclusion he said that whatever advantage pertains to local matters in ordinary cases is doubly true in the case of the Maritime Provinces.

I. C. Rand was the next speaker. He considered the matter from the financial side. Savings would be made in salaries of Governors and Judges and in the cost of executive councils, legislatures, departments, government houses, public printing, Supreme Courts, and revision of statutes.

He quoted Judge Langley as saying that Maritime Union would effect a saving of at least \$70,000. He claimed that union would give increased executive efficiency.

He was followed by J. M. Shortliffe for Acadia. He said that the states of the Provinces were different showing consequent differences in the notions of the people. The assertion of what the United Provinces might do was a mere presumption. He claimed that Mount Allison had an immense burden of proof. To lift this they had only the slender lever of imagination.

He was followed by J. S. Smiley claimed that Mount Allison would increase the public credit of the Provinces. Immigrants and capitalists would be attracted to a big and well known Province. He also claimed that union would give us more power at Ottawa. There would be a national pride in a United Province. The Colleges, Hospitals, etc., would be so large that they would get more benefits from wealthy men.

The next speaker was B. D. Knott. In a splendid speech he claimed that union would not increase our power at Ottawa, but rather decrease it. We would lose representation in the Cabinet. The union would not effect a financial saving but a loss of in subsidies of \$750,000.

Balcou the Acadia leader now summed the matter up. His rebuttal was most masterly. Mr. Smiley in a good speech summed up the matter for Mount Allison. The Judges were Hon. W. T. Pipes, Judge Russell and Post Office Inspector W. E. MacLellan. Their decision was unanimous.

Mass Meeting.

The mass meeting in the Baptist church last Sunday evening under the auspices of W. C. T. U. was well attended, the church being fully filled with an appreciative and sympathetic audience. Mrs. Mitchell, the president of the union, occupied the chair, and after reading an appropriate selection of scripture called upon Rev. Mr. Morse to lead in prayer. The speaker of the evening were then introduced. Excellent addresses were given by Rev. Mr. Wright, pastor of St. Andrew's church; Mr. McCutcheon, on behalf of the student body, and Prof. Sawyer. These were all brief, entertaining and pointed and received close attention. While the special subject discussed was the cigarette evil, the whole temperance question passed under review. A quartette, "Lead Kindly Light", was rendered by Mrs. O. D. Harris, Mrs. Gray, Mrs. L. W. Shep and Mrs. J. D. Chambers, which with good congregational singing added considerably to the success of the meeting.

The Wolfville Baptist Sunday-school is to make an offering next Sunday in aid of the famine-stricken inhabitants of China. The object is certainly a most needy one, judging from the heart-rending reports that come to us of the conditions that exist in that far-away land at the present time, and we trust that the good work begun may be continued.

Mr. Wilcox, M. L. 'Be your own boss' is a splendid motto. For this is a day of political bondage. The Liberals bow to Liberalism; the Conservatives to Conservatism. These gods hold in mortal terror the respective parties. This hunger for party success is the reason why we have so many incompetent legislators. The party candidate is ever the man variable in intellect, but gray in office getting. He must be able to poll the votes, which ability is all that is needful for party success. Pull dances where merit fears to tread. We want more political independence. We are going to get it.

With characteristic audacity certain American papers announce that Canada must soon become the proper

surd. We haven't the slightest desire to join the American Commonwealth. Our heritage is as great as that of the States. Also, we have the British Empire at our back. Wherefore, we will never say 'yes' to annexation. However, these statements are as honey to the American palate. And there is reason for this. The Americans have just become sophomores after a most successful freshman year. Wherefore we must make allowance for abnormal heads. Also, we should remember that men who can control a nation's railway stock, build cities, and become multi-millionaires in a month, may well be pardoned for aspiring to annex a country.

Horace Greeley, the great journalist, once said: "What God Almighty allows to happen, my newspaper is not afraid to print." Several American journals which published unexpurgated accounts of the Thaw trial now profess to find comfort in the sentence quoted above. Also, these aforesaid journals speak with a loud voice of the moral lessons to be learned from a perusal of their columns. Surely it is the duty of every public journal to give in the right way the main facts of this notorious trial; but, on the other hand, it is equally certain that the disgusting details serve no good purpose, and satisfy only the cravings of a depraved and degenerate mind.

Generally speaking, it is the duty of every paper to give its readers all the news. There are, however, many exceptions. Here is one. Knowing a mercantile house to be in an embarrassing position, should a paper exploit the fact, or give the firm a chance to regain its feet? A 'story' is not worth the ruin of a business house. There are morals in journalism.

It is sincerely to be hoped that the government will carry out its purpose of establishing a school of technology. Beyond question technical education is one of the greatest factors in building a nation's commercial prosperity. Germany led the way in the establishment of such schools, and to-day 'Made in Germany' is an eloquent testimonial to what technical education has done for that country. By all means let us have such a school,—a school that will redound to the everlasting credit of this province by the sea.

Letters to the Editor.
To the Editor of THE ACADIAN.
MR. EDITOR.—I have read with much interest the Annual Report of the Town of Wolfville, recently received. The reports of the Mayor and Committees indicate that much time has been given to looking after the affairs of the town for which, it seems to me, the citizens should be very thankful.

I am pleased to note the strong temperance sentiment of the Council as expressed in the report of the Police and License Committee. I am also glad that the need for a Curfew Bell is admitted by the Committee. They say "it is a fact that if the children of tender years could be kept at home at night we would not have a continual supply of torments growing up to fill the ranks of those who annually retire. Recruits are coming forward in a great many cases where we might expect the parents to have a little Curfew of their own." Having thus recognized the evil and the remedy for it do not see how the Council can excuse themselves for not applying the remedy. The welfare of "these children of tender years" and the good name of the town demand that "the experiment" be tried.

There is another thing which helps to increase the class complained of, to which I find no reference in the report of the Council. I refer to the non-attendance at school of some of the children of the town. These children are not only growing up in ignorance but in most cases without being taught to obey any one. What wonder if later on they are found in the ranks of the lawless and disorderly. I notice in the Annual Report of the Town of Truro this evil is referred to and the suggestion is made to the incoming Board to adopt some means for securing the attendance of these children, "either by employing the services of a transient officer or making some arrangement with the regular police staff to do this work." Could not our Council adopt one or the other of these methods?

There are some other things in the report of the Council, etc., with your permission, I wish to refer later.
